PROF. M. A. NEWELL :

Dear Sir:—The School Board of Harford County, on entering upon the discharge of their official duty, found many difficulties to the successful carrying out of the School Law.

The law makes it imperative that the Schools shall be kept open ten months every year. Now, this is all well enough if the Board has the money so to do, but there should be at least some discretion to the Board to be governed by circumstances. Had we been at liberty to suspend the Schools the first quarter when we entered upon our duties, the Board could have been more successful in conducting their Schools.

Not having received sufficient money from the former Board for the successful carrying on of the Schools during the first quarter, the Board has been more or less hampered ever since. For this reason and a want of hearty co-operation on the part of our late Secretary, we have labored at a disadvantage.

The condition of our Schools is not such as it should be. Many of them do not belong to the County, and others are not fit to teach in.

We need money to build, repair and refit houses worthy of a cause upon which the best interests of society depend.

The grade of our teachers is higher than formerly. In this they are making progress, and are deserving of better pay. The salaries are inadequate and not up to the scholarship demanded by the age. How long this shall continue will depend upon our successors and law-makers. Teachers should be liberally paid, and every inducement held out to them to thoroughly prepare themselves for their profession if we would have teachers worthy of the cause. Why those engaged in training the rising generation are not better appreciated we cannot understand.

Trustees are a hindrance to the successful carrying on of the Schools, and therefore should be abolished. They do a great deal of harm and often defeat the purpose of the Commissioners. They are about as much use as the fifth wheel to a wagon. There is a danger of becoming too democratic.

Commissioners ought not to be elected by the people, as it degrades the office and keeps good men from serving in a capacity for which they are well qualified. Let them be appointed.

The finances should be ample, and this should be provided for by the Legislature by an increase on the 10 cents as levied by the State. The \$1.00 tax ought to be abolished, and the parents purchase such books as prescribed by the County or State Board.

In conclusion, we believe that the Public Schools should be carried on in the most liberal manner, if society and the State would be benefited. Let the Public School system be worthy of our confidence or let it be abolished. The State is willing to spend larger sums on interests not so vital to its welfare as its Educational interests, and it seems strange that it should not be just here. Just as our people appreciate a Public System of Education will it grow in favor. For this we must labor and be willing to wait.

PROF. M. A. NEWELL:

Dear Sir:—I have the honor to report to you the condition of the Schools of Howard County to September 30th, 1869. I would be glad if I could conscientiously report that all the Schools were in the good condition that our Examiner has so zealously labored to make them; but really many of the Schools are plodding on in an old-fogy, lifeless condition, whilst some are on the *qui vive* to catch every idea that can lead to their improvement. The School will partake of the nature of the teacher; the LIVE teacher will awaken an interest in the School, as has been apparent in some instances in the County, and the teacher who has no life, has around him a chaotic task to perform, the manner little troubling him: if good or bad all the same to him!

Since my last report the six Commissioners have conducted their respective Schools, and I will take each district separately: I have the honor to represent the interest of the First District, and I have four Schools. In all of them one thing is especially wanting, and that is proper management. I hope that will be remedied; if it is not it will not be because the Examiner has not tried to remedy it. I think that such changes have been made in the place of some teachers, who have ceased to teach in the district, as will redound to the vast improvement of the educational interests thereof. I know more of this district than the other portions of the County; but I presume it will compare favorably

with any other portions of it. In the Second District four changes have been made in the teachers, and those that have been made, have improved the condition of the Schools, but not in that degree that the Examiner would entirely approve.

In the Third District the School arrangements are not at all satisfactory. The School at Marriottsville is held so near the railroad that the noise from the cars prevents the teacher from doing the good he could otherwise perform ; at least one-sixth part of the School term is an intermission from school labor on account thereof. At Sykesville the School has not done well. The friends of education have assisted to the amount of one-third of the cost of a beautiful School House near West Friendship ; and it will compare favorably with any in the County at a cost of little over one-half that one much like it cost in 1863. The cost was about \$700. I am glad to report to you that Miss Olivia Dorsey, the very accomplished teacher of that School is doing excellent service. I would be happy to add my testimony to the excellent and very acceptable service that Dr. Luke M. Shipley is performing at School No. 5, Third District. The School in which Mr. J. H. Jeffrey taught has been abandoned, and Miss Dorsey has taken the place thereof. In the Fourth District the Schools are pretty much in the condition reported last year. N. F. Rittenhouse and Miss Davis have charge of the "Banner School" of the County. If the interest they manifest in the community, could be transferred to other portions of the County it would do good ; they are alive to their duty, and the Examiner does not fail to report quarterly the pleasure he has at the examination held there. It is the second School in the County in size, and the first in interest ; there are from 40 to 75 patrons present at each examination, while in many other portions of the County not one patron is present to applaud or disapprove the School system or the manner of its execution.

Whilst many disapprove the system, if we judge from their interest in the same, they really judge without placing themselves in a position to judge properly. If we ask one how he likes a piece of machinery, and he had not seen it,

he would say he had not seen it, and was unprepared to judge; but the most boisterous in denouncing the School System, are those who have never been inside any School House since 1865.

I am pleased to add my testimony in favor of Mr. E. W. Warfield, teacher of No. 5, in this District, who is doing excellent and valuable service. I do not desire to create jealousy in the minds of any not named, but I name *these* because they have been more successful, and for their care and attention they deserve honorable commendation, being alive to their work. May success attend all the teachers. In the Fifth District there are five Schools. At No. 1 Mr. S. A. Cremin has done good service. At School No. 2 Miss Jennie Hardy, daughter of the Commissioner of that District, is doing well, and deserves great praise for her faithful and systematic method of conducting her School. In some of the other Schools so frequent changes have been that great progress has not been made manifest. I hope that more good management will be apparent in future, and that each will vie with the other to catch hold of all the good they can find for the Schools, and will practice the same.

In the Sixth District there are five Schools. No 1, under the care of Mr. A. N. Alexander and Mrs. Lizzie Duvall, has given general satisfaction; and I greatly regret to inform you that the declining health of the gentlemanly principal has admonished him to decline the School. He has retired to the vales of the sunny South (South Carolina) where the good wishes of the entire community of Savage and the vicinity, have followed him. He endeared himself to all with whom he associated, and to none more than myself. He has the hearty prayers of the people that he may be spared to continue his usefulness in this State, and especially as he desired to return to us if his life should be spared. At School No. 4, Mr. Wm. J. Robinson has done excellent service, and, indeed, in only one School has good service been difficult; that is improving.

When teachers find that their names have been mentioned here I hope they will work the harder, and show to the world that they love the duties of their position. No one who does not love his duties can be a successful teacher ! Love your duty and show by your zeal that you love it, by prompt and zealous energy in the prosecution of that duty !

I have mentioned that we had some in our County who disapprove the present School law. The most objectionable feature is the amount paid for rent of books, they prefer to purchase their own books. I hope the law will be modified so as to allow the people to purchase them, or make them free. I doubt that good results will follow from the election of Trustees ; they seldom go near the Schools, and consequently know nothing about them, because they do not seem willing to devote any time to the Schools ; and, indeed, the difficulty in many cases of procuring the services of persons who are in every way suited to the position, prevents that good from being done that would result in their favor.

If the law is not changed in that particular a change should at least be made in the time of the election of the Trustees. As it now stands the election takes place in May, only about sixty days before the end of the year, and in the middle of a School term. The election should take place in July, and if elections should fail to be held at that period the Commissioners would have more time in July and August to provide for the appointment of the same. I would suggest that the law be so changed that at least one-half of the Commissioners should hold over for two years, so that the Board will always be composed of some experienced in their duties. To elect a new Board every two years and they to elect a new Secretary and Examiner, there is no experienced member of the Board ; and many difficulties may follow which would in some degree be alleviated by the change I propose. At the past election only one member of the late School Board was a candidate for re-election.

I have to report that the County Commissioners have levied barely enough money to carry on the Schools to May, 1870. They borrowed from the Treasurer of our Board the High

School Fund, \$6,400, and with \$416 that they had pledged themselves to levy to assist in paying for the new School House that I have said Miss Olivia Dorsey occupies, the whole fund levied by them is \$12,000 to pay these amounts and the deficiency for the year 1869 to May, 1870.

No change has taken place in the pay of the teachers. We pay \$500 for first grade, provided they teach Book Keeping, Algebra and Philosophy to five pupils; \$475 for second grade and \$300 for assistants. Whilst we have labored to improve the condition of the Schools, that success has not crowned our efforts which we had desired. We hope for more in future.

As this is the last report I shall have the honor to make to you, I cannot close without declaring to you the valuable services of our Examiner, S. K. Dashiell, who leaves nothing undone to improve the condition of the Schools. He labors late and early, and if the Schools have not improved the fault cannot be laid upon him. To the members of the Board I return my acknowledgments for the many pleasant moments passed with them in our deliberations; and with the hope that our pleasant associations may be cherished by all of us, I bring my report to an end.

PROF. M. A. NEWELL :

Dear Sir: The year has witnessed a great improvement in this County in regard to school property. At the advent of the present Board the school houses of the County were in a deplorable condition ; and the first care of the Board was to set about improving their condition. We have erected nine new houses, at a cost of nearly eleven thousand dollars ; in addition to which about three thousand dollars was paid by the people of Chestertown towards the erection of their new house, which sum is not included in any of our estimates.

We have put most of the old houses in good repair, and by the close of the present year every school house in use in Kent County will be comfortable. The present system, as a whole, is a success. There are some points in the law which could well be amended :

First.—Under the present arrangement the Examiner cannot give that close oversight to the schools that they need. His duties should be less multifarious, and he should be required to visit the schools more frequently.

Secondly.—The power and duties of the County and School District Boards are not clearly enough defined. They should be made so distinct as not to conflict with each other.

Third.—The books should be *sold* to the pupils who are willing to pay for them, and those who are not able to pay should be supplied at the discretion of the School District Boards; and no books should be bought by the County Board, except to supply free pupils, all others buying their books in the market.

There may be other points which could be improved, but these are the main points which occur to me at present. There should be some concert of action among the school officers of the State, and a general plan agreed upon for recommendation to the coming session of the General Assembly, so that whatever amendments are made to the law this winter shall embody the experience of those who have been engaged in working the new system. The amendments, being made in this manner, will make the present system a glorious success, and the time will not be far distant when Maryland will be as proud of her School System as Pennsylvania is now of hers.

PROF. M. A. NEWELL :

Dear Sir: I have the honor herewith to forward the statistical and financial reports of Dr. M. J. Stone, the present Examiner of Public Instruction in Prince George's County. The reports were received yesterday, and as they embrace a full and minute statement of the present condition and progress of the schools in this County, it will be only necessary for me to add a few general remarks.

It is a source of great satisfaction to the friends of the present system of Primary Education to know that there has been a progressive augmentation of the number of pupils in attendance in the different schools of the County; but this pleasure is greatly impaired with a knowledge of the fact that our financial deficit is so great as to render us unable to pay our teachers more than one-half of the last quarterly instalment due them. We trust that every practicable instrumentality will be called into requisition by the proper authorities to prevent a recurrence of this sad state of things. There is no class of people in the community who work more sedulously than the teachers, or should be paid with more punctuality. Teachers are becoming more alive to the responsibilities of their vocation, and more interested than ever before. This may in some measure be accounted for by the improvement in books, school houses, and many other facilities afforded them under the present organization.

Perhaps no enterprise has ever been inaugurated in the State with fewer friends to support it than the present system of Primary education ; but it has triumphed. Order has been brought out of chaos, and the results have been so fully demonstrated by the record which is now before the people that it would be impolitic longer to oppose it. The system is yet in its infancy in this State, but we believe if supported, fostered, and improved as it ought to be, a grade of Public Instruction will be developed and matured which will compare favorably with any State in the Union. It will in time become efficient and thorough as to render it unnecessary to send our children from home at so early a period in order to acquire an elementary, academic or collegiate education.

Although my connection with the Educational System of this County terminates from the date of this report, still I feel a deep and abiding interest in it, because I confidently believe on its perpetuity depends the intelligence, morality and progress of the rising and future generations. The most pleasing reminiscences of my life will be ever retained of my associations with the Teachers and Commissioners and public, of whose courtesies and noble hospitalities I have so often been the humble recipient.

PROF. M. A. NEWELL :

Dear Sir : The Legislature of 1868 repudiated the idea that Public Education was a public charity, designed for and dispensed to the poor as such, and adopted the true and enlightened principle that knowledge and virtue combined are the only sure and stable foundations of government ; as ignorance and vice are the certain downfall of any people ; and that Public Education therefore becomes not only the duty of the State, but the right and best interest of the citizen.

This principle, now recognized and acknowledged by all economists, adopted and acted upon by all civilized nations, was known and felt by our Legislators to be specially required in a form of government like ours, and that there never was a nation in which the obligation was so clear, or its application so important. With us the people are the source of all power, and indeed are themselves the governors; there public sentiment becomes the supreme law of the land; that sentiment left unenlightened by education, unchastened by moral culture, were indeed a poor foundation for a commonwealth, would quickly disrupt the free institutions for which our fathers bled, and perhaps plunge us back into despotism or anarchy. They have wisely adopted a System of Public Education to develop the average mind of the people, to make of our children good and intelligent men and women—"men who their duties know, and dare maintain them;" these constitute a State—these constitute the bulwark of liberty.

Under this school law, so founded and designed, Prince George's County became a beneficiary of the State—receiving by general taxation twice as much as she pays; and hence the provision which "orders and requires" that she shall make up by local taxation any deficiency or amount that may be required to keep this system of Public Schools in successful operation, so that the liberal State legislation be not permitted to fail of its end. I am sorry to say that the funds, under the most economical administration, are now sadly deficient for the ends designed. The amount received from State taxation, intended primarily to pay teachers' salaries and to purchase books, falls short of the required sum by about one thousand dollars per quarter, or four thousand per annum.

The school houses and sites, being County property, are of course at the proper cost and charge of the County. Of these there a few good and new houses; others tolerably comfortable; but by far the greater number are old, decayed and uncomfortable. Hot in summer, cold in winter, poorly

furnished, badly ventilated, and too small to accommodate the number of children now pressing in.

The village of Laurel has taken the lead in this direction ; it has a handsome lot of land, a large and beautiful school house, costing some six or seven thousand dollars—the County not one cent. It has four teachers, a large portion of whose salaries is not paid by this Board. This school has 247 pupils on roll for the year, and a daily average attendance of nearly 180. I would this spirit was abroad in other sections of the County.

In view of the extreme pressure of the times, the large burden of taxation, the strictest economy, at all times the duty of the Board, now becomes a necessity. We cannot, therefore, I judge, hope to build new school houses during the coming year, however loudly and justly demanded by the people in some sections of the County, who have not yet shared in the benefits for which they have paid their part. The uttermost we can hope to accomplish is to pay debts, repair houses unfit for use, pay salaries of teachers, and keep the schools in operation to a limited extent.

In the present exigency of the funds, when every dollar intrusted to the Board has been parsimoniously dealt out, and a large debt and deficiency still remain, I would direct your view as a matter of economy to some of the schools of the County. By the law of 1868 an average attendance of ten pupils entitles a school to be continued ; for a lesser number it is ordered to be discontinued, or the salary of the teacher to be decreased *pro rata*. My opinion is that \$400 is too much to be paid for 10 pupils ; that a good teacher can always command a larger number. Bad attendance is the very bane of our schools ; after making all reasonable allowance for bad weather, distance, sickness and pressure for labor at home, the reproach still remains. I think that if such schools were suspended, parents and patrons feeling the loss would prompt each other, and endeavor to get back the benefits they had not rightly valued.

In some instances perhaps unworthy teachers are kept in office by neighborhood favoritism. Such may have justly

won their certificates of qualification by their proficiency in learning, but on trial have proved inapt to teach, to order, or discipline a school; possibly deficient in diligence, or wanting in morality, or regarding teaching as a temporary employment—their minds being given to some other pursuit. In this connection the State Normal School is of inestimable value, giving yearly to the State a corps of teachers, skilled in the whole process, and resting upon their profession for all of honor or profit they may hope for in life.

You may perceive that upon two points I indicate that legislation might be beneficial; there are others which I forbear to notice.

Last but not least—a word of the teachers as a body. They have been diligent and faithful in the performance of their duties, anxious to excel, and ready to receive any suggestions for the improvement and progress of their schools; patient under the delay of payment of salaries, and not discouraged by the want of those comforts and appliances in their school houses so essential to the success of their efforts. On the other hand there are some whom I cannot commend for these good qualities, and whom I would be glad to see adopt some other walk in life. Of our lady teachers, it is very surprising to me that without any logic or theories upon the subject, the women of our County have noiselessly and without public observation, taken possession of our school houses to a large extent. This, no doubt, is the result of those manifest gifts of nature which render women in some respects the best teachers. Her gift of patience, indispensable to the young; her quick perception, brought into play in oral instruction, her moral sensibilities, warming many a youthful heart to emulation and virtue—these qualities gently supply that authority which men enforce by ruder means.

PROF. M. A. NEWELL:

Dear Sir:—I send you the report of the condition of the Public Schools in Queen Anne's County, from the 15th of April, 1863, to September 30th, 1869. The reports of the teachers for the different terms of the year are deficient as to some items of information called for by the blank forms furnished by you. You will see that I have not reported the average attendance of pupils. I could not do so because a large majority of the teachers have made no such report to this Board while reporting the number enrolled. I am, therefore, reluctantly compelled to leave that item blank, as also the number of different pupils for the same reason.*

In my former reports I have had no information to give of improvement in school houses. I have now the pleasure of being able to say, that during the past year we have built six new school houses and repaired four or five old ones. We have put in them new and convenient furniture, and the teachers have now room to go to work in earnest, and they

*The want of these items is a very serious inconvenience in making up the State Tables; and the Law makes due provision for obtaining them, if it were properly enforced. "Teachers shall enter into registers prepared for that purpose an accurate account of the attendance of pupils, of text-books used, and branches taught, and such other statistics as may be required * * * * * and no teacher shall be entitled to receive payment for services until the register, properly filled up and completed, be returned." School Law, Chapter VII, Section 3. N.

seem to have the disposition to profit by the facilities thus afforded them. It is the intention of the Board to build at least five more houses during the current school year. You will see by our Financial Report that they are out of debt and have a small surplus on hand ; thus, while doing all in their power to improve the schools, leaving no burden upon the shoulders of their successors.

The law for the government of the schools is working well with us. The privilege granted by the law to the people of the different School Districts, to elect their own Trustees, seems to be very little appreciated in many districts. In many instances no Trustees were elected, and the School Board had to fill the vacancies by appointment. With a few amendments not proper to be mentioned here, but which the wisdom of the Legislature will no doubt discern and make, the law may be made more efficient, and its administration more easy. Under its operation our schools have improved and are improving, and our teachers and pupils are glad to see me, and the time I spend among them is well spent if it is as profitable to them as it is pleasant to myself.

No Law can be perfect, and none so near perfection as to silence all criticism and have no enemies, but the enemies of the General School System of Maryland in this county are comparatively few, and it has many friends. The time, I think, has passed for the people—the thinking people of Queen Anne's County—to oppose a General System of Education, or be unwilling to give it a liberal support. The County School Board, whose labors will soon close by the expiration of their term of service, by the judicious manner in which they have performed all their duties will no doubt receive the approbation of all. If their successors should be fortunate enough to do as much as they have done, the close of the next two years will see the schools of Queen Anne's County in a much better condition than has ever been witnessed in the past.

PROF. M. A. NEWELL:

Dear Sir:—For information as to the condition of the Public Schools of this County and of the finances of the Board, we respectfully refer you to the accompanying statistical reports. The Financial Statement is of course confined to transactions within the school year beginning October 1st, 1868, and ending September 30th, 1869. It refers to those moneys only which have been actually received and paid during that time. The whole amount due for teachers' salaries was \$11,387 50, the statement shows that of this amount the sum of \$8,542 was paid, leaving a balance due teachers of \$2,845 50. Of this balance the sum of \$1,920 50 has since been paid out of the October instalment of State School Tax for the present year, leaving a balance due teachers of \$925. This sum added to that due for books, stationery and several miscellaneous items, makes the present indebtedness of the Board \$2,000, which will have to be provided for by a County Tax, as all funds from all other sources are absorbed by and are insufficient for the requirements of current school work.

The revenue derived from the State for school purposes is not sufficient to pay teachers the meagre sum of \$75 per term, even if exclusively applied to their salaries, which cannot be, as the expenses of general supervision and those incident to school work are to be met from the same source. It was known to the framers of the school law that the State School Tax and Free School Fund were not sufficient for the efficient operation of the schools, and hence they authorized the School Boards of the Counties to call for a County Tax. It is the intention of the Board in this County to call for a School Tax immediately so that there may be no interrup-

tion of the continuous progress which has marked the career of the Public Schools of St. Mary's.

That the people of the county favor such tax if necessary to the efficiency of the schools, is evident from the very generally expressed recognition of its necessity and propriety, and the steady increase in the number of schools and pupils. The number of schools this year is 39, an increase of 4; the number of pupils 1,321, an increase of 89, facts which show a popular appreciation of the necessity of education and a growing reliance on the Public Schools for its acquisition. The popular instinct is rightly realizing the signs of the times and moving in the direction of their indications.

The following suggestions of modification of the present system so as to adapt it more fully to the wants of this county is respectfully submitted by the Examiner with whom alone is the responsibility. The Board of School Commissioners should have the appointment of teachers. The examination of applicants for teachers' Certificates should require the presence of at least one member of the Board. The Board of School Commissioners should be made an incorporate body. The Board should have the exclusive control of the books and stationery supply, and should be unrestricted in the number of their meetings.

As this will in all probability be my last report upon the Public Schools of this county, allow me to say that they are constantly improving in both attendance and progress of the children and in the competency of their teachers. The teachers are doing well, and I sincerely wish they could be adequately paid. I do not believe that any Board of School Commissioners could manifest more interest for the success of their work than does the present Board for the success of theirs. They have certainly done what they could for the collective interests of the community. Next year it is hoped to have your presence at an Institute in this county, when you will be able to judge for yourself of the condition of our common cause in old St. Mary's.

PROF. M. A. NEWELL:

Sir: I have the honor to submit to you the annual report of the Board of School Commissioners of Talbot County for the year 1868-69.

The results of the operations of this division of the Department of Public Instruction are but imperfectly exhibited by the tables already transmitted from this office—A, B and C. A largely increased number of pupils have received instruction at our schools during the year, and the average daily attendance would have presented a greatly increased per centage had not several contagious disorders spread through the county, and to such an extent among the children of some districts as to threaten the necessity for a suspension of school duties altogether. A neat and comfortable house and lot have been purchased at the village of Royal Oak, and another school opened there, which has been in successful operation for nearly a year. A school house in the first election district, long closed for want of pupils, has been thoroughly repaired, and we have had quite an excellent school there since the spring of 1869. Our schools were opened on the first day of September, 1868, and

were closed for a summer vacation of two months on the thirty-first day of July last, making a school year of eleven months. By this arrangement the month of September will be included in the usual vacation instead of the month of July as heretofore, and our schools, of course, will be kept open hereafter for only ten months of the year.

The Board established at the opening of the scholastic year nine schools of the *First Grade*, corresponding to *Grammar* or *High Schools*, in which teachers of the "First Grade" alone were allowed to teach, thus securing to every election district one or more schools with provision for the higher grades of education. The teachers of these schools of a higher grade, with one or two exceptions only, have done effective service during the year, and, at the re-examination of our teachers in August and September last, they were examined in the Languages and the Higher Mathematics. We were pleased to note the fact at these re-examinations that our teachers had, during the year, put themselves upon a course of review, and that many who held second grade certificates were successful candidates for certificates of the first grade. It is an indication of vigor and efficiency in the conduct of their work when those who have the charge and direction of *scholars* are themselves, at the same time, *students*. Another hopeful sign of growing vitality in our schools is the increasing interest manifested in the discussions and exercises of our "Teachers' Association." This necessary adjunct to every good system of public instruction should always be an object of especial care and attention with our school officers. We have thoroughly remodeled our "Association," and engrafted upon it many of the features of an "Institute;" and, after an experience of now more than twelve months, we believe that from a thing almost extinct our Association is now elevated upon a plane of permanent usefulness, and will continue to attract the liveliest interest of our teachers, and their best endeavors to develop its capacities for still higher achievements and still greater advantages to those who are mere novices in the practice of our art.

Since my last report, I have visited all of the Schools in the county twice, and some of them five or six times. The duties of my several offices and relations in connection with the Schools have necessarily entailed upon me so much office labor, that I found it impossible to do very little more than comply with the strict letter of the law in the matter of school visiting. But the books and working order of our office are now so complete in arrangement that more time can be devoted hereafter to the important duties outside of mere office routine. A system of school superintendence must rely principally for its effectiveness upon the adoption of some well matured and rational plan for conducting it by those into whose hands it is committed. My own plan has been to observe the practical operations of a school for the whole or part of a day, and then to lecture:—First, for the benefit of the teacher, presenting the best methods of teaching the different branches of study, the results of my own experience as a teacher, the expedients that ought to be adopted for overcoming the difficulties of children, illustrating whenever necessary upon the blackboard. Second, for the benefit of scholars, by endeavoring to impress them with a sense of their duties to their school their teacher and their schoolmates, and to awaken in them a desire to study and to please. That my labors in that direction have been productive of good results many of our teachers and the parents of the children have borne me voluntary testimony. During these rounds of visiting I have tried to become familiar with the countenance and attainments of each individual scholar, so that, whenever and wherever I may meet any of our pupils, I seldom fail to call them by name, and converse with them familiarly about their school and their studies. In this way the pupils themselves become aware that they have in the superintendent a friend whose sympathy goes with them, and whose eye is upon them everywhere. Precluded by the very nature and extent of the field of my operations from participating personally in the organization of every school, I have left them very much in the hands of

the teachers, and relied upon my influence being felt in every department of every school more through the medium of sympathy than otherwise. If I have succeeded in establishing through the entire field of my labors a cord of positive, active sympathy, a sympathy that has inspired a harmony of action and a singleness of purpose to labor patiently for the attainment of good and great results, it is owing not only to the members of the Board who have enthusiastically devoted themselves to the work, but also to the generous confidence of the teachers themselves in one who has been chosen from their own ranks.

Having been connected with the Public Schools and Academy of this county as a teacher for ten years, dating from April, 1854, I was fortunate enough to have secured in advance of my elevation to my present official position, the confidence and esteem of many of our present teachers who had formerly been co-laborers with me in this interesting field. We had stood together in other days, when we had demanded and secured some needed reforms in the schools of our county; and together we had been active for common purposes in a convention of our Public School Teachers in 1859, the first convention of the sort ever held in this county, and at which, on the last day of its meeting, a plan was matured for organizing the first "Teachers' Association of Talbot County." The recollection of my subsequent endeavors to foster and sustain this "Association," I am happy to know, is still fresh in the minds of my old associates. But I have been fortunate also in securing the confidence and support of all, I think, of the teachers who have entered the service since the severance of my connection with the Public Schools in 1864. To having been heartily seconded by the united body of our teachers in all of my plans for success, I ascribe, more than to any other cause, the prosperity of our Public Schools at this time beyond anything in their former history.

The present School Law has worked very well with us. There are still those, no doubt, who favor the idea of lodging the power of appointing teachers in the hands of a cen-

tral board, but the great majority of our people favor the idea of local boards, and of leaving the power of selecting a teacher with those whose children are to be taught. We consider the law, though somewhat vague and defective in some of its details, a very excellent one in the main; and any attempt on the part of the next Legislature to change any of its general features would, we believe, be very generally deplored. We hold the opinion that the great secret of the successful operation of any school law lies in its earnest and honest administration by capable and *practical* men, and, if possible, by men who have devoted their lives to the service, and distinguished themselves as teachers. What good reason can be assigned for selecting persons to examine teachers and to supervise their work who were never teachers themselves? It will be time enough to glean the fields of Physic, Law and Divinity for the purpose of finding school superintendents, when the lists of our public educators fail to present so goodly a number of honored names as now; when our teachers themselves wholly cease to be distinguished for scholarly attainments and excellence in the practice of their art. By placing our teachers in a line of honorable promotion, we would incite them to perfect their scholarship, and to acquire a more exact knowledge of the principles upon which the grand science of teaching rests. There is an art of teaching more intricate than the introductions of the science, known only to the successful educator—a deft knowledge that lies beyond the ken of those who, suddenly lifted to supervise our schools, gather all their knowledge of theories and systems of teaching from what we call “the books,” and become bloated with a morbid enthusiasm more fatal to the best interests of our schools than empiricism itself.

One great obstacle in the way of the complete success of our schools is the want of ample grounds and attractive school houses, supplied with the necessary apparatus for making study interesting and profitable. Wherever this experiment has been tried, the result has been a large increase in the number of pupils, and greater regularity in

their attendance. The demand is now not so much for cheap schools as for good schools ; and too much money can not be expended towards the elevation of the schools themselves, provided it be judiciously and economically expended with a view to this purpose.

The year has been one of gratifying success. Our teachers have been alive to the responsibilities of their position, and have labored with a zeal and energy worthy of a higher public appreciation, and better compensation.

PROF. M. A. NEWELL:

Dear Sir:—The general progress of the Schools in this county has been uniform with former years. It is believed that a greater interest has been manifested by all classes of people. The results of the liberal appropriations made by the Board last year for building purposes are beginning to be made manifest not only in the increased number of new buildings, but also in the incentive which teachers and pupils have received.

During the year twenty-four new school houses have been erected, some of which are among the finest in the State. At Hagerstown, Boonsboro', Sharpsburg, Leitersburg, Smithsburg and Cavetown, large and commodious houses have been erected. In addition to this, the Board have purchased several houses, which, when contemplated changes are made, will add greatly to school accommodations in the Districts in which they are located.

Graded schools have been established in every town in the county, but as the County Examiner has not yet visited them we cannot report upon the advantages of the new arrangement. The Teachers' Institute, held in our county during the month of September, is believed to have had an excellent effect by way of stimulating teachers to more vigorous exertions and inculcating methods of instruction, which, if adopted and adhered to, must result in the increased ad

vancement of pupils, and the Board gladly embrace the opportunity to express their high appreciation of the efficient services rendered by Prof. M. A. Newell in conducting the exercises of the Institute.

In closing this report the Board would take occasion to congratulate you, sir, upon the general success which has attended the school system in this county, as shown in the increased number of schools, of teachers and pupils; and, whilst they would suggest some modifications of the existing law, they believe such suggestions would receive more attention if embodied in resolutions or recommendations of School Officers and authorities, than if thrown among a mass of matter which legislators do not generally notice, and from which suggestions looking to the improvement of our school system would not be eliminated. All of which is respectfully submitted.

PROF. M. A. NEWELL:

Dear Sir: Enclosed with this you will find my report for the scholastic year ending September 30th. You will see that we have fifty-two schools in operation, and on the roll for the winter term twenty-three hundred and eighty-five pupils. Last year we had forty-one schools and sixteen hundred and thirty-three scholars, at a cost of \$3,511.83 per term. Our Teachers' Salaries for the year is \$14,606.11, an average of \$3,651.52 per term. The cost per scholar for the summer term of 1868 was \$2.15, and for the winter term of 1869, \$1.77 per scholar. We have eleven more schools in operation, and all very well attended.

Owing to the informality of a great many of our teachers' reports, I am not able to give you as full a statement of the condition of the schools, &c., as I should like. We do not receive sufficient funds from the State to enable us to carry on the schools for ten months, as the law directs, and failing to receive any appropriation from the county for 1869 will embarrass the Board very much. We are very much in arrears with our teachers already, and they deserve a great deal of credit for their willingness to continue on to teach and wait so patiently for their wages.

The Free Public School System has certainly worked with marked success. We have but two private schools in the county. The School Law I think should be revised, and I

hope the next Legislature will remodel it. There should be sufficient funds placed by the Legislature in the hands of each Board throughout the State to carry on the schools throughout the year. The salaries of the teachers should be uniform in all the counties. We had to discontinue our schools from September 15th to November 1st, owing to the financial condition of the Board. We have built seven new school houses, at an average cost of about \$375, all upon the *same plan*. We have five more under contract, and still we need more.

I think our teachers have considerably improved in the art of teaching, and will compare favorably with any county in the State. Our worthy Examiner informed me he found a class in one school that could spell every word in Sargent's Speller correctly.

We have one young man in the State Agricultural College, four in St. John's College, and four young ladies and one gentleman in the State Normal School.

Our receipts for the year were \$18,370.47, our disbursements \$22,557.37, leaving a balance due our teachers of \$4,186.90.
