REPORT

OF THE

STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The following summary, in connection with the accompanying tables, exhibits in a condensed form the most important facts connected with the administration of the public school system of the State, for the school year in the city of Baltimore ending December 31, 1886, and in the counties ending June 30, 1887; and for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1886, in the city, and on the 30th of September, 1887, in the counties. At first sight these figures are not strikingly suggestive. But a closer scrutiny will enable us to read a lesson,—perhaps a warning. Two years ago the number of pupils enrolled in the county schools was 125,423. This year the number is 121,177. Considering the natural increase of population, why should there be a falling off of more than two thousand pupils in two years? It is true that this decrease is to a certain extent compensated by the fact that the average daily attendance in 1887 was larger than in 1885 by 2,821.

Standing for a minute by the sea-shore it is hard to determine whether the tide is coming in or going out. Patient waiting, and a comparison at sufficient intervals, are necessary to determine the question.

Let us go back twenty years. In 1867 the average duration of the schools was nine months. In 1887 it was eight months and three-fifths. In 1867 thirteen counties kept schools open ten months in the year; in 1887 only ten counties had schools open for a similar period. This apparent retrogression may be explained by the fact that in 1867 the white schools received \$359,226 from the State, (being \$296,550 from the State school tax and \$62,676 from the free school fund;) and in 1887 they received only \$309,846 from the State,

(being \$267,522 from the State school tax and \$42,324 from the free school fund.) This loss of \$50,000 could have been easily met if the conditions had remained permanent. But with the gradual diminution of income from the State there came a gradual increase of necessary expenses, owing to the natural increase of population, and the growing popularity of the public schools.

The number of white children enrolled in the county schools in 1867 was 71,060; in 1887 it was 95,331. In 1867 the average annual salary of a white teacher was \$316. In 1887 it was not quite \$300. In order to make a just comparison it has been necessary to limit the inquiry to white schools, because the colored schools had no aid from the State till the year 1872. In truth the embarrassments of the white schools sprang, indirectly, from the establishment of the colored schools.

In 1872 the General Assembly appropriated the *entire proceeds of the State School tax* (\$525,000 more or less) to the support of the white schools and \$50,000 additional to the colored schools. In 1874 the General Assembly appropriated "whatever sum may be paid into the treasury on account of the levy of the public school tax" to the white schools, and to the colored schools \$100,000. There was no interference with the law and the custom of devoting the whole income of the State school tax to the white schools until the year 1878, when the General Assembly passed an Act requiring the amount set apart for colored schools, the appropriation to the State Normal School, and the expenses of the State Board of Education, amounting in all to \$111,500 to be paid out of the annual proceeds of the State School tax.

The counties, with some exceptions, have done their best to make up the deficiency arising from this diversion of the State school tax, the county school tax having risen from \$335,371 in 1873 to \$457,021 in 1887. But there are indications that the limit whether of ability or of inclination we need not inquire, has been

nearly reached. The school year is growing shorter, the teacher's salary is growing smaller; and the necessary result will be a corresponding deterioration of the public schools. All that is needed is to go back where we were in 1877, devote the whole proceeds of the State school tax to the white schools, and give from the general treasury the same proportion per capita for the support of colored schools. The \$100,000 now given by law to the colored schools is very nearly the proportion of the State school tax and the free school fund to which they would be entitled by a per capita distribution.

The State Board of Education is required by law to give in the Annual Report "such suggestions for the improvement of schools and the advancement of public education as the State Board of Education shall deem expedient." Such suggestions have been made from time to time and have produced some beneficial results. The following recommendations are copied from the Report for 1885, and are submitted to the Legislature with the endorsement of two years' additional experience:

1st. Necessary text-books for use in the school-room should be supplied without charge.

2nd. The State school-tax should be twelve cents on the one hundred dollars, and the minimum county tax should be no less.

3d. The State tax should be distributed to the several counties in proportion to the average enrollment of the pupils, white and colored, no pupil to be counted who has not made an attendance of at least sixty days (or 120 half-days) in the year.

4th. The few remaining county academies should be made a part of the public school system.

5th. There should be but one school district trustee in place of three under the present law.

6th. Every principal of a public school should be required to make a report at least twice a month by postal card to the Examiner, of the condition of his school as regards attendance, etc.

7th. Legal provision should be made for ascertaining accurately once in every two years, in the city of Baltimore, and the several counties, the number of children of school-going age (say over six years and under sixteen,) the number attending public schools, and the number attending private and denominational schools.

The State Board has held the required number of meetings during the year. No subjects of great importance needed attention. The harmony which has prevailed since the organization of the Board in 1872, remains unbroken. It is pleasant also to record that the legal decisions of the Board, though several times before the lower courts and the Court of Appeals for review, have never been reversed.

The General Assembly of Maryland at its last session enacted a law "to provide for teaching the study of Physiology and Hygiene with special instructions as to the nature and effect of alcoholic drinks, stimulants and narcotics upon the human system, in the public schools of the State and Educational Institutions receiving aid from the State;" and inquiries have been made as to whether the law has been complied with. Early in the school year 1886-7, the State Board of Education revised the uniform course of instruction for use in the several county schools, and inserted Physiology among the studies of the fifth and sixth grades of the district schools, and the 7th and 8th grades of the high schools. The result has been that while the number of pupils in the county schools studying Physiology was reported in 1885 as 110, it rose in 1887 to 10,200. At the last annual meeting of the Association of Public School Commissioners this subject was discussed earnestly and intelligently. It was admitted that the full number of pupils contemplated in the law had not yet been reached, but an obstacle was mentioned which had not occurred to those who framed the law. In the majority of counties, parents buy the books which their children need. They have thus an effective veto upon the teacher's wish to form classes in any study. In point

of fact many parents refused to purchase the necessary text books on Physiology, but the teachers in these cases made such compensation as was possible by reading to the school from the text book and giving the needed explanations and questions. It is hoped that the next annual report will show a decided increase in the number of pupils studying Physiology; but the friends of temperance must bear in mind that more is needed than scientific instruction; the conscience must be enlightened and the will strengthened, and for these purposes other forces than legislative enactments must be brought into action. Let us hope that the beginning now made may be like the path of the just, "a shining light that shineth more and more unto the perfect day."

STATE NORMAL SCHOOL.

The average number of students on the roll last year was 290, of whom 250 were on free scholarships, 230 women and 20 men. The law directs that 200 free students shall be received, to be distributed among the several counties and the city of Baltimore, in proportion to their respective representation in the General Assembly. Twenty years ago this gave about two students for each member of the General Assembly; and this ratio has been maintained necessarily, in order to avoid fractions, although it gives admission to 234 students instead of 200. Circumstances occasionally compelled the admission of additional numbers; for it was considered bad policy at the present time to refuse to receive any promising and apparently well qualified young persons who express a wish to be trained as teachers. The school is unable to supply the demand for graduate teachers—especially men—but the doors must hereafter be closed against all except the number required by law (200) unless the General Assembly increases the appropriation. It is manifestly impossible to instruct two hundred and fifty students efficiently at the same expense as two hundred. It may be added

teach in the counties from which they come, would enable the colored schools to obtain a supply of well qualified teachers.

It is sad to state that Mr. John Core, the Principal of this school for the last seven years, after having raised it to a higher standard of numbers, popularity, and efficiency than it had ever before enjoyed, broke down suddenly in health, and was laid down to his last rest within a month from the close of school—a good man called away in the very prime of his vigor and usefulness, devoted to his work, regarded with reverence and admiration by his pupils, enjoying the confidence of his official superiors, and the warm affection and undying remembrance of his personal friends.

The *Maryland Institute for the Promotion of the Mechanic Arts* is an Institution of which the State may well be proud. In the progress of years it has drifted away from the intentions of its founders, but only to adapt itself more perfectly to the spirit of the age and the demands of the present generation. Its scope is now confined to the Library, the commercial school, which is a night school for the study of commercial arithmetic and bookkeeping, the night schools of Art and Design, the Art Day School, and the Saturday classes in Drawing, including a Normal class for the instruction of teachers. In all these departments the Institute has been eminently successful during the past year, but especially in the Night Schools of Art and Design, which are now attended by 481 pupils in three divisions, Free Hand Drawing 132, Mechanical Drawing 204 and Architectural Drawing 138. In addition there are 7 post graduate students. In the Day schools there are 201 students, including 75 in the Saturday class.

The schools which most nearly approach the character and purposes of the Maryland Institute Schools are the Cooper Institute, New York, and the Night Schools of Boston. The Cooper Institute takes in a so much larger range of work that comparison would be

unfair. It was liberally endorsed by its founder and many additions were afterwards made to the foundation; it has had no financial difficulties to contend with; and yet comparing the work done *on the same lines*, the Maryland Institute does not suffer in the comparison. "The five Boston Night Schools," (says the Baltimore American of December 22, 1887,) "are maintained out of the school fund at an annual cost of about \$13,000, while the Normal Art School in which the course is substantially that followed by the day classes at the Maryland Institute" [and of which the present Principal of the Maryland Institute Schools was formerly the Director], "is maintained by the State at an annual expenditure of about \$16,000."

The Maryland Institute receives from the city an annual donation of \$6,000; and from the State \$3,000. If the latter could be raised to \$6,000 in return for the admission of a certain number of students from the counties free of expense for tuition, the benefits of the schools would be more equally distributed throughout the whole State, and the future of the Institute made as secure as human foresight can provide.

INDUSTRIAL EDUCATION.

The question of the hour is, "What part shall a State school system take in what is called *Industrial Education*." The term admits of so many interpretations that it is necessary, at the outset, to determine what is meant by Industrial Education.

1st. There is the Polytechnic School which bears the same relation to the lower grades of industrial training as the University does to the Grammar School. There is nothing of this kind in Maryland,—nothing parallel to the Boston Institute of Technology, or the Stevens Institute of New York. It will come here, however, when it is needed; or rather when the need is felt; and it will be established and supported by individual liberality like the institutions named.

2nd. The Technical School, or school of trades, of which there is no example on this side of the Atlantic. For the best patterns we must look to France and Switzerland. The times are not yet ripe for them in the United States.

3rd. Schools for Manual Training, of which the best example in this country is the Manual Training School of Baltimore city, which is supported entirely by public funds, and forms an integral part of the public school system. It is a High School for the hands, as the City College is a High School for the head. The latter prepares boys for the University, the counting room or the school-master's desk; the other for the carpenter's bench, the pattern maker's shop, the blacksmith's forge, the foundry and the machine shop. Both are preparatory schools. They do not turn out accomplished workmen either on the intellectual or the mechanical side; but they give useful and ample preparation.

Why should there not be (if the people desire it) a Manual Training School in every county where there is a High School or Academy? It may be, in times to come, that we shall see "hand-craft" go hand-in-hand with "rede-craft" in every grade of our public schools; but those times are apparently very far off; and however desirable, are at present unattainable.

4th. There are occupations which encourage industry in connexion with the public schools without any systematic training. The desire to "make something" is strong in the heart of every boy and girl; and when the Examiner of one of the Eastern Shore Counties expressed a wish that each of the pupils should "make something" which should be exhibited in the school-house and afterwards sent to the county Agricultural Fair, there was an exhibit which all the neighbours looked at with wonder, and which formed one of the most popular of the sights at the Fair.

5th. That all girls in the grade of grammar schools should be taught to sew, will hardly be questioned.

That they should be taught also to *cook*, will be admitted in theory, but the practice presents difficulties apparently insuperable at the present time.

There are occupations for children of tender years which the Kindergarden furnishes, but the introduction of the Kindergarden as a component part of the system of the public schools is difficult even in Baltimore and nearly impossible in the rural districts.

A grand experiment in industrial education for the benefit especially of children of working people has been going on in Boston for the last six years in the "North Bennet Street Industrial School." The expenses are borne by private subscriptions, but the School Board gives countenance, aid and encouragement. "For four years classes have been sent from the public schools to the different departments in the North Bennet Street School. They come from ten to twelve in the morning, and from two to four in the afternoon, during five days in the week. The whole number so sent during the last year is 878. Of these 164 have been sent to the carpenter's shop, 142 to the shoe shop, 124 to the printing office, 148 to the department of clay-modelling; and 300 girls will have had a course of twenty lessons in cookery during this school year."

There is yet another class of defectives who need the fostering care of the State, *Feeble Minded Children*. They are more to be pitied than the Deaf Mutes or the Blind; and they are even more dependent on education to prevent them from becoming an annoyance and a grievance than the other classes. That they can be trained and to a certain extent educated has been amply proved. Even idiots have been taught how to take care of themselves and to avoid giving offence to others. The work of training imbeciles is tedious, and it is so costly as to be beyond the means of any except those who are considered well to do. It is an enterprise in which individual liberality might embark with full assurance of an abundant return from the

capital invested ; but if private philanthropy needs encouragement from the State that encouragement should not be withheld.

COLLEGES AND ACADEMIES.

Tables L and M, will show in brief the statistics of these institutions. It is to be regretted that the hope expressed in the last report for the permanent revival of the *Maryland Agricultural College*, has not been realized. The College is still struggling, as it has struggled for many years, under a load of debt, divided counsels and a frequent change of administration. It is not yet too late to retrieve the errors of the past, especially if the help expected from Congress in connexion with the establishment of Agricultural Experiment Stations should be realized.

The Trustees of *Washington College* report "that during the scholastic year, ending on the last Wednesday in June, there were thirty-six scholars in attendance; all the county scholarships being filled by students who received tuition, board, books and stationery free of charge; and in addition to these, five indigent scholars have received free tuition.

"There were no graduates at the last commencement, the policy of the Board being not to force students beyond their grade or capacity, in order to secure a graduating class.

"Prof. Rivers, who has been Principal of the College for thirteen years, resigned his position at the end of the scholastic year, and his place has been filled by the election of Prof. Thomas N. Williams, of Delaware, who comes highly recommended as an instructor and disciplinarian.

"The Board of Visitors has also added a Preparatory Department, and the Faculty now consists of four Professors, all believed to be competent and efficient men."

We learn from the President of the *Western Maryland College* that—

1. "The course of study for girls has been extended to four years by adding a full year comprising studies not previously required of female graduates. In addition, German and Political Economy have been introduced for all graduates.

2. "The work in Physics and Chemistry has been rendered more practical by fitting up a student's Laboratory in which all students are required to spend two hours a week during two terms under the direction of the Professor.

3. "A special course of study has been prepared for those intending to teach, but we aim in that course only to facilitate the preparation for the examination before County Boards.

4. "Music and Painting have been changed from desultory amusements to carefully graded studies, each department taking the student through a four years' progressive course under the care of a resident teacher trained to the specialty.

5. "Great stress has been laid on Physical Culture. We have two fairly well-equipped gymnasiums, one for each sex, and daily exercises are given by an instructor in Calisthenics.

6. "Physical comfort has been sought by the expenditure of some \$12,000, in two new buildings, new furniture, steam heating apparatus, &c., so that we believe our students are as well housed as at home.

7. "All State scholarships keep full and are applied for sometimes a year in advance."

On behalf of *St. John's College*, President Thomas Fell says:—

"This College has made great progress during recent years. The faculty has been thoroughly reorganized and now consists of an excellent body of instructors, all graduates of institutions of high standing. There are now enrolled for the present session (1887-8,) 128 students, of which number sixty-six (66) are in the Collegiate Department, viz: two (2) Post Graduates, five (5) Seniors, thirteen (13) Juniors, eighteen (18)

Sophomores, twenty-eight (28) Freshmen. There are 62 in the Preparatory Department.

"The welfare and comfort of the students have been much improved by the introduction of sound discipline and by the renovation of the buildings and grounds. All the buildings are now heated by steam.

"The College has lately entered into a treaty of reciprocity with Johns Hopkins University, whereby students of the College can pass to the University without undergoing an entrance examination.

"If the Male Normal School of the State were attached to this College, great advantage would result to the Public School System, for it is estimated that at least 50 graduates of St. John's College are now engaged in teaching in the Public Schools. A Male Normal School, which is much needed by the State, could be very readily established here, and with much less expense than if an entirely new school should be created and built."

JOHNS HOPKINS UNIVERSITY.

This Report would be incomplete without some mention of the University, famous even in its youth, which, though it receives no pecuniary aid from the State, is in reality at the head of the public school system. Every year a number of graduates from Baltimore City College join the University classes; several students from the State Normal School have also been admitted; and it is quite within the power of the colleges receiving State aid and even of some of our County High Schools and Academies to prepare students to enter on one of the University courses and pursue it successfully.

During the academic year 1886-87, the Academic Staff of the institution consisted of 51 teachers, 5 of whom were non-resident lecturers. The number of students actually enrolled (December, 1887,) is 397; of these, 199 are graduate students pursuing advanced courses; 126 are undergraduates following one of the

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prescribed college courses, leading to the degree of Bachelor of Arts ; and 72 are special students in various branches.

Geographically the students are distributed as follows : 186 come from Maryland (including 142 residents of Baltimore), and the others come from 36 States of the Union and from 7 foreign countries.

The results of the examinations are made known to each student and are annually communicated to his parents. Records are kept by the several instructors and are reported at stated times to the collective authorities.

During the year courses of lectures were given as heretofore, to which the public were admitted.

A new physical laboratory, with an astronomical dome, was completed and occupied in April, 1887. The chief courses of study pursued during the year are the same as mentioned in the last report of the State Board of Education. Instruction was also given in elocution and in free-hand and mechanical drawing and the use of colors. The Library is constantly increasing in size and value, and at present contains 31,562 volumes, collected at a cost of \$70,000. More than 1,000 periodicals are regularly received, including the publications of all the leading scientific societies of the world.

The report of the Public Schools of Anne Arundel County for the past year is respectfully submitted :

Our School Board is now out of debt, and has been for several years, and we are paying cash for all our expenses. We have built one school-house for colored children in the past year. Under the head of building school-houses, as heretofore, we have set down a payment on account of the large house on Green street, some years since purchased for our schools in Annapolis, which is the final payment.

We are much in want of better school-houses in some of the school districts, especially for the colored population, while our funds will not allow us to supply this want but to a very limited extent in each year.

We are in want of globes, maps, &c., and improvement among our children would be greatly promoted by their having the use of interesting books, other than school books, but in the country, while here and there some movement is made in this direction, most of the districts are entirely without this advantage.

Our white schools were kept open four terms and the colored schools three.

DEAR SIR: The annual report of the Board of County School Commissioners of Caroline County for the scholastic year ending June 30, and the fiscal year ending September 30, is respectfully submitted.

By comparison it will be found that the enrollment of pupils for this year is one-half per cent. greater than for the preceding year, and the average attendance of pupils is twelve per cent. more. It is hardly necessary to add that this fact bespeaks an increased interest on the part of the people in the educational affairs of the county, aroused, no doubt, by the earnestness and efficiency of our teachers. In every endeavor to advance education to a higher plane I have had their hearty co-operation; and whatever progress may have been made in this direction is due largely to their determination to good, honest work. The strenuous efforts put forth by the School Commissioners to obtain a larger levy for school purposes, in order to increase the paltry sum paid to teachers, and to erect needed school buildings, were unsuccessful. In face of the fact that our expenses increase every year, the levy remains the same.

During the year just closed we built four new school-houses—two for the white and two for the colored schools. In the plans of these school-houses we have studiously endeavored to avoid the hygienic errors which we are too apt to fall into in the construction of buildings for school purposes. We have profited by the ideas of our friend and neighbor—Prof. Chap-

lain—who has an enviable reputation as an architect of school buildings.

Three County Teachers' Associations were held with gratifying results. Through the efforts of Prof. C. W. Byrn, a "Teacher's Reading Circle" was formed with thirty-eight members. The object of this Reading Circle is to better qualify the teachers for their work.

The white schools were kept open three and two-fifths terms, and the colored schools two terms.

The annual report of the Public Schools of Carroll County is herewith respectfully submitted.

Since the first appointment of the present School Board, nearly four years ago, the increase in the school-population has necessitated several new districts and an addition of 13 to the number of teachers.

The utter dilapidation of many old school-houses compelled the building of new ones in their places. Much of the school-furniture was also worn out, and had to be replaced with new. As far as possible these wants have been supplied.

During the four years 24 new rooms have been built for white schools and 2 for colored schools, at a cost of about \$14,000. In the same time \$4073.03 have been expended for repairs to old houses still worth repairing, and \$3906.53 for furniture.

Meanwhile our county's portion of the State Free School Fund has shrunk from \$2,627.46 in 1884 to \$2,267.41 in 1886, and to \$1,998.56 in 1887; and our county's portion of the State School Tax in June, 1887, was \$1,000.93 less than usual.

These large but unavoidable draughts, and the unaccountable shrinkage in the state's payments have left the school treasury in a crippled condition. It is useless to conceal the fact that the resources are not sufficient for the demands made upon them. The funds available, at their best, do not suffice to keep the schools open three terms at our present rate of salaries—the lowest in the state—even if there be no extraordinary expenditures for new buildings or furniture. How, then, can they be expected to bear the additional

burdens now laid upon them for these purposes? Some twelve more new rooms are needed, of which several cannot be delayed another year. It is believed that when these shall all have been erected scarcely any necessity will arise for new schoolhouses for many years to come. By careful attention and judicious repairs the furniture, when once renewed, can be kept in order without great outlay at any one time, so that in a year or two the pinching pressure occasioned by these unusual expenses will have measurably passed away.

But how shall the school authorities meet the present demands, and how provide for the increasing necessities from year to year? They are powerless to augment their revenues. There is but one alternative—they must diminish their expenses. There must be more money or less school. It is for the people to say which they prefer.

The County Commissioners this year made an extra appropriation of \$2,000 for building purposes, but the price exacted for even that meagre and temporary relief was the sacrifice of one or part of one term of school. If the annual allowance from the county were raised to \$25,000 (it is now \$21,000), the relief would be permanent and ample for awhile, and need add but little, if anything, to the taxes.

It is idle and ridiculous to boast that we have the lowest tax rate in the state, when at the same time we are obliged to close the schools to get funds for building and furnishing necessary schoolhouses.

DEAR SIR : In transmitting to you an annual report of the schools in our County, we regret to say that we have only been able to keep the schools open for three terms of the present year. This, you will readily understand, was caused by insufficiency of funds, and the unusually large outlay for new school-houses, two of them costing over seven thousand dollars.

We are pleased to say that most of our School Districts are supplied with new houses, built in the best manner, and supplied with the best furniture.

Since 1869 we have built, or paid for, about sixty new houses, and for some time past have furnished all new houses, and some others, with slates instead of black-boards, having found them much superior to either the old wooden or wall black-boards, and we now obtain them very slightly above the cost of those made of wood. The size of most of our houses is 32 by 24, and the slate extends across the whole of one end. All the large and costly houses, such as are in the towns of Port Deposit, Elkton, Chesapeake City, and Cecilton, are new, costing from two to eight thousand dollars.

Almost all the schools are supplied with good furniture.

We are glad to say that the standard of qualification of the teachers is much improved, and they are doing their work with efficiency and success.

We have nothing further to report, except what will be found in the columns of the report.

DEAR SIR: We submit herewith the Annual Report of the Public Schools of Frederick County, for the scholastic year ending June 30th, and the fiscal year ending September 30th, 1887.

It affords me much pleasure to be able to report that many of our teachers realize the importance of raising the standard of teaching, and, in order to accomplish this desirable object, they have, during the past year, purchased over two hundred books on the Science and Methods of Teaching, and subscribed for nearly one hundred school journals.

The order of the State Board of Education, requiring teachers to be examined in the Science and Methods of Teaching, and of classifying certificates according to the manner of the work performed in the school-room, has made our teachers realize the necessity of preparing themselves more fully for the work in which they are engaged. I am glad that the State Board has taken such an important step in the improvement of the Public Schools in the State.

Our Board concurs most heartily with the action of the State Board, and will take measures to enforce the order.

Our financial report shows an indebtedness of \$4,768.17, which is less than that of last year, and which would have been still more reduced but for the shortage of the State School Tax and the Free School Fund, which deficiency for Frederick County amounted to nearly \$2,000. During the year four new school-houses have been built, viz., one brick and three frame houses, at a cost of over \$3,000.

The Examiner paid during the year 275 official visits.

The report of the Public Schools of Harford County is respectfully submitted. The enrolment during the year just closed was a little less than last year, but notwithstanding a smaller enrolment, the average attendance was increased nearly two hundred.

There is one fact to which we point with pride, and that is the solid financial foundation of our school system here. We have, for the second time, gone entirely through the year without borrowing money and without paying one dollar as interest, except to collectors for advanced quarterly payments. This, until last year, has been unknown here during our present system. There are other counties which pay higher salaries, but there are few that are more prompt in meeting their obligations.

DEAR SIR: I enclose to-day the annual report of the Public Schools of Prince George County.

I will briefly explain a few entries in the accompanying tables that may not otherwise be understood.

The large amount charged for books and stationery is due to the liquidation of a debt of nearly eight hundred dollars left by the late Board of Commissioners.

The present Board has lost nothing in handling books; the receipt from sale of books by teachers and small stock on hand more than account for the outlay for that purpose. School children have been supplied with books and stationery strictly at wholesale prices.

The Board owes only seventeen hundred dollars, which is the balance due bank (on note made) by late Board of Commissioners. Against this note the bank has county script for seven hundred dollars, which will revert to the schools when note is paid.

The schools last year lost less time than ever before in the history of the county, and did fair work.

The condition of school affairs in this county is moderately good, and I admit there is plenty of room for improvement.

The Board, in session to-day, endorsed the recent order passed by the State Board, requiring Examiners to grade teachers' certificates by his or her efficiency in the school-room.

We have built an addition to Female School No. 9, District No. 3, at an expense of over two thousand dollars, and a new house at school No. 9, District No. 1, at an expense of nearly nine hundred dollars, both paid for at this date (October 15, 1887).

Our schools were open the full year, and are in good working condition.

The financial condition of the Board is good.

DEAR SIR: I send you herewith report of the public schools of Somerset County for the year ending September 30, 1887. I am glad to report their continued and growing efficiency. Several new schools have been established, and the school-houses in many districts improved. Circumstances have prevented me from making as many official visits as usual, but in all I have endeavored to make such investigations and examinations as would secure the best results in grading, interest and study. Our teachers are evincing more than usual interest in their work, as is shown by the number who are subscribers to teachers' journals, and who attend our Teachers' Associations. Both white and colored associations are in successful operation. Great trouble has been experienced in the past in securing competent colored teachers, and to remedy it last summer we organized a colored normal class, under the direction of Mr. B. O. Bird, of the Delaware Conference Academy, with an attendance of eighteen pupils. The session lasted seven weeks, and the course of study included all the branches that are required for teachers' certificates. The school will be continued next summer.

To Prof. M. A. Newell:

The facts in relation to our schools are substantially the same as last year. We are out of debt, though unable to run our schools longer than nine months for the school year 1887-88. Unless the levy for public school purposes is increased by the next Legislature, and the money applied for the purpose intended, it will be impossible to run our schools longer than nine months in any year. If the amount levied for the white schools was applied to the schools as intended, and there had been no *diversion*, there would be no reason to ask or desire an increase of the present levy; but the amount allotted the colored schools (\$100,000) is not, nor ever was, sufficient for said schools. These facts induced the Board to prepare a petition to the next General Assembly, a copy of which is appended, requesting an additional appropriation for the colored schools. The petitions were placed in the hands of persons supposed to be favorable to the measure to secure signatures. These will be forwarded in due time, and it is hoped will have the effect to secure the increased appropriation asked.

TO THE HONORABLE, THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
AND HIS EXCELLENCY,..... GOVERNOR OF MARYLAND.

WHEREAS, The number of colored schools for St. Mary's county is inadequate for the colored public educational interest of the county, and whereas, there are but nineteen colored schools, the superficial area of St. Mary's being, in round numbers, three hundred square miles, with numerous tributaries from the Patuxent and Potomac Rivers, and the Chesapeake Bay, and whereas, the portion of the present appropriation allotted to St. Mary's for the support of the colored schools will hardly maintain the

present number, and whereas, we believe this state of affairs exists in many counties of Maryland, and whereas, the county allowances are only to the white schools, and whereas, any transfer of any portion of the county allowances from the white to the colored schools would be to the detriment of the white schools, and greatly impair their usefulness and success, and whereas, by the census of 1880 the colored population is to the white as *two* to *seven*, while the appropriation to the colored schools is to the appropriation to the white schools as 1 to 12, and whereas, as is shown by financial exhibits, the financial standing of the State is good, and the increased appropriation herein asked, would not be felt; we, the undersigned citizens of St. Mary's county, and other portions of Maryland, do respectfully petition you, the Honorable General Assembly of Maryland of 1888, and His Excellency, the Governor of Maryland, to increase the appropriation for the colored schools to \$150,000 (now \$100,000), because of the great need of more and better colored schools, the ability of the State to afford the relief asked, and the justice and the great good to result to the entire people, and we shall ever petition, &c.

DEAR SIR: The annual report of the Board of County School Commissioners of Talbot County for the scholastic year ending June 30, 1887, and the fiscal year ending September 30, 1887, is herewith respectfully submitted.

We are still active in the matter of building *good* school-houses, which are indispensable to the very existence of *good* schools. Four school-houses were built during the year, costing \$5,262.66, exclusive of furniture. The progressive impulse of school architecture is developing the general taste of our people, and they demand each successive year better school-houses to meet the requirements of advanced educational ideas.

A member of the State Board of Health has been in communication with me concerning a sanitary survey of the school-houses in Maryland, as suggested by me in my last annual report, and my last reply was as follows:

"In the proposed 'Sanitary Survey of the Public School-Houses in Maryland,' it will be easy, I think, to enlist the prompt and cheerful co-operation of all the county Examiners, trustees and teachers.

"In preparing your questions, I would suggest that they be directed especially toward the *surroundings* of the school-houses, the *ventilation*, the *heating*, the *location* of *windows*, the material, location, and surface character of *blackboards*, the *water supply*, the *water-closets*, *vaccination* and *dangerous diseases*.

“We need practical and simple rules for avoiding hygienic errors in connection with our public schools. The ‘sanitary survey’ will disclose to you the nature and extent of those errors. I am sure that your zeal for the public service directs you to rely upon practical efforts for popularizing your work as health officers, and in bringing that work into contact with the people. Push forward the ‘sanitary survey,’ and you will not only demonstrate your ability to do for the State good hygienic work, but also the value to the people of our State Board of Health.”

On behalf of our teachers and school officers, I extend cordial thanks to the principal of our State Normal School, and the lady teachers from the same school, for their valuable aid and instruction at our Teachers’ Institute, which was opened on the 31st day of last August.

The Normal Institute for Colored Teachers was kept open for six weeks immediately after the close of the schools for the summer vacation, and had a good attendance of teachers and persons wishing to prepare themselves for teaching.

DEAR SIR: We submit herewith the report of the public schools of Washington County for the year ending September 30, 1887.

The statistics show an increase in enrollment, compared with the enrollment last year, of 226, and an increase in average attendance of 190. Nine additional teachers were employed during the year, eight of whom were placed in the new building in Hagerstown, which was completed about November 1, 1886.

In our financial statement we report \$6,069.36 as expended on new buildings. It is proper to say that that sum was expended upon buildings which were in course of erection at the date of my report for 1886, but were not then completed. We have built no new houses in the current calendar year.

We have nothing special to report in school work. The attendance at the opening, September 1, was quite up to the mark and has since been well sustained.

The employment of additional teachers without any corresponding increase in the levy, and with a falling off in the State revenues, has caused a considerable floating debt, which, by economical management, we hope to reduce to a great extent during the current school year.

The annual report of the School Board of Wicomico County is herewith submitted. The report shows a balance in hand of \$504.10. This, however, does not show our real condition. At the close of the year we had under way, and in fact, about completed, our high school building in Salisbury, which will cost about \$7,000. It will be seen by the report that less than \$4,000 of this amount is paid. The condition of our finances (caused by the fire of October, 1886) was laid before the County Commissioners last June and favorably considered; and they, acting under the suggestion of our Board, decided to adopt the plan of levying an additional \$1,000 annually to pay off this indebtedness. In addition to this \$1,000 the County Commissioners have for the last two years levied \$1,000 to be expended in the erection of district school-houses.

We are still annoyed by the irregularity in the amounts of the quarterly distributions of the State tax.

In your annual report of 1886 are two suggestions to which I desire you to call the attention of the Legislature in your forthcoming report: The levying of 2 cents additional State tax and the adoption of the "free-book" system.

The colored schools of the county do not seem to have produced satisfactory results on account of the inability in many instances to procure suitable teachers. There is a noticeable fact that the average attendance in these schools is not as great as it was ten years ago, although the enrollment is 12 to 15 per cent greater.

STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The following classification and schedule of studies shall be observed in all Primary Schools and in those classes of graded and High Schools to which they are applicable :

FIRST GRADE.

1. Reading and spelling from chart or blackboard; reading and spelling Primer, or one-half of First Reader. 2. Writing and printing capitals and small letters from copies on blackboard. 3. Counting objects as far as 20. 4. Writing figures as far as 20. 5. Adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing by 2, orally, as far as 20. 6. *Drawing*. 7. *Object lessons*. 8. *Singing*.

SECOND.

1. Reading and spelling to the end of First Reader. 2. Writing words and sentences from blackboard and from First Reader. 3. Counting as far as 100. 4. Writing and reading figures as far as 1,000. 5. Adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing by 3, 4 and 5, as far as 100. 6. *Drawing*. 7. *Object lessons*. 8. *Singing*.

THIRD.

1. Reading and spelling to the end of Second Reader. 2. Copying on slates the lessons of the Reader. 3. Spelling, one-half of Primary Spelling Book. 4. Writing and reading figures as far as millions. 5. Adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing by 6, 7, 8 and 9. 6. Writing in Copy-Book, No. 1. 7. Oral lessons in Geography, including the Maps of Maryland and the United States. 8. *Drawing*. 9. *Object lessons*. 10. *Singing*.

FOURTH.

1. Reading and spelling to the end of Third Reader. 2. Primary Spelling Book completed. 3. Copying of lessons in Third Reader; Reading from slates the lessons copied. 4. Elementary Arithmetic, through Long Division and United States money. 5. Writing—Copy-Book No. 2. 6. Geography—Oral Lessons—Maps of North and South America. 7. Grammar—Oral Lessons—distinguishing the parts of speech and the

different kinds of simple sentences. 8. *Drawing*. 9. *Object lessons*. 10. *Singing*.

FIFTH.

1. Reading and spelling to the end of the Fourth Reader. 2. Writing Lessons in Fourth Reader from Dictation. 3. Spelling—Advanced—Spelling Book—one-half. 4. Elementary Arithmetic, completed. 5. Writing—Copy-Books Nos. 3 and 4. 6. Grammar—Oral Lessons—Parsing and Analysis of easy sentences. 7. Geography—one-half of Intermediate Geography. 8. Physiology—one-half of *Dulany's Standard Elementary*. 9. *Drawing*. 10. *Singing*. 11. *Needle-work* (for girls) and *Domestic Economy*.

SIXTH.

1. Reading and spelling to end of Fifth Reader, alternate with History of the United States. 2. Spelling—Advanced Spelling Book completed. 3. Practical Arithmetic completed. 4. Writing—Copy-Books Nos. 5 and 6. 5. Grammar—Elementary Grammar completed. 6. Geography—"Intermediate" completed. 7. Easy lessons in composition. 8. Physiology completed. 9. *Drawing*. 10. *Singing*. 11. *Needle-work* and *Domestic Economy* (for girls).

 Subjects in *italics* are recommended, but are not obligatory.

TIME TABLE.

Each grade may have four daily recitations as follows:

1st,	one lesson of 15 minutes and 3 of 10 minutes each—	45 minutes.
2d,	" " " " " "	—45 "
3d,	" " " " " "	—45 "
4th,	two lessons of 15 minutes each and 2 of 10. " "	—50 "
5th,	" " " " " "	—50 "
6th,	one lesson of 20 minutes and 3 of 15 minutes each—	65 "

The available portion of the remaining hour, and the time that may be gained by the absence of all pupils in any grade, may be spent in general exercises, or in studies above the sixth grade, when there are pupils sufficiently advanced.

HIGH SCHOOLS.

The following schedule of studies is recommended for adoption in High Schools and the higher classes of graded schools.

SEVENTH.

1. Arithmetic reviewed. 2. Algebra (Wentworth's or Robinson's) through Equations of the first degree. 3. Geometry (two books of Wentworth, or an equivalent)—Geometrical Drawing. 4. Physical Geography. 5. English Grammar—Morris's "Elementary Lessons"—Parsing and Analysis of "Paradise Lost," Book 1. 6. Practical exercises in Composition. 7. English History—Green's "Short History." 8. Latin Grammar

and Reader. 9. Book-keeping. 10. Physiology—(Dulany-Martin's Human Body.)

EIGHTH.

1. Algebra through Equations of the Second Degree, and Progressions. 2. Geometry, Plane and Solid, completed. 3. Natural Philosophy. 4. Rhetoric. 5. Modern History. 6. Latin—Cæsar "De Bello Gallico," three books. 7. Physiology, completed.

NINTH.

1. Plane Trigonometry and Surveying. 2. Chemistry. 3. Botany. 4. History of Rome. 5. English Literature (Shaw's). 6. English Language (Lounsbury). 7. Elocution. 8. Latin—Virgil's *Æneid*—four books; Sallust—"The Conspiracy of Catiline."
