To the Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

SIR:—I have the honor to submit my Annual Report for the fiscal year, beginning October 1, 1894, and ending September 30, 1895.

But few changes have taken place in the organization of the State troops. A few companies that were entirely inefficient were disbanded; no new companies were organized. Had it been deemed advisable to increase the force of the Maryland National Guard, it would not have been possible, owing to the want of funds, depleted by the heavy expenses of the strike of 1894 to such an extent that it will be impossible to pay the current expenses of the troops and other necessary expenses of equipment, etc., for the year ending the 30th of September, 1896. But at present, and in the present condition of the State to make military appropriations, it seems to me that the present organization will be large enough when it is practicable to complete the quota of the three regiments. I repeat what I have said before, that it is better to keep the present force in serviceable condition for active duty than to have more companies but half armed and equipped. The troops now are in such condition that a continuation of the present appropriation—after providing for the unexpected expenses of the strike—ought to suffice to put the National Guard in a few years on excellent footing for any service that may be required of them. I have not forgotten that we ought to have a troop of horse, and either a battery of artillery or some effective rapid-firing guns attached to the Guard. Whether this can be accomplished

and the efficiency of the infantry troops maintained by the present annual appropriation, is questionable.

The Reports of the Brigade and Regimental Commanders will show what movements of the troops have taken place during the year. There was of necessity—want of funds—no encampment of the Brigade during the year. The Fifth Regiment, by permission, and at its own cost, had an encampment of ten days at Cape May. The Reports of the Brigade Commander and the Colonel of the Regiment give satisfactory account of the results of that encampment; but no good result from it has changed my conviction that no portion of the State Guard should be permitted to hold an encampment outside of the State. On State soil is the place for an encampment of State troops, and it is not conducive to discipline or efficiency to disregard this rule.

The Maryland Naval Militia has, by the unaided exertions of its officers and seamen, made great advances during the last year, and has already become a useful part of the State's defense force. I refer to the interesting report of the Commander. The Battalion, although yet small, is evidently composed of excellent material; it is well uniformed and armed both for infantry and marine service. In addition to semi-serviceable Springfield rifles, it has three Driggs-Schroeder rapid-firing guns, 1 pdr., and also has borrowed of the United States Navy Department another rapid-firing gun, 1 pdr., and two 3-inch brass howitzers. The United States Government, at the request of the Governor, has loaned it the U. S. S. "Dale," with an equipment of four small boats and a steam launch. It has also an organized signal corps.

For the expenses of the formation and maintenance of this desirable organization, the State so far has appropriated nothing. Up to this time it has been asked for no appropriation. The heavy expense of starting and maintaining the Naval Reserve has been borne entirely by its Commander, officers and seamen, with the encouragement of the Navy Department. Of course this cannot continue. Now that it

is upon a most serviceable footing, the Battalion must have State help, if it is to continue its existence. It must have, in case of need, a valuable force, and as the State Guard has no artillery, the rapid firing guns of the Naval Reserve might be invaluable in an emergency. For its better organization and government a Bill will be laid before the Legislature providing laws similar to those in other States. The law under which it was organized is such a skeleton that it is little better than none.

It is necessary to call your attention, and the attention of the Legislature, to the condition of the finances of the Maryland National Guard. The strike of 1894 cost the State about \$58,000, and this has been taken from the two years' appropriation made for the State Militia, and has crippled it. Of course it is not pretended that the annual appropriation made to keep the State troops equipped and pay their current expenses was ever intended to be used for the expenses of a war or the extraordinary emergency of a strike. But the expenses must needs be paid, and as there was no other fund available for their payment, the Governor very properly determined to use all the National Guard money that was subject to the warrant of the Adjutant General to pay them, and, in addition, borrowed \$25,000 upon the faith of the appropriation due the 1st of October, 1894, and paid off the whole debt. Of this sum of \$58,000 which has been taken out of the Militia appropriation for the fiscal years of 1894, and 1895, about, or nearly, \$30,000 of it would have been expended for the State encampment, which was to have been held in July, 1894. Letting that go to the expenses of the strike instead of an encampment, there is still an absolute deficit of \$28,000 on the appropriation for the two years. The result is, this office will be heavily in debt at the end of this fiscal year, unless that deficit is made good by the Legislature. There will not be money enough to pay the current expenses of the troops. I was compelled to take out of the appropriation now running, the money necessary to pay the current expenses of the Guard, from

April 1 to October 1, 1895. This should have been paid out of the appropriation included in this report, but, as will be seen, there was, on the 1st October, when the expenses I speak of were payable, only \$76.45 left of the fund to pay them with, and it was necessary to use the appropriation of the following year to meet them. There was besides other heavy indebtedness for uniforms, equipments, etc., which were necessarily incurred and could not be paid. There should, therefore, be a special appropriation refunding to the National Guard, as it were, the money it has paid out of its own fund to maintain the credit of the State. I have said this is \$28,000, but by the exercise of strict and compulsory economy in sundry directions, several thousand dollars have otherwise been saved; and, I believe, if the Legislature will make a special appropriation of \$25,000 it will put the National Guard in about the position it would have been had not the strike of 1894 depleted its treasury.

On this subject I will quote what I said in my last Annual Report:

"The strike cost the State about \$58,000, about as much as two encampments would cost. That the service to the troops was equal to two encampments is hardly disputable. The utmost economy was used in the expenditures consistent with circumstances and the surroundings. But the large sum taken from the two appropriations will seriously cripple the Adjutant General's Department until the Legislature meets and has an opportunity to reimburse it. Further improvement of the Guard in its arms and equipment will be stopped to the detriment of the service. Such duty and camp life as they had at Frostburg were hard on uniforms and many of the old ones were rendered unfit for further wear; yet there will be no money to supply them. We need more arms and equipments; these we may be able to get from the General Government after next June, to a limited extent. If the Legislature met this winter, with the services of the troops fresh in their memory, there would be little difficulty in inducing them to

come promptly and liberally to the relief of the State Guard. It is to be hoped, that a year of waiting will not dull their recollection or their appreciation. Whatever may be said of the success or failure of the troops of other states during the disturbances of 1894, the record of the Maryland National Guard merits the admiration and gratitude of its own people, as it has received unstinted praise from the watchful military critics of other States."

While the Guard is in such condition of *morale*, discipline and organization, as to make it a great credit to the State, there is yet much needed, as will more fully appear from the reports of the Brigade and Regimental Commanders, to complete its satisfactory military equipment. Guns are needed; there is not a regiment that has enough to arm its enlisted men; equipments, knapsacks, canteens, haversacks and much camp equipment are needed. Some of these can be obtained from the General Government, and some would have been supplied but for the demands of the strike of 1894.

Yet with the special appropriation referred to, and the same annual appropriation, the National Guard has received of late years, there is no reason, unless some expensive emergency arises, why the State troops should not, in a few years, be so fully armed and equipped as to be ready, on call, for any duty which may be required for the "peace, government and dignity of the State."

EXTRACTS FROM ANNUAL REPORT

— OF —

Brig. General Stewart Brown.

HEADQUARTERS, BALTIMORE, October 15, 1895.

*To Major General Hy. Kyd Douglas,
Adjutant General:*

GENERAL:—I have the honor, as required by standing orders from A. G. C. to submit to the Governor as Commander-in-Chief this Report of the condition and operations of my Brigade, during the year ending October 1, 1895; and as invited also by said order, I submit some "suggestions to promote its efficiency."

Rosters and returns of property of each sub-division of the Brigade, made up under orders from these Headquarters, for A. G. O., give the strength of each command, on said date, and, likewise, full particulars as to all equipment and public property of every kind on hand and its condition.

I crave leave also to refer to the separate reports of the commanding officers of the respective organizations, of the operations of their commands which are herewith transmitted.

These reports give in detail the occasions and number of times and portions of said commands under arms at any parade or public ceremony, and they show about the usual number of such parades in the city.

The First Regiment has not been brought together during the year, there being no opportunity, occasion or money there-

for, and the Brigade as a whole, has not been ordered out during that time.

Operations have as a rule been confined to the usual routine of inspections, drills and parades in public or in the armories, and these have been carried on with commendable regularity and spirit.

The chief exception to this, however, was the volunteer camp of the 5th Regiment at Cape May for 10 days, at the expense of the officers and men. This camp was inspected and the troops reviewed at different dates, first by the Brigadier and afterwards by the Governor. As a camp of instruction, and as keeping up the spirit and interest of that fine command, the result has undoubtedly been beneficial.

As a result of my own close observation, and the reports of the Brigade Inspector and of the commanding officers of the different bodies, I have the pleasure to report that, so far as regards its personnel (officers and men), its organization, state of discipline and tactical and practical instruction and its *esprit du corps*, the command is in a highly satisfactory and efficient condition (never better). All companies, not up to standard on inspection, have, on recommendation from these headquarters, been disbanded, and the Brigade, as it stands, consists of three regiments: the 1st of nine companies, the 4th of nine companies, and the 5th of twelve companies, all divided into nine battalions, together with the Monumental City Guards, an independent colored company.

I respectfully renew the recommendation of my last report, that each regiment be provided with a full camp equipment, together with haversacks and canteens, available on any emergency, and I urge that the declared purpose of the executive to provide these essentials out of the United States appropriation be promptly carried into effect.

I respectfully renew my recommendation that a sufficient fund (quite small, say \$1,000 each time) be applied, spring and fall, to bringing the whole Brigade together for field manœuvres on an extended scale. The money would be needed for trans-

portation and keep of the 1st Regiment. In no other way, except at camp, can this regiment be brought together, and the exercises would be of incalculable benefit to the entire Brigade.

I call special attention to Col. Howard's report as to the signal corps attached to his Regiment, which should be encouraged, and to his request that the gatling gun (of antiquated pattern and calibre 50,) now in use by his efficient gun attachment, be exchanged for a Hotchkiss 2 pdr. rapid-firing gun and caisson complete. Indeed, if each Regiment had two, or even one, of these pieces, its sufficiency for service would be greatly increased. I am informed that this could be done at inconsiderable expense, and I recommend that it be done, if possible.

The Brigade consists of thirty-one companies, divided as above mentioned. I would deprecate any increase of this force, except to fill up the 1st and 4th Regiments to the full complement of twelve companies. This I would like to see done, and at once. But such companies should not be authorized or recruited, except in close connection with the said Regiments and only subject to the approval in every respect of the commanding officers thereof.

If these Regiments were filled up and equipped with small field pieces, as above said, the addition of a company or small Battalion of Cavalry (after the needs of the troops now in service are provided for,) would give a complete and satisfactory establishment.

4th Regiment.

HEADQUARTERS FOURTH REGIMENT OF INFANTRY, M. N. G.

BALTIMORE, Sept. 30, 1895.

Adjutant General First Brigade M. N. G.,

Baltimore, Md.

SIR:—In compliance with G. O. 5, A. G. C., series 1894, I have the honor to report as follows concerning the operations of this Regiment, during the year ending September 30, 1895.

From September 30, 1895, drills were continued weekly without intermission until June 14, 1895, when they were suspended by orders from these Headquarters. At the time of the closing of the drill season, the Regiment had reached a high degree of efficiency and discipline.

On three occasions only, during the past year, has the Regiment, or any part thereof, participated in a public parade.

The Second Battalion, Major George T. Robinson, commanding, assembled for instruction and practice in Extended Order Drill, at Clifton Park, Thursday, November 29th. The movements were all well executed, showing knowledge of the work in hand, on the part of the officers and on the part of the men, much interest and a commendable desire to learn.

In response to an invitation tendered by the Baltimore Centennial Association, this Regiment paraded April 15th, as escort, the occasion being that of flag raising at Clifton Park, celebrating the selection of said park as the site for the Centennial Exposition to be held in this city in 1897.

On July 4th, in response to an invitation received from the citizens of Hagerstown, Md., the Second Battalion, Major T. Robinson commanding, having received the necessary permission, proceeded to that city, and assisted in celebrating the day; one attractive feature being a "sham battle," in which the Battalion showed to excellent advantage, the officers and men demonstrating, in the presence of a large gathering of citizens and many military officers, their knowledge of, and efficiency in Extended Order Drill.

The first opportunity for small arms firing practice was afforded the officers and men of this Regiment through the courtesy of Major George B. Rodney, commanding Fort McHenry, who tendered the use of the rifle range at that post to the Regiment three days in each week from November 1st to December 31st.

The interest displayed by the members of this Regiment in this new duty, their eagerness to avail themselves of even the limited opportunities afforded, and their great desire to excel, was extremely gratifying.

During the past year, as in years before, the progress of the Regiment has been greatly retarded through insufficient accommodations for the quartering and drilling of officers and men and for the safe and proper storage of uniforms, and State and Regimental property.

In October, 1893, an ordinance was passed by both branches of the City Council and subsequently signed by His Honor the Mayor, assigning to the Fourth Regiment the use of the Western Female High School building for an armory, when vacated by the city for school purposes.

Fortunately, in the early part of the present month the building on West Baltimore street, formerly known as the "Newton Academy," was offered for rent, and was at once secured for an armory, to be held until the building now known as the Western Female High School building shall be ready for occupancy by this Regiment. To the "Newton Academy" building or West Armory, has been transferred regimental

ordnance and ordnance stores not in use by that portion of the command stationed at East Armory.

While the new quarters, officially termed West Armory, are not, in many respects, suitable for an armory, lacking, as they do, sufficient room for either battalion or company drills, and roomy quarters for the men, still they afford such shelter and comfort to the men and protection to property as never before enjoyed by these companies.

Under the influence of new and comfortable quarters and better accommodations for the men, the Colonel commanding feels assured that enlistments will be greatly stimulated, and that the superior and desirable class of young men now composing the various companies will be greatly augmented by others of their class who will readily give their services to the State.

I have the honor to call your attention to the efficiency of the Gun Detachment, the members of which are constantly laboring with a zeal and energy deserving of the greatest praise and encouragement, and I earnestly recommend that authority be given for the exchange of the Gatling gun now in use for a Hotchkiss, 2 pdr. rapid firing gun and caissons complete. It has been demonstrated that these guns excel all others for street riot purposes.

Your attention is also respectfully called to the Signal Corps raised and nurtured by this Regiment.

A Signal Corps is not properly a part of a Regiment, still, through efforts of this command, experienced telegraphers have been brought into the Regiment through love of this service who never would have joined the Guard in any other capacity. While the Corps had not reached that degree of efficiency at Frostburg, which it at present enjoys, still its value in time of need was clearly demonstrated on that occasion. The members of the Corps are constant and zealous workers and are striving always to reach the highest point of excellence.

I have the honor to recommend that this Corps be furnished with such equipments as may be necessary to meet the requirements of this arm of the service.

The Colonel commanding respectfully calls your attention to the lack of rifles which still exists in this Regiment.

Since its organization, but one company has been supplied with 60 rifles, and one with an average membership of 55 men, since its organization, has never been furnished with more than thirty.

HEADQUARTERS, 5TH REGIMENT I. M. N. G.,

BALTIMORE, MD., Oct. 1, 1895.

To the Asst. Adjutant General, 1st Regiment M. N. G.:

SIR:—In obedience to G. O., No. 4, Brigade Headquarters, 1895, dated September 17th, I have the honor to make the following report of the operations of the 5th Regiment I. M. N. G., for the year ending this date.

The command of the Regiment devolved on me (by the resignation of Col. W. A. Boykin, on January 5, 1895), as Lieutenant Colonel; and I was commissioned Colonel, March 19, 1895.

Company drills have been held regularly each day of each week, except Saturday.

Each of the three Battalions have been drilled in battalion movements on separate nights.

School of instruction has been held on the third Saturday of each month for all the officers, conducted by the Commandant.

April 28th the Regiment attended the funeral of Captain Robert P. Brown, of Company C., his Company acting as escort; and he was buried with full military honors.

May 10, 1895, the 28th Anniversary of the Regiment was celebrated by a march (in fatigue uniform), to and from Clif-

ton Park (four miles), where each Major drilled his Battalion in those movements which cannot be used in the armory owing to want of space. Then followed a Regimental drill (first time under the new Drill Regulations).

May 28, 1895, Regimental Parade was had at the Armory, following which his Honor, Mayor Latrobe, presented the "Crosses of Honor" for long and faithful service, to those officers and men who had served 9, 15, 21 and 25 years in the Regiment.

Afterward Brigadier-General Stewart Brown presented badges and buttons won by officers and men at target practice during the year at Fort McHenry.

July 10, 1895, by permission of the Governor and Commander-in-Chief, the Regiment left by B. & O. R. R. for Cape May, N. J., and remained 10 days in Camp Zollinger.

The men were each morning instructed in the "setting up" exercises. Battalion drills, followed by a Regimental drill, were held each morning, lasting one hour and a half, and a Regimental parade was held each evening.

The camp was visited by Brigadier-General Brown, and the regiment was reviewed by him and his staff.

The Governor and Commander-in-Chief also visited the camp on several days, and the Regiment was reviewed by him and his staff. Rifle ranges were erected at 100, 200, 300 and 500 yards, and every man was required to fire 10 shots under instruction of his Company officers and the Inspector of Rifle Practice. Two companies being ordered for this duty each day, each man was taught to load, sight, fire, and clean his rifle.

The Regiment returned to Baltimore July 21, 1895, and drills were suspended till October 2, 1895.

Commanding First Brigade M. N. G.:*

SIR:—In obedience to General Order No. 4, I have the honor to report that my Command, the Monumental City Guards I. M. N. G., have done remarkably good work this past year. The drills have been attended with more promptness than the previous year, owing to the fact that the Company has been supplied with everything that is actually necessary for services. I have had several parades during the year, and have had instructions for officers once every month; have had one outing on last Thanksgiving Day, which was held at Walbrook. A sham battle was fought; the Company was divided, and a lively battle was fought, at which time all of the movements of a Company alone was gone through with precision. In my opinion all of the City troops should have some place appropriated for target practice. And it should be compulsory on every member of the National Guards to shoot, as much so as it is for him to attend his drill. I must say, for my Company, I don't believe I have a man that is afraid of his piece when it is loaded with blank cartridges, but when it is loaded with ball cartridge I cannot say much for it as it has been sometime since we have had target practice, as a suitable place cannot be secured for such practice. I have tried as near as possible to carry out the law, as laid down, to the letter, and I have no trouble with the soldiers, as they all seem to be willing and ever ready when called on to discharge every duty willingly.

Report of Commander I. E. Emerson.

HEADQUARTERS FIRST NAVAL BATTALION, STATE OF MARY-
LAND, U. S. N. R. S. "DALE,"

BALTIMORE, Nov. 1, 1895.

To the Adjutant General:

SIR:—In pursuance of your order I have the honor of submitting herewith my first annual report of the First Naval Battalion, State of Maryland.

The Battalion consists of three divisions, with a total active membership of 145 seamen, 29 petty officers, 2 warrant officers and 14 commissioned officers of line and staff.

The command, when serving as infantry, either independently or as support for the artillery sections, is equipped with 50 caliber Springfield rifles; when serving as artillery it is equipped with Drigg-Schroeder rapid-firing guns and 38-caliber Colt's revolvers. A complete schedule of the arms and equipment, and the sources from which they were obtained, is hereto attached.

The command is uniformed with the regulation naval uniform of the U. S. Navy, and a slight but easily distinguishable mark is placed upon each uniform to distinguish this branch of the service from the regular service. The seamen and petty officers wear on their cap ribbons "U. S. N. R. S. Dale," and the warrant and commissioned officers wear on their cap and collar of coat, in addition to the insignia of rank and service, the shield of the State of Maryland. Each seaman is furnished without cost, regulation blue flannel uniform, white

duck uniform, for inspection, quarters, &c., and a white working suit.

As no financial aid has been received from the city of Baltimore or the State, these uniforms, the care of the ship and equipment, are paid for from private sources almost entirely within the reserve.

Battalion drills are held each month, and oftener when deemed necessary. Each division has a weekly divisional drill, except in the week in which battalion drills are held. The command is frequently drilled and receives instruction in infantry work, but during the past year, special attention has been given to boat drill and infantry drill, and I am pleased to be able to report excellent work done in both. Seamanship has also received special attention, and a large part of the winter work will be devoted to this instruction.

The U. S. Government through the State has loaned us the U. S. S. "Dale," with an equipment of four small boats and a steam launch.

Many boat drills have been given, and much boat work done during the year, both with small boats of the "Dale" and with steam and sail yachts, placed at the disposal of the battalion of myself. The "Dale" is moored in Spring Gardens, a branch of the Patapsco river, where complete facilities are at hand for boat drills and instruction in boat work. During the past summer, extended trips in charge of a commissioned officer, were taken each week, by different detachments of men, upon the Chesapeake bay and its tributaries. These trips were a source of pleasure and proved highly instructive to the men.

The Signal Corps is well organized, and is doing creditable work. We are establishing a chain of signal stations at convenient points in the approaches of our harbor, and by this means can be of valuable assistance in transmitting information to the regiments on shore.

The command has had but one parade during the year, owing to lack of funds for that purpose. The command, independently of other organizations, paraded as a battalion of

artillery on its annual parade day September 12, 1895. On June 17, 1895, Assistant Secretary of Navy, McAdoo, accompanied by his aides, Lieutenants W. F. Schultz and A. P. Niblack, arrived on board the dispatch boat "Dolphin" on their tour of inspection. The ship, its equipment, the men at quarters and in artillery drill, were inspected, and Mr. McAdoo expressed himself as pleased at the very creditable showing made.

In pursuance of an order from the Adjutant General, I assembled my command aboard ship on Saturday, June 29, 1895, and proceeded to an anchorage about one half a mile from the beach at Tolchester. On Monday July 8th, the "Dale" was towed back to Baltimore. The conduct of the officers and men during the evening of July 4th was exceedingly gratifying. When ordered in the life boats to go to the rescue of life and property, though at night, after an arduous day's work and in a fierce gale of wind, not a murmur was heard, and I am assured that their prompt and brave response to the call of duty saved valuable lives and property. I trust, I feel assured, that whenever country or humanity needs their services, their response will be as prompt and as efficient. The expense of the cruise and other expenses were such that the organization has been compelled to go in debt, and to curtail the work originally mapped out. In addition to the lack of funds for the proper prosecution of its work, much inconvenience and much trouble has been caused by a lack of proper legislation. I earnestly request that you recommend to the Legislature the passage of a law similar to the present law governing the National Guard, for the government of the Naval Reserve. I find that it will be impossible to continue the Reserve in its present state of efficiency without substantial aid from the State. The loss of the Naval Reserve would be a serious blow to the military of the State. The Naval Reserve is the only organization in the State drilled and equipped with efficient and servicable artillery. Acting in conjunction with the infantry of the State, their services would

be invaluable. They can now put in the field a Battalion of Artillery armed and equipped with the most improved rapid-firing guns. There may arise circumstances under which this command would be the only available military organization at the disposal of the State. If a body of rioters were assembled on the water front, destroying property and endangering the lives of our citizens, it would probably be injudicious to attack them with a land force, for in that event they must either fight or be driven into the river. My command, in small boats, could doubtless, without unnecessary loss of life, accomplish the desired result.

In conclusion, I beg leave to again call your attention to the absolute necessity of proper legislation and financial aid from the State, and to express the hope that the coming Legislature may see fit to extend to us such aid as will insure the prosperity of the Naval Reserve.
