ASTRONOMICAL CALCULATIONS FOR THE YEAR 1910.

Comprising the latter part of the 134th and the beginning of the 135th year of the Independence of the United States of America.

The Astronomical Calculations in this Almanac are made for Baltimore, Md., or, more exactly, the position of Johns Hopkins University, in Long. 5 h. 6 m. 26 s. west of Greenwich and Lat. 39° 17' 48" N., and are given in Eastern Standard time (which corresponds to Long. 5 h. west of Greenwich). To express the data given in Baltimore Mean time, subtract 6 m. 26 s. from the values given.

The year 1910 corresponds to—

The year 6623 of the Julian Period.

The year 7418-7419 of the Byzantine Era, the year 7419 commencing on Sept. 1st.

The year 5670-5671 of the Jewish Era, the year 5671 commencing on October 4th, or, more exactly, at sunset on October 3rd.

The year 2665 since the foundation of Rome, according to Varro.

The year 2570 of the Japanese Era, and to the 43rd year of the period entitled "Meiji."

The year 1328 of the Mohammedan Era, beginning on the 13th day of January, 1910.

The first day of January of the year 1910 is the 2,418,673rd day since the commencement of the Julian Period.

ECLIPSES.

In the year 1910 there will be four eclipses, two of the Sun and two of the Moon.

1. A Total Eclipse of the Sun, 1910, May 8, invisible at Baltimore. This eclipse will be visible only in the Indian Ocean, Australia, Sumatra, Borneo and New Zealand.

2. A Total Eclipse of the Moon, 1910, May 23, visible at Baltimore; the beginning visible generally in the central and western portions of Africa, southwest Europe, South America, North America, excepting Alaska, and the southern Pacific Ocean; the ending visible generally in South America, North America, excepting Alaska, and the central and southern Pacific Ocean.

3. A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, 1910, November 1, invisible at Baltimore.

4. A Total Eclipse of the Moon, 1910, November 16, visible at Baltimore; the beginning visible generally in Africa, Europe, central and western Asia, South America and eastern North America; the ending visible generally in Africa, Europe, western Asia, North and South America.

MORNING AND EVENING STARS.

Venus is evening star to February 13, then morning star to November 26, and evening star for the remainder of the year.

Mars is evening star to September 27, and morning star for the rest of the year.

Jupiter is morning star to March 31, then evening star to October 9, and morning star again for the balance of the year.

Saturn is evening star to April 16, then morning star to October 27, and evening star for the remainder of the year.

THE GREGORIAN CALENDAR.

The Gregorian Calendar was accepted immediately or shortly after its promulgation by all Roman Catholic countries. The Protestant states of Germany and the Kingdom of Denmark adhered to the Julian Calendar till 1750. It was in 1752 that the British Parliament abolished the Julian Calendar, or old style, as it was called. The act of Parliament decreed that the day follow-

ing September 2, 1752, should be called the 14th of that month.

When the alteration was made by Gregory it was only necessary to drop ten days, the year 1700 having intervened, which was a common year in the Gregorian, but a leap year in the Julian Calendar, it was now necessary to drop eleven days.

The "old style" is still adhered to in Russia.

THE NEBULAR HYPOTHESIS.

The great physicist Tyndall says about the Nebular Hypothesis: According to the nebular theory, as it was held by Kant, Laplace and William Herschel, and as it is held by the best scientific intellects of today, our sun and planets were once diffused through space as an impalpable haze, out of which, by condensation, came the solar system. What caused the haze to con-

dense? Loss of heat. What rounded the sun and planets? That which rounds a tear—molecular force. For aeons, the immensity of which overwhelms man's conceptions, the earth was unfit to maintain what we call life. It is now covered with visible living things. They are not formed of matter different from that of the earth around them. They are, on the contrary, bone of its bone, and flesh of its flesh.

THE TIMES OF THE MOON'S SOUTHING, RISING AND SETTING AS INDICATED IN THE ALMANAC.

The Moon's "Southing," or that of any other celestial body, such as the Sun, the Planets, and the Stars, means its passing the *meridian* of the place for which the almanac is calculated. In the Sun's Almanac the time expressed is the "Eastern Standard Time." The heavy figures throughout the astronomical portion of the Sun's Almanac refer to P. M. time, that is from 12 o'clock noon to midnight, and the light figures to A. M. time, that is from midnight to noon. The dots in the column of the Moon's Southings mean that on that day the Moon did not reach the meridian, or, expressed in technical language, does not culminate, or, to use an almanac term, does not South. With reference to the times of the Moon's rising and setting, it is plain that these times are important only when they fall within the nocturnal hours. The dots in the column of the times of the Moon's Rising and Setting after heavy figures mean that the Moon on that day does not rise or set, just according as the last word was "Rises" or "Sets." When in that column the word "Rises" appears it means with the next day the times of the rising are recorded, these times being the hours from about 6 o'clock P. M. to about 6 o'clock A. M., the hours when the moonlight is of any importance to us. The time of the rising of the Moon on that day where the dots are, is a time of daylight, and consequently, of no importance to us. As to where the word "Sets" occurs in the following columns the times of the Moon's Setting are recorded from about 6 o'clock P. M. to A. M.—which are nocturnal hour, and therefore of importance to us. On the day where the word "Sets" stands, the rising would be at day time, when the moonlight is of no importance to us. It follows, hence, that this column gives us complete information as to the Moon's po-

sition in the sky as far as it is of importance to us with reference to moonlight.

The word "Southing," as applied to the celestial bodies, an expression so often used in almanacs, means the culmination of an object, that is, the passing over the meridian in the diurnal motion of the earth. When the sun is on the meridian of a place, then at that moment it is noon, but as we go by civil time and not by apparent time, we have to correct the apparent time to get mean time, and since the calculations of the Sun's Almanac are based upon Standard Eastern time, the mean time of the 75th meridian, we must correct the mean time for the Standard Time. The letter S in the last column of the Almanac stands for Southing. When a star or planet is on or near the meridian, it can be observed at greater advantage than when near the horizon, for which reason greater stress has been laid upon giving the times of the southings of stars and planets than upon the times of their rising and setting.

The word "Almanac" comes to us from the Arabic "al," which is the definite article in the Arabic language, and "manakh" signifying a calendar. The word "Calendar" is from the Latin *calendæ* (the first day in the month) and this is probably derived from a word *calare*, to call.

♊ (Zeta) Canceri. We are confronted with two brilliant stars revolving in 60 years, and attended, at about six times their mean distance, by another pair, made up of a bright and a dark member, mutually circulating in 18 years, while pursuing round their primary pair a leisurely course of seven centuries. In such a system complex perturbation must arise, and their investigation may, in the distant future, disclose unforeseen possibilities in celestial mechanics.

THE ZODIAC.

The apparent path of the sun in the heavens is along an ecliptic, which is inclined 23° 27' to the celestial equator. A belt 16° wide, 8° on each side of the ecliptic, within which are comprised the path of the moon and all of the planets known to the ancients, is known as the zodiac. This belt is divided into the twelve signs of the zodiac, each 30° in length. The first of these signs begins at the point when

the sun's path crosses the equator (when moving north in the spring) and is known as the sign of Aries, and the point of crossing is known as the vernal or spring equinox. The point when the sun's path crosses the equator when returning south in the fall is known as the autumnal equinox, and is the beginning of the sign Libra.

By far the largest negro assessments in Baltimore were in the Northwestern (\$300,186) and the Northeastern (\$131,966) police districts, where the negro population is densest. Of the 81,381 negroes in all districts, 34,332 were in the former and 11,654 in the latter. Adult males totaled 23,848, females 29,676. There were 14,565 male children and 13,292 female. Five counties are omitted from the above table because of difficulty in disentangling records of white and colored assessments. Were they included the total negro holdings would aggregate, it is estimated, \$3,000,000 in real estate, to say nothing of personalty.

JOHN PRENTISS POE.

Born in Baltimore August 22, 1836, Mr. John P. Poe was for more than a generation a prominent figure in Maryland public life. The Democratic party held him in honor as a trusted adviser and leader. A man of marvelous energy and eminent at the bar, he occupied most creditably during great part of his career important offices of trust. He was School Commissioner, State Senator, City Counselor, President of City and State Tax Commissions, Attorney-General, codifier of State Laws, member of the Faculty of the Law School of the University of Maryland

and author of a valued law book. The platforms of his party were often the work of his pen. His first occupation was as clerk in a bank. He then became librarian of the Law Library. On August 22, 1857, he began the practice of law. His activity in politics dated from his admission to the bar and continued to the time of his death, October 14, 1909. Witty, cheerful, amiable and courteous in his personal relations and before an audience a convincing speaker, Mr. Poe exercised a strong influence upon his contemporaries and his death caused general regret throughout Maryland.

EVENING AND MORNING STARS.

Although Venus has ever been considered the morning or the evening star par excellence, every one of the planets acts in the capacity of a morning and an evening star. The inferior planets Mercury and Venus are evening stars from superior to inferior conjunction, and the superior planets Mars, Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus and Neptune from opposition to conjunction. It follows from

this, that the duration of an evening star depends upon the synodical period of the respective planet, being one-half of it. Consequently Mercury shines as an evening star (or a morning star) about 2 months, Venus about 9½ months, Mars 13 months (the longest period of all), Jupiter 6½ months, Saturn 6¼ months, and Uranus 6 months.

INTERNAL HEAT.

The boring at Skladebach, not far from Leipzig in the German Kingdom of Saxony, extended to 1 mile, 117 yards. It was established that at a depth of about 100 feet, a fixed temperature of 52° Fahrenheit is reached,

that is the temperature below the depth of 100 feet changes, being wholly irrespective of the solar radiation. For each mile, beginning with the 100 feet below the surface, the temperature rises 80° F. higher, or 1° for every 66 feet.

UNITED STATES ARMY CADETS.

Appointment to West Point Military Academy.

Each Congressional District and Territory, the District of Columbia, and also Porto Rico, is entitled to have one cadet at West Point. Each State is also entitled to have two cadets at the Academy from the State at large, and forty are also allowed from the United States *at large*. The appointments (except those from the United States *at large*, the District of Columbia, and from Porto Rico), are made by the Secretary of War at the request of the Senator, Representative or Delegate in Congress; and the person appointed must be an actual resident of the State, District or Territory from which the appointment is made. The appointments from the United States *at large* and from the District of Columbia are conferred by the President. The appointment of the cadet from Porto Rico is made by the President on the recommendation of the resident Commissioner.

Application is made by letter to the Adjutant-General, to have the name of the applicant placed upon the register that it may be furnished to the proper Senator, Representative or Delegate, when a vacancy occurs. The application must exhibit the full name, date of birth, and permanent abode of the applicant, with the number of the Congressional District in which his residence is situated.

Appointments are to be made one year in advance of the date of admission, except in cases where, by reason of death or other cause, a vacancy occurs which cannot be provided for by such appointment in advance. These vacancies are filled in time for the next examination.

For each candidate appointed there may be nominated *two alternates*. The principal and each alternate receives from the War Department a letter of appointment, and must appear for examination at the time and place designated; those previously accepted by the Academic Board on certificate as mentally qualified appear for physical examination only.

No candidate is admitted under seventeen or over twenty-two, or who is deformed, or afflicted with any infirmity which would render him unfit for the military service, or who has, at the time of presenting himself, any disorder of an infectious or immoral character. Accepted candidates, if between seventeen and eighteen years of age,

should not fall below five feet four inches in height; if eighteen or over, not below five feet five inches in height. Candidates must be unmarried.

Each candidate must on reporting at West Point present a certificate showing successful vaccination within one year; or, a certificate of two vaccinations, made at least a month apart, within three months.

Candidates are examined mentally and physically before boards of Army officers, at such places as the War Department may designate, on May 1 of each year. Those who pass report to the Superintendent at West Point June 15 the same year. The mental examination is in reading, writing, spelling, English grammar, English composition, English literature, arithmetic, algebra through quadratic equations, plane geometry, descriptive geography, and the elements of physical geography, especially the geography of the United States; United States history, the outlines of general history, and the general principles of physiology and hygiene.

The Academic Board will consider and may accept properly attested certificates of competitive examinations or certificates from public high schools, colleges or universities in lieu of the regular mental entrance examination.

Every candidate is subjected to a physical examination by an Army medical board after his mental qualification has been ascertained. Before appointment he signs an engagement of service for eight years. He subscribes to an oath to support the Constitution of the United States, and bear true allegiance to the National Government; to maintain and defend the sovereignty of the United States, as paramount to that of any State.

A cadet's pay is \$500 per year and one ration per day, or commutation therefor at thirty cents per day; total \$609.50, to commence with admission to the Academy. The necessary traveling expenses of candidates from their homes to the Military Academy are credited to their accounts after admission. There is no provision for the expenses of candidates who fail. A deposit of \$100 must be made at entrance to cover cost of outfit. After receiving a diploma the cadet may be promoted and commissioned as second lieutenant in any arm or corps of the Army in which there is a vacancy.

GOVERNOR'S CABINET.

The cabinet of the Governor of Maryland includes the chief State officials, the Secretary of State, the Attorney-

General, Adjutant-General, State Comptroller and State Treasurer. It meets at least once a month to promote co-operation in State affairs.

MIDSHIPMEN, OF THE UNITED STATES NAVY.

Appointments to the Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland.

The minimum age for admission is 16 years; maximum 20. Two midshipmen are allowed for each Senator, Representative and Delegate in Congress, two for the District of Columbia and five each year from the United States at large. The appointments from the District of Columbia and five each year at large are made by the President. One midshipman is appointed by the President from Porto Rico on the recommendation of the Governor of Porto Rico. Each Senator, Representative and Delegate in Congress may appoint one midshipman during each Congress.

The course for midshipmen is six years—four years at the Academy, and two years at sea, at the expiration of which time the examination for final graduation takes place.

Graduates are appointed to fill vacancies in the lower grades of the line of the Navy, and of the Marine Corps, in the order of merit.

THE EXAMINATIONS.

1. The general mental examination held on the third Tuesday in April, under the supervision of the Civil Service Commission, at points named.

2. A second mental examination at Washington, D. C., only on the second Tuesday in May, under the supervision of the Civil Service Commission.

3. A third examination at Annapolis, Md., only on the third Tuesday in June, under the supervision of the Superintendent of the Naval Academy. Candidates are notified when to appear at Annapolis for physical examination. Alternates also are nominated and these

may report for examination at the same time as the principals. There may be a special examination after the third Thursday of June.

Candidates failing to pass the entrance examination are allowed another examination for admission to the same class if recommended for re-examination by the Board of Examiners.

The Civil Service Commission examines only candidates whose names have been furnished by the Navy Department. All correspondence relative to the nomination and examination of candidates should be addressed to the Bureau of Navigation, Navy Department, Washington, D. C.

Nominations for examination in April should be forwarded to the Bureau ten days prior to the date of examination, as that is the latest date at which arrangements can be made for the examination. Candidates must enter the Academy immediately after examination. Candidates are examined mentally in reading, writing, punctuation, spelling, arithmetic, geography, English grammar, United States history, World's history, algebra through quadratic equations, and plane geometry (five books of Chauvenet's Geometry, or an equivalent).

On entering the Academy the appointee signs an agreement to serve in the Navy eight years, including his time of probation at the Naval Academy. A midshipman's pay is \$500 a year, commencing from the date of admission. The expenses for equipment at entrance are \$226.35. A preliminary deposit of \$30 for clothing is required.

THERMOMETRIC SCALES.

Taking Fahrenheit's scale the boiling point of water is 212°, whereas in the Centigrade scale it is 100°.

The freezing point of water is 32° Fahr. and 0° centigrade.

Consequently 180° plus 32° Fahr. is equal to 100 Centigrade.

So, to convert Fahrenheit to Centigrade, subtract 32, multiply by 5 and divide by 9.

To convert Centigrade to Fahrenheit multiply by 9, divide by 5 and add 32. This does away with the recurrence of decimals.

Similarly, according to Reaumur's scale, the boiling point of water is 80° and the freezing point 0°.

To convert Fahrenheit to Reaumur subtract 32, multiply by 4 and divide by 9.

To convert Reaumur to Fahrenheit multiply by 9, divide by 4 and add 32.

OPEN SEASONS FOR GAME IN DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA, MARYLAND AND VIRGINIA, 1909.

(Compiled by T. S. Palmer, Henry Oldys and C. E. Brewster.)

The following table shows the open seasons for game in the District of Columbia, Maryland and Virginia. The first date of the open season and the first date of the close season are given, so that the close seasons may be found by reversing the dates. If the open season is Sept. 1-Jan. 1, the close season will be Jan. 1-Sept. 1.

Attention is called to the restrictions on shipment under the Federal and State laws:

The Federal law prohibits shipment from the State of game killed in violation of the laws of that State; that is, game killed during the close season, by illegal methods, or for sale or export when sale or export is prohibited by the State. Penalty, fine not exceeding

\$200. (Carrier and consignee may also be liable.)

The Federal law also prohibits shipment of game from the State at any time in packages not marked so that name and address of shipper and nature of contents may be readily ascertained by inspection of the outside of the package. Penalty, fine not exceeding \$200. (Carrier and consignee may also be liable.)

The State law prohibits shipment under certain conditions, as shown below.

Details in regard to shipment, sale and licenses are contained in Farmers' Bulletin No. 376, "Game Laws for 1909," which may be had free upon application to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.

District of Columbia.

Hunting permitted only on the marshes of the Eastern Branch above the Anacostia Bridge and on the marshes on the Virginia shore of the Potomac, provided birds are not hunted within 200 yards of any bridge or dwelling. The following seasons for upland game, marked with a star (*), apply only to possession and sale:

- *Rabbit—Nov. 1-Feb. 1.
- *Squirrel—Nov. 1-Feb. 1.
- *Quail (Partridge)—Nov. 1-Mar. 15.
- *Grouse (Pheasant)—Nov. 1-Dec. 26.
- Dove—No open season.
- Woodcock—July 1-Jan. 1.
- Reedbird, Rail (Ortolan)—Sept. 1-Feb. 1.

Plover, Snipe—Sept. 1-Apr. 1.
Duck—Sept. 1-Apr. 1.

ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS.

Open Seasons.—Prairie Chicken or pinnated grouse (sale), Sept. 1-Mar. 15; Goose, Brant, Sept. 1-Apr. 1; Marsh Blackbird and other game birds not mentioned in this table, Sept. 1-Feb. 1.

All shooting prohibited on Sunday or at night.

Nongame Birds.—All wild birds (except game birds and certain injurious species) protected throughout the year. Robins, swallows, herons, gulls and grebes are protected, but no protection is given to English sparrows, crows, Cooper hawks, sharp-shinned hawks, or great horned owls.

Nongame Birds.—Most song and insectivorous birds, including robins, swallows and flickers, are protected throughout the year. Nongame Birds.—All wild birds (except game birds and certain injurious species) protected throughout the year. No protection is given to English sparrows, blackbirds, ricebirds, crows, doves, hawks, owls, eagles, robin snipe, or English (or Wilson) snipe. An open season, Feb. 15-Apr. 1, is provided for robins.

Export.—Export of deer and game birds (except sora) prohibited at all times except as follows: A nonresident hunting legally may take with him out of the State, open to view and labeled with his name and address, 1 deer, 50 quail (partridges), 10 grouse (pheasants), 3 wild turkeys, 30 waterfowl and shore birds to the number of 25 of each kind or 100 in all, killed by himself; any citizen of the State may, during the open season, ship from the State as a gift, and so marked, on the shipping tag, 1 deer, 18 quail (partridges), 6 grouse (pheasants), 3 wild turkeys and 12 waterfowl, open to view, labeled with names and addresses of donor and donee and number and kind of game in each package; county supervisors may permit export of waterfowl.

Sale.—Sale of robins, quail, (partridges), grouse (pheasants), or woodcock prohibited at all times.

Nonresident License.—Issued by county clerk. Fee (including clerk fee), \$10. Not required for hunting rabbits or sora. A guest of a landowner requires no license if hunting on his host's land, with him or a member of his family, provided his host receives no compensation directly or indirectly.

ENFORCEMENT OF GAME LAWS.

In 41 States the enforcement of game laws is intrusted to game commissioners, wardens, or other State officers; in five others—Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi and Nevada—to county wardens; in Virginia to city and magisterial district wardens; in Arkansas to sheriffs and similar local officers; and in the District of Columbia to the Metropolitan Police. Several national organizations are interested in the protection of birds and game. In addition, State associations and many local organizations cooperate in the work of protecting game in 26 States. Finally, 37 States have Audubon Societies, organized especially for the study and protection of non-game birds.

DEGREES OF LONGITUDE AND LATITUDE.

It is only on the equator that a degree of longitude is $69\frac{1}{4}$ statute or 60 nautical or geographic miles, the latter in the nautical language also called knots. With increasing latitudes this length decreases. So in our own latitude, about 40° , one degree of longitude

measures only 53 miles. Near the poles these distances become very small. Degrees of latitude also vary, increasing with increasing latitudes. While a degree of latitude near the equator measures about 68.7 miles, near the poles it measures nearly 69.4 miles.

Arbor and Bird Day—By resolution of the General Assembly of 1894, the Governor of Maryland is authorized to designate by proclamation one day in April every year for tree planting, to be known as "Arbor Day."

Maryland Day—March 25, the anniversary of the landing at St. Clements Island, now Blackstones Island, St. Mary's county, of the first settlers in Maryland, in the year 1634, is not a legal holiday, but is commemorated by special exercises in the public schools of the State.

Repudiation Day—The General Assembly of 1894 made November 23 a bank half-holiday in Frederick county, under the title of "Repudiation Day," in commemoration of the repudiation of the stamp act in 1765.

Commercial Papers: 1 cent for each 2 ounces or fraction, but not less than 5 cents on each packet. Printed Matter: 1 cent for each 2 ounces or fraction. Samples of Merchandise: 1 cent for each 2 ounces or fraction. Postage

must be fully prepaid on matters to Canada, Mexico and Shanghai. Postage on matter to other foreign countries should be fully prepaid, as double the deficiency will be charged on delivery. Class 3. Single books may be sent at the third-class rate, even though they may exceed the 4-pound limit of weight. The sender may write or print on a label, the name, his own name, occupation and residence or business address, preceded by the word "From."

SARA SIGOURNEY RICE.

Miss Sara Sigourney Rice, who died
 at her home, 2004 Mt. Royal Terrace,
 October 30, 1909, occupied a distin-
 guished position among Baltimore edu-
 cators and lovers of good literature.
 She was born in Bath, England, and
 coming to Baltimore while a girl ob-
 tained her training in a private school.
 For many years she was principal of
 the Western Female High School and
 was the exponent of high educational
 ideals for Baltimore women. Her per-
 sistent efforts secured the erection of
 the monument to Edgar Allan Poe in

Westminster churchyard, corner of
 Fayette and Greene streets. The fund
 for the acquisition of a lot and the
 construction of the monument was
 raised chiefly by means of literary en-
 tertainments arranged by Miss Rice. A
 book from her pen on Poe's life and
 works testified further to her apprecia-
 tion of his genius. During the recent
 Poe anniversary celebration the Uni-
 versity of Virginia presented Miss Rice
 with a medal in recognition of her
 unique services in behalf of the greatest
 of American poets.

The qualifications of candidates for admission into this free school for boys, founded by John McDonogh, who was born in Baltimore, December 29, 1779, and died in New Orleans, October 26, 1850, are as follows:

1. They must be poor boys, of good character, of respectable associations in life, residents of the City of Baltimore.
2. They must be sound and healthy in mind and body.
3. They must be between 10 and 14 years of age.
4. They must pass a competitive examination.

Applications for admission should be made to Robert H. Smith, President of the Board of Trustees, 624 Equitable Building, at any time of the year. Applications, however, are so numerous that admission is determined by competitive examinations held early in June at some convenient place in Baltimore, of which candidates are notified. The

examinations are based on the work of the Public Schools of Baltimore, a different set of questions being given to the boys of the several grades—Third, Fourth, Fifth and Sixth. The subjects of examination are arithmetic, reading, geography and a composition on an assigned subject as a test of the knowledge of English. The regular term at the school ends when the boy is 16 years of age, but the earning of an honorary scholarship may enable him to continue there one year longer.

The property of the foundation consists of 835 acres of land in a beautiful and healthy region, 12 miles northwest of Baltimore City, with commodious buildings; an endowment fund of \$725,600 from John McDonogh invested in Baltimore City bonds; bequest of Dr. Zenus Barnum of \$80,000 to promote mechanical instruction and manual training; bequest of Samuel H. Taggart of \$175,000.

BALTIMORE'S PASTEUR INSTITUTE.

The Pasteur Institute of Baltimore City (College of Physicians and Surgeons), has completed, under the direction of Dr. N. G. Keile, the treatment of 1,381 cases for the prevention of hydrophobia. Of the 1,381 cases treated only two are reported to have died of hydrophobia. The rate of mortality was one-seventh of 1 per cent. Without the Pasteur treatment, the mortality from bites of rabid animals is from 5 to 80 per cent., depending upon the situation and severity of the wounds.

It was ascertained that 791 of the 1,381 persons treated were bitten by animals that were rabid. The wounds were inflicted by dogs in 1,223 cases, in 85 cases by cats, in 1 by a calf, in 1 by a pet pig, in 11 by cows, in 11 by horses, 1 in guinea pigs, and in 4 by human beings. In 51 cases the wounds were not the result of bites.

Of the 1,381 persons treated 888 were males and 393 females. Two hundred and thirty-three children under 10 years old were treated, being 17 per cent. of all patients received. The youngest treated was 7 months old; the oldest, 82 years.

The State Geological and Economic Survey embraces the Geological and Highway Divisions. The former is concerned with the preparation of reports and maps dealing with the geology, topography, hydrography, and agricultural soils of the State. This work is carried on as far as possible in co-operation with the scientific bureaus of the Federal Government. The Geological Division is engaged in the preparation and publication of a map on the scale of one mile to one inch which affords the base for the representation of the topography, the geological formations, the forest growth, and the agricultural soils. This work is now well advanced toward completion and maps of many of the counties are available.

The Highway Division is concerned with general highway problems, with the construction of roads under the State Aid (Shoemaker) Law, and with the building of the highway between Baltimore and Washington. A testing laboratory is also conducted by this division for the determination of road-building materials. Under the State Aid law (October, 1908) already 107 miles of road have been completed at an expense of \$808,885.59. Forty miles of road are now under construction and 385 miles have been applied for. A large scale State road map has been prepared on which the cities, towns and villages are shown, together with the highways, railroads and steamboat lines. This map is on the scale of three miles to one inch and is printed in three sheets.

The Commission by May 1st last completed its work of selecting the system of State roads to be improved by indicating a continuous system of 1,200 miles of main road in and through all the counties of the State, and that it before October 1st had contracts let covering the improvement, according to modern methods, of 100 miles of this system, and plans under way for contracting early in 1910 about 150 more miles, so that it could be expected that by the end of 1910, between one-fifth and one-fourth of the selected system would be completed.

6. The dioceses and missionary districts within the States of Minnesota, Iowa, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Montana, Wyoming and Colorado.

7. The dioceses and missionary districts within the States of Missouri, Arkansas, Louisiana, Texas, Kansas and the Territory of New Mexico, and the

missionary district of Oklahoma and the Indian Territory.

8. The dioceses and missionary districts within the States of Idaho, Utah, Washington, Oregon, Nevada, California and the Territories of Arizona, Alaska and Hawaii, and the missionary district of the Philippine Islands.

In each judicial department there is a court of review, composed of a bishop therein, three presbyters, canonically resident, and three lay communicants of the Church, two at least of the laymen to be men learned in the law, having domicile in the department.

MARYLAND DEMOCRATIC STATE CONVENTION.

The State convention held at the Auditorium Theatre August 11, 1909, re-elected Mr. Murray Vandiver chairman of the State Central Committee, nominated a comptroller and adopted the following platform:

"We, the representatives of the Democratic party of Maryland in convention assembled, heartily endorse the present progressive business-like and zealous Democratic State administration, and confidently appeal to the people for a renewal of the control of our State's affairs which, for years past in Democratic hands has given us the blessings of good, economical and efficient government.

"The Democratic party pledged the people of Maryland in the campaign of 1907, that if given the power it would again submit for their adoption an amendment to our Constitution for the purpose of excluding the illiterate negro vote. That campaign resulted in a great Democratic victory, and in the redemption of our pledge a suffrage amendment, prepared by a conference of eminent and public-spirited lawyers, was adopted by a Democratic General Assembly and is now before the people.

"We declare that the adoption of this amendment is the main and vital issue of the coming election. Proposed as a measure of Democratic policy in obedience to the deliberately expressed sense of the masses of our white people, its

adoption is urged upon Democrats and Republicans alike as a distinctively non-partisan reform imperatively demanded by a just consideration of the best interests of the State. We here emphasize with all possible force that the proposed amendment with the utmost care fully protects the right to vote of the foreign-born citizens of this State, and that all statements which have been made to the contrary are absolutely untrue. The Democratic party is today, as it has always been, and especially so in Maryland, the firm and faithful protector of all the civil and political rights of the naturalized American citizens, and we emphatically assert that they will not and cannot be disfranchised by any conceivable method whatsoever under this amendment.

"We favor the creation by appropriate legislation of a public-utilities commission applicable to all our public-service corporations.

"We express our hearty indorsement of the policy and principles of the Corrupt Practices act adopted by the last General Assembly, noting with great gratification its splendid effects upon our elections, both primary and general.

ORGANIZATION DEMOCRATIC PARTY, MARYLAND, 1909—Continued.

"We favor such amendments to the existing Primary Election law as shall correct defects in its practical operation.

"We express our gratification at the legislation enacted by the last General Assembly, and at the measures and proceedings taken in pursuance thereof, to build and improve a modern up-to-date system of good roads and highways at the expense of the State, and we pledge ourselves to the enactment of all legislation which may be proper and necessary to secure and extend the benefits derived therefrom.

"We advocate the passage of a pure food law for the State of Maryland, guaranteeing pure food for the people, and framed along the lines of the Federal law on the subject, adjusted, however, to the needs and conditions of this State.

"Declaring again our conviction that in the minds of the great majority of the Democrats of Maryland the paramount issue at the approaching election is the question of the adoption of the franchise amendment submitted to the people by the last General Assembly in pursuance of the solemn pledge of the Democratic party in the platform of 1907, and realizing that the most serious obstacle in the way of the adoption of said amendment is the honest fear in

the minds of many patriotic citizens of Baltimore that its adoption would not inure to the general welfare of the people of the whole State, without the submission to the people of an amendment to the organic law of the State, providing for Baltimore city representation in the General Assembly of Maryland, in accordance with the theory upon which our republican institutions are founded, we, the representatives of the Democratic party in convention assembled, hoping that we may thereby secure a united city and county Democracy on the one great issue of white manhood suffrage in Maryland, do solemnly declare that we favor the passage by the next General Assembly of Maryland of a law proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State granting to the people of Baltimore city representation in the House of Delegates of Maryland in accordance with the population of the city, and representation in the Senate of Maryland of one Senator for every unit of population in said city equal to the population of the largest county in the State, without reducing the present representation of any county.

"Upon this declaration of principles, which is purposely confined to issues relating to our State government, we earnestly invite the support of our fellow-citizens."

AMERICA'S VICTORIES IN OUT-OF-DOOR SPORTS.

The year 1909 brought America notable victories in Polar exploration, yachting, tennis, polo and aviation. Whether Cook or Peary be awarded the honor of having first reached the North Pole, it was an American did it. In the Sonder Klasse races at Marblehead the American boat Joyette took first place, defeating the German contestants and keeping in this country the Kaiserlicher Cup, presented by the Emperor. At Philadelphia Larned defeated Dixon, the English

player, in the Dwight Davis Cup preliminary tennis contest, thus winning the right to challenge the Australians, the present cup holders. An American polo team in two straight games beat the crack English players, winning the rubber and America Cup which had been since 1886 in England. In aviation an American gained the first honors, Mr. Glenn H. Curtiss, representing the Aero Club of America, having won the Grand Prix at both Rheims and Brescia, besides other aeronautic victories.

MARYLAND REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION.

(Held at the Maryland Theatre August 25, 1909.)

Platform.

The platform adopted by the Republican convention is as follows:

"We, the representatives of the Republicans of Maryland, in convention assembled, while realizing that no national issues are involved in the present campaign in this State, except in so far as the attempt to adopt an un-American suffrage system in one State of the Union may affect the common sisterhood of the States of the Union, cannot refrain from expressing our satisfaction over the election of President Taft and his wise, progressive and patriotic administration. We commend the work of a Republican Congress in revising the tariff, as promised by Mr. Taft in his campaign, and which he so successfully urged upon Congress.

"Republicans in Maryland claim help from all good citizens, whatever their politics or party; from all sincere friends of honest government and pure politics, in defeating the proposed amendment to our State Constitution, which we accept as the paramount issue in this campaign. Like the amendment rejected by the people four years ago, this measure would make of Maryland a one-party State, subject, with no hope of rescue, to the misrule of those selfish and unscrupulous men, long supreme in

the Democratic party organization, against whose methods and aims thousands of Democrats have again and again protested at the polls. It would render powerless for good independent voters, reform organizations and a free press, and thus virtually destroy the salutary influence of public opinion on our State and city governments. This amendment would rob thousands of worthy citizens of rights solemnly assured them by the supreme law of the land. It is a scheme long meditated and carefully planned to make and keep Maryland under the control of the political party now dominant, and, as now organized, regardless of her people's wishes, and at the same time to insure to the men who make up the political organization now in power perpetual control of their own party, and through it the State government—a control to be used in the future, as it has been in the past, for their own selfish ambitions and fraudulent aims and purposes, without regard to the fair fame or vital interests of our State. Condemned by enlightened public opinion throughout the Union, its adoption would be a discredit to our State, an insult and a grievance

to our foreign-born citizens, and a grave menace to free government in Maryland.

"The dangers of perpetuating the control of the Democratic organization have been strikingly emphasized in the administration of State and city government.

"We charge the present Democratic State administration with gross inefficiency and mismanagement. We point to the first session of its Legislature, which has been marked by unprecedented extravagance, by the most shameless multiplication of useless State employees at the public's expense, by a brazen refusal to even respectfully consider the recommendation of economical procedure offered by Governor Warfield in his retiring message, and by many and other evidences of the fact that this administration, so prolific in promises, has failed lamentably in performance. We point to the record of the Good Roads Commission, which for more than a year and a half has been organized and under pay, and which brings us to the edge of a second winter with pitifully small results for a commission with such plenary power and such ample funds; we take exception to the unbusinesslike methods of that commission, which is charged with the expenditure of \$5,000,000 of the people's money and in the name of the people we ask for some public statement of its work and methods and some proper auditing of its accounts.

"We point to the record of the Democratic city administration in Baltimore, where exposures of lax business methods and notorious scandals have followed in rapid and startling succession; notably the defalcation in the City Register's office, resulting in the loss of nearly \$70,000 of the people's money, and the transaction whereby the Democratic Mayor and his chosen advisers sought and secured approval of a large loan, concealing from the voters the fact that they had already banded the city, if it were approved, to pay \$725,000 for property assessed at \$83,000.

"With this record of yesterday before the public, the masters of the Democratic organization responsible for all these scandals and for many more and far worse scandals in the past, impudently demand that we trample on the nation's Constitution and do grievous wrong to many worthy Marylanders, white and black, only that they may misgovern us in future with no cause to fear the people's wrath.

"Republican principles condemn all arbitrary distinctions in political rights. They forbid that one citizen's vote shall have but a third, or a fourth, the weight of another's merely because the former lives in one part of the State and the latter in a different part. Therefore, in order that an equal value may be given to the individual voter of Maryland,

wherever he may live, without any reservation, we solemnly declare that we will do all in our power to have passed by the next Legislature, and thereafter adopted by the people of the State, a constitutional amendment whereby Baltimore city shall have 52 members of the House of Delegates—that is to say, one member for every 10,000 of population—and 16 Senators—that is to say, one Senator for every 30,000 of population—this without decreasing the representation of any county. Believing as we do in representation according to population, we adopt as our own the carefully prepared bill of the Just Representation League of Maryland, which is based upon this principle, and which provides not only for an increase of the representation of Baltimore city, but also for all parts of Maryland which are under-represented. We especially commend the conservative character of this bill, and call the attention of the counties to the provisions thereof, whereby under all circumstances, no matter how phenomenal may be the growth of Baltimore city in the future, the majority of the members of the House of Delegates and the majority of the members of the Senate must be from the counties.

"We advocate a just, impartial and unprejudiced supervision and control of public service corporations and public utilities generally in this State through incorruptible, enlightened and nonpartisan agencies, and we condemn any exemption from such supervision and control, or other special favors to any particular enterprise or corporation.

"Since the special session of 1901 to the present time the masters of the Democratic organization have sought for purely partisan gain to defeat or impede an expression of the people's true will at the polls. We ask all honest men to aid us in choosing a General Assembly which shall repeal the iniquitous 'Wilson' law and once more assure to every constitutional voter the right to have his ballot cast according to his conscience and counted as cast.

"We believe in a just and fair Primary Election law. The existing Primary Election law is unfair, expensive and unsatisfactory to honest candidates and honest voters, and urgently needs radical revision by a General Assembly, which itself believes in a free ballot and a fair count at elections of every grade.

"We favor a progressive, practical and enlightened policy of good roads construction by the State.

"We demand the strict and impartial enforcement of the Corrupt Practices act.

"We favor a revaluation and reassessment of property in order to equalize the burdens of taxation.

"We favor State care of the indigent insane and feeble-minded.

"We favor the ratification by the Legislature of an amendment to the Constitution of the United States authorizing Congress to levy a tax on incomes.

"We heartily indorse the passage of a pure food and drug bill by the next General Assembly which shall conform to the phraseology and intent of the national Pure Food and Drugs act of June 30, 1906, pertaining to the adulteration and misbranding of foods and drugs, and the rules and regulations

adopted by the national Government for the enforcement of same, but exempting doctors' prescriptions from the provisions of the act.

"We deplore the recurring agitation of the suffrage question as detrimental to the State's highest interests, and as a distraction to the commercial, industrial and agricultural development of the State, and express our confident belief that the people of the State, wearied of this agitation, will repudiate it forever at the approaching election."

Nominee.

Mr. Frank E. Williams, of Cecil county, was unanimously nominated for the office of State Comptroller.

The four Republican legislative district conventions held at the Union League Club August 19, 1909, adopted a platform, chose delegates to the State convention (August 25), elected a State Central Committee for Baltimore, nominated a candidate for the State Senate in the Fourth District and a complete city legislative ticket:

"In our opinion President Taft is at once the beloved Chief Magistrate of all the people of our country and the unquestioned leader of the party which elected him. He has given voice to the wants of the great body of people; he has made every section of the land feel that his administration is for their benefit; he has seen to it that the Republican party has held fast to its great historic traditions and has fulfilled its recent promises.

"His advocacy of a change in the Constitution of the United States so as to give the Congress the power to levy an income tax is in the interest of the national welfare, and its ratification is of vital importance; we, therefore, pledge the candidates for the General Assembly nominated by this convention to vote in accordance with his recommendation for the ratification of the proposed sixteenth amendment.

"In State politics, we are still struggling for the right preservative of all rights. The paramount issue in Maryland is the defeat of the proposed disfranchising amendment, which is an avowed evasion of the Constitution of the United States, which every man who has held office in Maryland has sworn to uphold. It proposes to disgrace the State by putting into its fundamental law what is on its face a palpable trick, a so-called educational test which tests nothing that anybody believes has the slightest relation to the ability to intelligently cast an honest vote. It proposes to segregate from all other white men those foreigners who are not naturalized at this time, and their descendants for untold generations. It proposes to make Maryland a one-party State, and to place the government absolutely in the hands of the Democratic oligarchy, which has misgoverned its affairs for so many years, without the possibility of its overthrow."

"While the defeat of the amendment is the paramount issue, it is not less important that a Republican Legislature should be elected, to repeal the pernicious and crooked election laws which have been fastened upon our people by the Democratic machine, and to recast and amend the registration and election laws, so as to permit every citizen who possesses the constitutional requirements as to residence and citizenship to cast his vote at all elections and have his vote counted as he wished to cast it.

"As we believe in the principle of equal representation to all sections in legislative assemblies, we pledge the candidates for the General Assembly nominated by this convention to vote for the passage of an act, to be submitted to the people for their ratification, amending the Constitution of the State so as to provide for an increase in the representation of Baltimore city and all counties in the State entitled to an increase in the General Assembly, to a number of Senators and Delegates equal in proportion to the population, without decreasing the number of Senators and Delegates now representing any county.

"We favor the passage of such laws as will provide for the revaluation and reassessment of property, where necessary, in order to equalize the burdens of taxation now unequally distributed.

"We favor the amendment of the laws providing for the regulation and taxation of banks and trust companies, so as to relieve them from the unjust burdens resting upon them and to properly facilitate and encourage the extension of their business.

"We believe the General Assembly should so modify the laws relating to taxation in Baltimore city as to encourage the establishment and extension of industrial and manufacturing enterprise and the municipal government should be

given such additional powers as may be consistent with the Constitution of the State, enabling it to enact local legislation favorable to the extension of the business enterprises of the city.

"We favor the passage of a law creating a public-utilities commission for the government of all public-service corporations.

"We heartily indorse the passage of a pure food and drug bill by the next General Assembly which shall conform to the phraseology and intent of the national Pure Food and Drugs act of June 30, 1906, pertaining to the adulteration and misbranding of foods and drugs, and the rules and regulations adopted by the national Government for the enforcement of same, but exempting doctors'

prescriptions from the provisions of the act.

"We strongly condemn the tendency and practice of public-service corporations to interfere in public affairs.

"Baltimore property is highly assessed and heavily taxed. The city has need of many improvements and facilities. It cannot afford them unless its administration is made more intelligent, efficient and, in proportion of results accomplished, economical, and this can only be done when the municipal employes are selected for their honesty and capability. We favor the passage of such laws as will accomplish this result.

"To all the above the candidates nominated for the General Assembly of Maryland are hereby pledged, committed and instructed."

SOCIALIST STATE CONVENTION.

The convention held at Hagerstown July 5, 1909, adopted a platform and nominated Mark Jackson, of Baltimore, for Comptroller. The platform is as follows.

"We firmly believe that all men and women are born socially equal and that life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness are due to them as natural rights. But we know that liberty and the pursuit of happiness are impossible to those who do not own their own implements of work and means of livelihood.

"Now, it is a fact, that the implements of work and the means of livelihood of the immense majority of the American people, the working class, are owned by a small group of nonworkers. The large, all-creating working class must depend for livelihood upon the small capitalistic class. Thus the non-producing capitalistic class has become the complete master of the all-creating working class.

"The latter fact becomes particularly obvious, whenever the continually increasing oppression by the ruling class calls out a united protest of the workers in the form of the strike and boycott. On such occasions it becomes manifest that the entire machinery of government and coercion, the courts with their injunctions, the army, the navy, the militia, are employed for the purpose of coercing the workers into submission to the ruling capitalist class.

"We, therefore, call upon all workers, regardless of race or creed, to unite for the purpose of wresting by means of the ballot the powers of government from the hands of the capitalist class and employ them for the purpose of securing to the workers all the wealth that they create. We maintain that the State of Maryland is fully competent to own and operate the industries of this State for the benefit of its inhabitants.

"We declare, furthermore, that the working class, in its efforts to secure the powers of government, cannot and must not rely upon the Republican, Democratic or so-called reform parties, all representing the interests of the nonproducing classes, who live upon the fruits of the workers' toil. The emancipation of the workers is to be accomplished by the workers themselves, and to them, therefore, do we issue the call—workers of brawn, unite; you have a world to gain.

"Pending a complete emancipation of the workers from the yoke of capitalist wage slavery we demand the following:

"First—An eight-hour working day for all workers.

"Modern science has firmly established the fact that most of the widespread diseases, such as tuberculosis, are greatly favored by lowered vitality of constitution due to overexertion. The eight-hour workday will mitigate this condition at the same time that it will relieve other ills by diminishing the army of the unemployed.

"Second—We demand enfranchisement of women and their equal compensation with men for like services rendered.

"Industrially today woman is the equal of man; together with him she labors in the mill, factory and shop. We, therefore, hold that in the light of simple justice she is entitled to the same political and economic rights as man.

"Third—That the ownership, management and operation of all so-called public utilities, such as land, electric and gas plants, railways, etc., shall be vested in the people collectively.

"Fourth—The abolition of all child labor under the age of 16.

"Fifth—We insist upon the preservation of the Fourteenth and Fifteenth Amendments to our national Constitution.

"We believe that any infringement on the rights of suffrage of any part of the population, whether because of race or economic status, infringes upon the basic rights of man. We therefore oppose the disfranchising amendment to the Constitution of the State of Maryland, known as the Straus amendment, to be submitted to referendum vote in the coming State elections, and we call upon the working class of Maryland to vote against it.

"All judicial officers to be elected by popular vote.

"We demand the free administration of justice.

"We demand the immediate relief of the unemployed by the State providing work of public nature on a large scale.

"We demand the abolition of the contract labor system.

"We demand that the State provide food and clothing to school children whose parents are unable to do so."

SOUTH POLAR EXPLORATION.

Lieut. Ernest H. Shackleton, of the British navy, sailed from England on July 30, 1907, in the ship Nimrod, and on January 9, 1909, hoisted his country's flag in latitude 88° 23'—a little less than 100 statute miles from the Pole. The point reached is the farthest South record yet made. It is situated on a plateau about 10,000 feet above the sea level. The violent blizzards encountered by the party demonstrated that the so-called "polar calm," if it exists, must be "small in area or not coincident with the geographic Pole." The journey covered 1,708 statute miles from where the expedition left the ship, and was made in 126 days on dog sledges. The extreme cold—67°—72° of frost—with constant blizzards and high winds, made traveling extremely trying and hazardous over the glaciers and drifting snow.

Lieutenant Shackleton's aim was to carry on the survey begun by Captain Scott in the voyage of the Discovery. He began where that stopped and ad-

vanced some 350 miles. Eight distinct mountain ranges and more than a hundred mountains were discovered and the volcano of Mount Erebus was closely examined. Its new crater was found ejecting volumes of steam and gas 2,000 feet high. Before reaching the plateau on which the Pole is located, an immense glacier 120 miles long and approximately 40 wide was discovered. It was so crevassed when the party traveled over it that it took a whole day to go 600 yards. One of the ponies disappeared the next day in a crevasse of unknown depth, one of the men and the sledge only narrowly escaping the same fate. Coal was discovered and a remarkable collection of geological specimens obtained. A complete meteorological record was also made. Indications were discovered of a great climatic change in the Antarctic regions. Another party, under Prof. Edworth Davis, traveled some 1,250 miles from the Nimrod and located the South Magnetic Pole in the vicinity of latitude 72° 25' and longitude 154° east.

JUVENILE COURT, BALTIMORE.

The Juvenile Court was created by the Act of 1902, Chapter 611, which provides for the appointment by the Governor of a magistrate for juvenile causes, with exclusive jurisdiction in all cases of minors under sixteen years of age. In 1904 these powers were enlarged. The court holds its sessions in the Courthouse daily, except Sundays and legal holidays.

THE JUDICIARY SYSTEM.

The judges of the courts of Maryland, except the Orphans' Court, are elected for 15 years. They are required to be not less than 30 years of age at the time of election, and are re-eligible until the age of 70 years, but not thereafter, though the Legislature, by joint resolution, may enable any judge already in office to fill out an unexpired term beyond the limit. The counties are grouped into seven circuits, and the City of Baltimore is designated as the eighth circuit. A chief judge and two associate judges are provided for each circuit in the counties. The chief judges of the county circuits and a judge specially elected in Baltimore City constitute the Court of Appeals. The Governor, by and with the advice and con-

sent of the Senate, designates the member of the Court of Appeals who shall be the chief or presiding judge of that tribunal. A court is required to be held in each county of the State, to be styled the Circuit Court for the county in which it may be held. No two of the associate judges shall reside in the same county. Baltimore City, the eighth Judicial Circuit, is provided with a Supreme Bench—a chief and nine associate judges, in addition to one judge of the Court of Appeals. The total number of judges is 32.

The salaries of judges are as follows: Court of Appeals, \$5,800; Associate of the Circuit Courts, \$3,600; Supreme Bench, Baltimore City, \$5,000, of which \$4,500 is paid by the State and \$500 by the City of Baltimore.

STREET-CAR MILEAGE IN BALTIMORE.

A new survey of the entire track system of the United Railways made during 1909 shows that the company now operates 401,206 miles of main line, of which 171,264 miles are laid with tee rail, principally on suburban lines; two miles with duplex rail, and 180,031 miles with 9-inch girder rail, while

47,911 miles are laid with smaller girder sections. In 1908 there were 193 transfer points, with 1,615 direction privileges, and 54,587,949 transfers were used, 40 per cent. of all passengers using transfers. The average rate per capita received was thus 3.45 cents, or, deducting park tax, 3.15 cents.

OAKLEY P. HAINES.

Mr. Oakley Philpotts Haines, for 25 years managing editor of THE SUN, died at his residence, 2620 North Calvert street, Baltimore, March 5, 1909. He was born December 29, 1837, at Petersburg, Va., the son of H. Haines, of Culpeper county, Va., and Ann Currie Philpotts, only daughter of Oakley Philpotts. He was educated at classical schools in Petersburg and Rockbridge county, Va. His father was the proprietor of the Petersburg Constellation, a leading Democratic journal. In 1855, after his return from a summer tour with his mother in Europe, he became, in his eighteenth year, a reporter for the Petersburg Express. He lived afterward in Richmond, where he reported the proceedings of the Virginia seceding convention of 1861 and later those of the Senate and House of the Confederate Congress. He also reported the battles about Richmond in 1862, serving temporarily in an artillery company

which helped to repel Dahlgren's raid on Richmond. He also reported the battle of the Crater, reaching the field soon after the explosion. His literary work was considerable, consisting of translations of German folklore tales, contributions to Godey's, the Waverly, etc. In October, 1866, he married Anna Elizabeth Hopkins, of Rappahannock county. In April, 1869, he came to Baltimore to become night editor of THE SUN and later became assistant managing editor. In February, 1881, he became managing editor, which post he held till failing health compelled his retirement in March, 1906. Astronomy and poetry were Mr. Haines' favorite diversions. Intellectual activity, breadth, integrity, dignity, urbanity, modesty and gentleness were his prominent characteristics. His fund of general information—particularly in regard to public events of the last 50 years—was of extraordinary extent.

PROGRESS OF THE SEWERAGE SYSTEM.

The work of constructing the sewerage system has been in progress a little over three years, the first ground having been broken at Ensor and Lanvale streets on October 22, 1906.

Forty-five contracts for sanitary work and eight contracts for storm-water drains have been let to date.

The total length of sewers and drains, including house and inlet connections, completed to December 31, 1909, is about 85.55 miles. The total number of manholes built to December 31, 1909, is 1,657. The total number of inlets built to December 31, 1909, is 970.

The sanitary sewers which have been completed include the Outfall Sewer, the High Level Interceptor as far west as Jones' Falls, and the Low Level Interceptor from Boston and Hudson streets to Warner and Alluvion streets. The last mentioned is entirely below tide level. These are large and costly

sewers, a single mile, in some sections, costing as much as 49 miles of the small lateral sewers.

In addition to the sanitary sewers and storm-water drains which have been constructed, the three sewage pumping engines, of 27,500,000 gallons daily capacity each, have been completed, ready for erection, together with their auxiliaries. The foundations of the sewage pumping station building are nearly ready for the superstructure. The grading for the entire disposal plant, covering an area of about 135 acres, has been completed, and the construction of a considerable part of this plant, costing about \$1,000,000, including 3 hydrolytic tanks, 3 sludge digesting tanks, 12 acres of broken stone sprinkling filters, 2 settling basins, control-house, supply and discharge conduits, venturi meters, etc., is well advanced.

The Appeal Tax Court's total of \$682,633,316 is the high water mark for Baltimore. The most notable increase is in personal property. The aggregate net valuation of the several classes under this head was \$319,915,365, against \$305,263,665 for 1909, an increase of \$14,651,700. Securities were \$148,234,010 for 1909 and are \$158,666,848 for 1910, a difference of \$10,432,838. Tangible personalty increased \$2,218,862. In real estate there is a reduction from the nominal total basis of \$370,137,707 for 1909 of \$362,717,951, the difference being \$7,419,756. This is accounted for largely by the marking down of the original assessments on easements and street structures under the compromise made by the city with public-service corporations and also in part by many reductions in the 1909 assessments on appeals and in the general review work and by clerical corrections in the books of the court.

E. H. HARRIMAN.

In the long list of notable railroad men to whom this country has given birth there is no one more distinguished by colossal undertakings and large achievement than Edward Henry Harriman, who died at Arden, New York, September 9, 1909, in his sixty-first year. To the qualities of a great financier he added those of breadth of intellect and great foresight, with practical insight into problems of railway construction and operation, grasp

of facts of production and commerce, self-confidence, audacity and executive ability. His genius was constructive. It cannot be said of him that he won his wealth and reputation solely by manipulation, at the expense of the properties he controlled. On the contrary, he reduced grades, eliminated curves and provided improved terminals and equipment, leaving the railways he fully controlled in better condition than he found them in.

CONDITIONS OF ADMISSION.

The Sanatorium is open to any white bona fide resident of the State of Maryland suffering from tuberculosis in its *primary* stage. Patients, whose circumstances will permit, are charged for board and medical attention sums ranging from \$3.50 to \$10.00 per week. Patients unable to pay are treated free. No patient is admitted until examined by one of the examining physicians.*

The Institution has been in operation for fifteen months, and is now filled to its utmost capacity, with a list of accepted patients awaiting admission. The present capacity of the Institution is 180 patients, which will be increased to 210 within a few weeks; 406 patients have been received for treatment to date.

FEDERAL INCOME TAX.

The States are invited by Congress to sanction an amendment to the Federal Constitution, making an income tax possible. In the States of Kentucky, Maryland, Mississippi and Virginia the Legislatures begin their sessions in Janu-

ary, 1910; in Louisiana in May; in Vermont in October, 1910. Most of the State Legislatures do not sit again till 1911, when interest in the matter will be considerable. Several States have already voted on the proposed tax, some favorably, some unfavorably.

THE NORTH POLE REACHED.

On September 1, 1909, a message came from Dr. Frederick A. Cook to Copenhagen, via the Shetland Islands, announcing that on April 21, 1908, he had reached the North Pole. The explorer went to Copenhagen on a Danish vessel and was lionized there. The records of his expedition were submitted by him to the University of Copenhagen for inspection. On September 6 a message came from Robert E. Peary, United States Navy, saying he had reached the North Pole April 6, 1909. On the following day he sent another message affirming that Dr. Cook's story was not

to be believed. Nevertheless Dr. Cook was generally credited with the honor of having first reached the Pole. On September 21 Dr. Cook arrived at New York and during the following weeks his graphic story, told in many chapters, was in great demand in the daily papers. It was also the theme of many well-paid lectures. In December the University of Copenhagen declared that Dr. Cook's records are not of a character to prove that he reached the Pole. Peary's records, subjected to like scrutiny at Washington, were held to show that his claim was valid.

NUMBER OF FEDERAL EMPLOYES.

At the end of November, 1909, the grand total of all Federal employes at present was approximately 370,065, as against 306,141 in 1907, an increase in the two years of about 64,000 persons, or about 20 per cent. There were 28,947 persons in Federal employ in Washing-

ton July 1, 1909, their annual payroll being \$31,541,225, or nearly \$1,100 each. This total will be swollen next year by the addition of 3,000 persons to the force of the Census Bureau, adding nearly \$5,000,000 in salaries during the year or more of their employment.

BALTIMORE SHIPBUILDING.

During 1909 40 vessels were launched from Baltimore shipyards, representing 24,915 tons, valued at approximately \$2,121,000, compared with 1908, when the output was 38 vessels, valued at \$1,476,000 and aggregating 19,366 tons.

No changes were made in the sugar and tobacco schedules beyond a minor change in the duty on saccharine. The cotton schedule was reclassified, the purpose being to make definite the plain intent of the Dingley Law which had been emasculated by judicial rulings,

the leaders declared, but the insurgent claim is that this classification results in raises of rates. There were no substantial changes in the wool schedule, which is virtually the same as under the Dingley law.

The Board of Shell Fish Commissioners, consisting of Walter J. Mitchell, of La Plata, chairman, Dr. Caswell Grave, Johns Hopkins University, secretary, and Benjamin K. Green, of Westover, treasurer, during 1909, continued the survey of the oyster bars in the waters of Baltimore, Kent, Queen Anne's and Talbot counties, and the adjacent bay waters. The area covered shows an increase of about 33 per cent. over the work of 1908. In addition to the Chester, Corsica, Miles, Wye, and part of Choptank Rivers, Eastern and Prospect Bays and numerous tributaries, 65 square miles of bay waters were surveyed during the season of 1909, making a total of more than 75 000 acres covered during one season; 575 buoys to mark the limits of the natural oyster bars in Southern Maryland water were established.

The published charts of Worcester county were filed April 12, 1909; Calvert county, December 14; St. Mary's and Charles county charts will be filed as soon as the Government publications are completed.

The Commission's sub-office at Crisfield, Md., in charge of an assistant engineer, is doing active work in Somerset and Wicomico counties. About 800 acres have been leased in Somerset waters, in lots of ten acres each, since January 1, 1909, and about 200 acres in Wicomico since the first of July. It is estimated that this area would have been doubled had the Legislature passed the amendments to the oyster law recommended by the commission.

There is a marked change in sentiment in the tide-water counties since the passage of the act. The hostile feeling against the survey and the commission has subsided. The oystermen are becoming convinced that they are getting a square deal and still have the natural bars to resort to for a livelihood.

April 3, at New York, Henri St. Yves, a chubby Frenchman of 20 years, from Paris, won the \$10,000 Marathon race, over a distance of 26 miles, 385 yards; time, 2 hours 40 minutes 50½ seconds. (Five laps to a mile.) Dorando Pietri, of Italy, was second; time, 2 hours 45 minutes 37 seconds. Tommy Hayes, of America, was third; time, 2 hours 49 minutes 27 seconds. Mat Maloney was fourth. Hayes was the winner of the Marathon race in the London Olympic games. Yves got \$5,000; Pietri, \$2,500; Hayes, \$1,500; Maloney, \$1,000.

THE ARUNDEL CLUB'S YEAR.

In 1909 the Arundel Boat Club of Baltimore made a record of races won. It established a new world's record for the Henley distance of 1 mile, 550 yards, doing it in 7 minutes, 5¾ seconds, against the old record of 7 minutes and 7¾ seconds. At Detroit it (Stoll and Parker) won the double race in the National and its four—Hoos. Stoll, Oehrl and Parker—were the only crew from among out-of-town contestants who won in the Hudson-Fulton celebration.

IMMIGRATION AT BALTIMORE, 1909.

The total of immigrants was 26,745, against 9,127 in 1908 and 68,436 in 1907. In the final of the tournament she met her rival, Miss E. H. Moore, the first to hold the indoor honor, and won, 6-0, 12-14, 6-0.

On May 8 Eustace H. Miles, former amateur British court tennis champion, recaptured the honor at the Queen's Club, defeating N. S. Lytton, 6-2, 6-1, 6-5.

At the Philadelphia Cricket Club, January 25, Miss Hazel Hotchkiss, of California, won in the woman's national tournament the national singles championship, defeating Mrs. Barger-Wallach, of New York, 6-0. 6-1. Also with Miss Rotch, of Boston, she won the woman's doubles, and with Wallace F. Johnson won the mixed doubles title. This excels May Sutton's record.

At the Catonsville Country Club, January 25, F. C. Colston and Basil Wagner won the championship in men's doubles by beating Dr. A. S. Bowie and J. A. C. Colston, 6-4, 6-4.

At the Green Spring Valley Hunt Club, July 2, Clarence Fisher beat Basil Wagner, 6-4, 6-3, 7-9, 6-4, retaining the championship won last year. At the same place, July 9, J. T. and T. H. Harrison beat Basil Wagner and Clarence Fisher, 3-6, 6-1, 8-6, 6-2.

At the Westchester Country Club, July 6, W. A. and E. P. Larned won the doubles cup matches over C. F. Watson, Jr., and Edgar W. Smith, 6-0, 6-3.

H. H. Hackett and R. D. Little, internationalists, beat W. T. Clothier, former national champion, and W. F. Johnson, the Pennsylvania State champion, 6-2, 9-7.

In the Mount Washington tournament, July 22, Campbell Colston beat Clarence Fisher in the finals at singles, and with Curran Harvey beat the crack Washington pair—Gordon and McLean—in the doubles. R. Leroy, of New York, September 11, at Baltimore Country Club, beat F. C. Colston, 4-6, 6-4, 6-4, 6-4, retaining the Catonsville challenge cup.

At the Germantown Cricket Club, September 14, in the Davis cup series, W. A. Larned beat J. C. Parke, 6-3, 6-2, 6-3, and W. J. Clothier beat C. P. Dixon, 6-3, 6-1, 6-4. At the Scat Congress Tournament, at the Germania Maennerchor Hall, Baltimore, September 5-6, the prize of \$500 was won by Peter Duenwald, Newark, N. J.; the second, \$100, by Prof. Arthur Classen, Brooklyn, N. Y.,

he having scored 1,025 points. Theodore H. Diener, Baltimore, won the third prize of \$80. Jos. E. Smith, of Baltimore, took a prize of \$50 for the game won with the least number of trumps.

HAMMER.

June 6, J. J. Flanagan, of the Irish-American Athletic Club, at Celtic Park, L. I., threw a 16-pound hammer from a 7-foot circle to a distance of 174 feet 3 3/4 inches, breaking the record of 173 feet 7 inches held by McGrath.

At the Benning racetrack, near Washington, September 23, John Flanagan broke the world's record (held by himself), throwing the 16-pound hammer 179 feet 10 inches.

MOTOR BOAT.

At New York, September 17, the Dixie II, owned by E. J. Schroeder, Jersey City, covered 37.8 miles in 60

minutes, doing 30 miles in 50 minutes 50 seconds. This won for her the world's international championship.

MOTOR CAR.

At Salt Lake City, September 7, F. M. Whittier made 2 miles in 2 minutes

and 9 3/4 seconds, lowering the record 4 1/2 seconds.

JUMP.

At Celtic Park, L. I., August 1, D. F. Ahearn in two hops and jump covered

50 feet 6 1/2 inches, breaking the 20-year-old record by 6 inches.

POLO.

July 5, The Meadow Brook polo team won the second and final match for the

cup from British players.

BICYCLE.

At Salt Lake City, August 21, Iver Lawson on his bicycle did two miles in

The race was down stream with the tide. Cornell won also the 4-oared 2-mile race from Syracuse by three lengths, and the freshman 2-mile 8-oared race from Syracuse by a length, the unofficial time of the last being 9.14.

At the Annual People's Regatta, on the Schuylkill River, July 5, the junior double sculls was won by the Arundel Boat Club of Baltimore, Quaker City Boat Club second. Time, 7 minutes 33 seconds. Lewis Stoll and Geo. E. Parker, Jr., were the rowers.

At the Seventh Annual Regatta of the American Rowing Association, at Philadelphia, May 22, the Arundel Boat

Club of Baltimore (Hoos, Ettill, Parker) won in the first 4-oared shell race, with New York A. C. second. Time, 7.05%, lowering the record 2 1/2 seconds.

The first 8-oared shells was won by the Harvard Junior eight. The second 8-oared shells was won by Pennsylvania freshmen. The Intercollegiate race was won by Cornell, with Harvard second, Pennsylvania third. Time, 6.25%, breaking the record of last year made by Yale.

On July 10, at Spring Garden, the Arundels won from the Arisls all four events of the Patapsco Navy regatta.

POOL.

At Boston, December 23, Tom Hueston, the world's champion pool player, beat Ben Allen, of Kansas City, by a score of 600 to 581, retaining thus his

title. During the playing Allen pocketed 85 balls straight, making a world's record, which had been held by Grant Eby since 1902.

AVIATION IN 1909.

(See Events of 1909 For Records.)

During 1909 remarkable progress was made in the art of flying, man adding to his dominion over land and sea the empire also of the air. The chief advance was in the use of the aeroplane. The cigar-shaped, rigid, dirigible balloon, it is true, proved in 1909 its utility for carrying persons over distances of hundreds of miles, at great heights, with comparative independence of the direction of winds, but, according to aeroplanists; it is at best only a balloon, not a flyer. It is not, they hold, a type from which much is to be expected. The aeroplane, on the other hand, has achieved wonders in speed and in ability to glide, soar and maneuver, and promises further evolution. It has carried one aviator across the English channel. Another it has borne high over the Eiffel Tower. A third it has rushed through space with the velocity of a hurricane for a distance of over a hundred miles. In a word, it solves the problem of flight in a very practical sense, carrying the aviator safely on journeys, the extent of which is limited only by the capacity of the oil tank which feeds his motor.

The aeroplane is merely a light plane (silk cloth stretched on a framework of light rods) which a motor, actuating a propeller, shoves against the air. The boy's kite is a similar plane which he causes to soar in the absence of wind, rushing it against the atmosphere by holding on to the kite string as he runs. He pulls the kite against the air, and, since the kite cannot suddenly move the mass of air in front, it slides over it—soars. The aviator's motor takes the boy's place, pushing the aeroplane against the air. By manipulating small vertical planes the aviator turns to the right or left and by turning up or down small outrigger horizontal planes, front and rear, he gives his machine, at will, an upward or downward direction. He cannot fall so long as his main plane is horizontal, the latter acting as a parachute. His motion is a glide. And he must keep moving, the faster the better.

There were demonstrations of the value of the aeroplane at the various aviation "meets" in the summer and fall of 1909 at Rheims, Brescia, Berlin, in England and in this country at New York and at College Park, Md. At Rheims every record for the heavier-than-air machines was broken, and the honors were almost evenly divided among the nations competing. Glenn H. Curtiss, of Hammondsport, N. Y., captured the International Cup by making three rounds of the track course, or thirty kilometers, at the rate of 45 miles an hour. This cup must be defended in 1910 by the Aero Club of America. The American also won the

prize for speed, reaching 47 miles an hour. The French won the prize for altitude, Latham reaching a height of 490 feet. They won also the prize in the lap-speed contest, Bleriot covering 10 kilometers in 7 minutes 47 seconds. For England, Farman won a prize by carrying two passengers, and won the Grand Prix de la Champagne of \$10,000. Rheims showed progress made in human flight in the last two years. On October 22, 1907, Farman attracted universal attention by flying 118 feet; on August 27, 1909, he flew 118 miles in 3 hours 5 minutes.

Two types of the aeroplane are chiefly used, the monoplane and the biplane. So far they have shown themselves about equally efficient and equally safe. Structurally the biplane seems the stronger and safer, but the simplicity of the monoplane recommends it to some experts who believe that it presents the type of the perfected flyer of the future. It was a biplane, that of Mr. Curtiss, which, at Rheims, gained the speed race of 30 kilometers, but it was Mr. Bleriot's monoplane that traveled 10 kilometers in the shortest time. Farman's biplane covered the greatest distance, 190 kilometers, but Latham's monoplane did 154 kilometers and could have gone further but for exhaustion of fuel supply. All of the world's leading aviators participated in the meet at Rheims, except Wilbur and Orville Wright. Machines of their design were, however, present, piloted by Tissandier, Comte de Lambert and Lefebvre. At Berlin, subsequently, the Wright machines, piloted by Orville Wright, made new records, among other feats, rising to the unprecedented height of 1,600 feet. Its excellence was established further in numerous flights at College Park, Md.

The future of the aeroplane according to sanguine aviators, is that, enlarged and strengthened, it will, in 10 or 15 years, be used for crossing the Atlantic, going from 70 to 80 miles an hour. It will come largely into use for sport and for scouting in time of war, but as a commercial proposition it makes little promise.

In Germany interest centered chiefly in the Zeppelin rigid or semi-rigid, dirigible balloon or airship, which succeeded in making trips of hundreds of miles, ascending to great heights; carrying many passengers and showing itself generally reliable. The "airship" is cigar-shaped and is 410 feet long. Where thickest it has a diameter of 39 feet. It is made over a frame of 16 rings held together by longitudinal aluminium rods which give it rigidity. Each of the 17 chambers formed by the braced rings contains a separate balloon, filled with gas. All are enclosed in a waterproof outer skin.

Personnel.

The authorized enlisted personnel of the Navy is 44,500 men; the actual strength on December 15, 1909, was 43,549. The number of authorized commissioned line officers is: 1 admiral, 18 rear admirals, 70 captains, 112 commanders, 200 lieutenant commanders, 350 lieutenants, and as many lieutenants of the junior grade and ensigns as can qualify from the graduates of the Naval Academy. The grade of junior lieutenant is practically vacant, owing to a shortage of officers and there were about 230 ensigns on December 15. An increase of 3,000 was asked for of the Sixty-first Congress.

NOTE.—The law provides for 18 regular rear admirals, the other 10 being additional numbers, especially promoted—Rear Admirals Marix, R. Rodgers, Schroeder, Wainwright, J. A. Rodgers, Potter, Harber, Mason, Rees and Dillingham, and their retirements will create no vacancies. Twelve of this number will be retired for age—62 years—during the present year, four of them being additional numbers. Those to be retired are Kimball, January 9; Sebree, February 20; Swift, March 17; Adams, May 4; Marix, May 10; Dillingham, June 3; J. A. Rodgers, July 26; Rees, September 4; Perry, September 16; Winslow, September 22; Phelps, November 7; Arnold, November 14. J. B. Milton, the top captain on the list, will be promoted on the retirement of Admiral Kimball, January 9, and himself will be retired October 20.

THE HEAVENS IN 1910.

The year 1910 will be marked by interesting astronomical events. Halley's comet will shine out so brightly in the evening sky that it will attract the attention of every one. Two total eclipses of the moon will be visible throughout the United States, and in December an occultation of the planet Saturn, an unusual sight.

At all times of the year, except for about six weeks, there will be at least one bright planet in the evening sky. Venus will pass to the west of the sun and enter the morning sky on February 12. During nearly the entire year it will remain a morning star, returning to the evening heavens on November 26.

Mars will grow faint until September. At this time the earth and Mars will be on opposite sides of the sun, more than 230 million miles apart so that in the telescope the planet will appear only about one-seventh as large as now. Jupiter in April will be high in the heavens by 9 o'clock in the evening,

and will remain our brightest and most interesting evening star till October 18. On this date the sun will pass the planet, which will then become a morning star. Similarly Saturn will be overtaken by the sun and enter the morning sky on April 16.

Three comets became visible in 1909-10. The first, a very faint little object, returns to the sun every six years, lying low down in the southwest just after sunset.

The second, a new bright little comet, was discovered December 7. Its path is uncertain.

Halley's comet during January will move westward from Arles. On March 23, having become easily visible to the unaided eye, it will enter the morning sky. On May 18 it will pass between the earth and sun, re-entering the evening sky and moving rapidly across the heavens from west to east. For several days after this date it will probably be a conspicuous and striking object.

HUDSON-FULTON CELEBRATION.

September 25, 1909, a replica of the "Yacht Halve Mane" (Half Moon), of 80 tons, 63 feet long and 17 feet beam, sailed up the Hudson River in commemoration of Schipper Heyndrik Hoitsen's voyage up that river 300 years before being accompanied by the Clermont, a replica of the uncovered paddle-wheeler steamer in which Robert Fulton, in 1807, made the run from Albany to New York at a speed of five miles an hour. Henry Hudson, it appears, was the son of a wealthy London merchant interested in foreign trade and discovered the river bearing his name while seeking a "passage by the Northern Pole to Japan and China." He was afterward turned adrift in an open boat by mutineers and perished. Fulton also

died embittered and insolvent. Both had failed of their aims.

The joint celebration of the two men's achievements was made an international event and was graced by the presence of 22 American battleships and cruisers, besides a large number of British, Dutch, French, German, Italian, Argentine, Mexican and other warships. Some 2,000,000 persons, ashore and afloat, witnessed the spectacle of the procession up the river of the Half Moon and Clermont, preceded by yachts and torpedo boats, past the saluting warships which lay at anchor. The illuminations were noticeably fine, especially those of the Singer and Metropolitan Life buildings, 612 and 657 feet high, respectively.

THE BUDGET CRISIS.

On November 30 the British House of Lords, by a vote of 350 to 75, rejected the Budget passed by the House of Commons, in order, as was said, to compel a dissolution of the Commons so that voters might have an opportunity to show whether they approve of the taxation proposed in the Budget. It was alleged in the Lords that the bill was not merely an appropriation bill, but a bill introducing socialistic ideas of taxation, with a view to the gradual confiscation of property in land, not taxing all wealth impartially, but chiefly one form of wealth. It was held to be the special duty of the Lords to give voters a chance to exercise their judgment upon important laws hastily

passed by the Commons. The leaders of the majority in the Commons, on the other hand, consider that the Lords exceed their constitutional powers in rejecting a finance bill and call for the abolition of the House of Lords, or a decided curtailment of its power. The real issue, however, is the tariff question. The Conservative party (the Lords are mostly Conservatives) propose a protective tariff as the best means of raising the large revenue needed to meet old age pensions, build warships, etc. The new taxes of the Budget are the reply of the Liberal, Radical and Socialist parties to the Conservative proposal. The policy of free imports, it is held, should continue to prevail.

LONGEST AND SHORTEST DAYS.

In the year 1910 the longest day will be the 22d day of June and the shortest the 22d day of December, as in these two days, respectively, the sun will reach its maximum declination north and south, called technically the summer and winter solstices. The equinoxes—that is, the period of the year when the sun is on the equator—take place in spring and autumn, introducing these two seasons. In the year 1910, the vernal equinox, with which the season of spring begins, occurs on the 21st of March, and the autumnal equinox, which introduces the season of autumn, is on the 22d of September. It must be remarked here, however, that for some

days before and after the solstices the difference of the length of the days is so small as to be scarcely perceptible, and this remark holds good with reference to the equinoxes, though the sun moves more swiftly near the equator than near the equinoxes.

The length of the day throughout the year depends upon the position of the sun with reference to the equator, or, to use a technical expression, upon the sun's declination. The day on which the sun attains its northernmost position, or its greatest declination north, is the longest, and the day on which it reaches its southernmost point, or its greatest declination south, is the shortest day.
