ASTRONOMICAL CALCULATIONS FOR THE YEAR 1911.

Comprising the latter part of the 135th and the beginning of the 136th year of the Independence of the United States of America.

The Astronomical Calculations in this Almanac are made for Baltimore, Md., or, more exactly, the position of Johns Hopkins University, in Long. 5 h. 6 m. 26 s. west of Greenwich and Lat. 39° 17' 48" N., and are given in Eastern Standard time (which corresponds to Long. 5 h. west of Greenwich). To express the data given in Baltimore Mean time, subtract 6 m. 26 s. from the values given.

The year 1911 corresponds to—

The year 6624 of the Julian Period.

The year 7419-7420 of the Byzantine Era, the year 7420 commencing on Sept. 1st.

The year 5671-5672 of the Jewish Era, the year 5672 commencing on September 23rd or, more exactly, at sunset of September 22nd.

The year 2664 since the foundation of Rome, according to Varro.

The year 2571 of the Japanese Era, and to the 44th year of the period entitled "Meiji."

The year 1329 of the Mohammedan Era, or the era of the Hegira, begins on the 2nd day of January, 1911, and the year 1330 begins on the 22nd day of December, 1911.

The first day of January of the year 1911 is the 2,419,038th day since the commencement of the Julian Period.

ECLIPSES.

In the year 1911 there will be two eclipses, both of the Sun.

1. A Total Eclipse of the Sun, 1911, April 28, visible at Baltimore as a small partial eclipse, the Sun setting eclipsed. The path of the total eclipse connects a point in the southwestern part of Australia with a point near the western coast of Central America, traversing therefore, the Pacific Ocean, the line curving at two-thirds of its length in an eastern direction.

2. An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, 1911, October 21, invisible at Baltimore.

MORNING AND EVENING STARS.

Venus is evening star until September 15, and then morning star for the remainder of the year.

Mars is morning star to November 25, and then evening star for the rest of the year.

Jupiter is morning star until April 30, then evening star until November 18, and then morning star again for the balance of the year.

Saturn is evening star until May 1, then morning star until November 10, and then evening star again for the remainder of the year.

BALTIMORE'S FOREIGN CONNECTIONS.

Engaged in foreign trade from Baltimore are the following lines of steamships with regular sailing days:

Johnston Line, to Liverpool; North German Lloyd, to Bremen; Puritan Line, to Antwerp; Blue Cross Line, to Havre; Neptune Line, to Rotterdam;

Lord Line, to Belfast and Cardiff; Furness Line, to Leith; Atlantic Transport Line, to London; Hamburg-American Line, to Hamburg; Donaldson Line, to Glasgow; Red Star Line, to Antwerp; Scandinavian-American Line, to Copenhagen and Christiania.

THE TIMES OF THE MOON'S SOUTHING, RISING AND SETTING AS INDICATED IN THE ALMANAC.

The Moon's "Southings," or that of any other celestial body, such as the Sun, the Planets, and the Stars, means its passing the *meridian* of the place for which the almanac is calculated. In the Sun Almanac the time expressed is the "Eastern Standard Time." The heavy figures throughout the astronomical portion of the Sun Almanac refer to P. M. time, that is from 12 o'clock noon to midnight, and the light figures to A. M. time, that is from midnight to noon. The dots in the column of the Moon's Southings mean that on that day the Moon did not reach the meridian, or, expressed in technical language, does not culminate, or, to use an almanac term, does not South. With reference to the times of the Moon's rising and setting, it is plain that these times are important only when they fall within the nocturnal hours. The dots in the column of the times of the Moon's Rising and Setting after heavy figures mean that the Moon on that day does not rise or set just according

as the last word was "Rises" or "Sets." When in that column the word "Rises" appears it means with the next day the times of the rising are recorded, these times being the hours from about 6 o'clock P. M. to about 6 o'clock A. M., the hours when the moonlight is of any importance to us. The time of the rising of the Moon on that day where the dots are, is a time of daylight, and consequently, of no importance to us. As to where the word "Sets" occurs in the following columns the times of the Moon's Setting are recorded from about 6 o'clock P. M. to A. M.—which are nocturnal hours and therefore of importance to us. On the day where the word "Sets" stands, the rising would be at day time, when the moonlight is of no importance to us. It follows, hence, that this column gives us complete information as to the Moon's position in the sky as far as it is of importance to us with reference to moonlight.

THE ZODIAC.

The apparent path of the sun in the heavens is along an ecliptic, which is inclined 23° 27' to the celestial equator. A belt 16° wide, 8° on each side of the ecliptic, within which are comprised the path of the moon and all of the planets known to the ancients, is known as the zodiac. This belt is divided into the twelve signs of the zodiac, each 30° in length. The first of these signs begins at the point when the sun's path crosses the equator

(when moving north in the spring) and is known as the sign of Aries, and the point of crossing is known as the vernal or spring equinox. The point when the sun's path crosses the equator when returning south in the fall is known as the autumnal equinox, and is the beginning of the sign Libra.

EVENING AND MORNING STARS.

Although Venus has ever been considered the morning or the evening star par excellence, every one of the planets acts in the capacity of a morning and an evening star. The inferior planets Mercury and Venus are evening stars from superior to inferior conjunction, and the superior planets Mars, Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus and Neptune from opposition to conjunction. It follows from

this that the duration of an evening star depends upon the synodical period of the respective planet, being one-half of it. Consequently Mercury shines as an evening star (or a morning star) about 2 months, Venus about 9½ months, Mars 13 months (the longest period of all), Jupiter 6½ months, Saturn 6¼ months, and Uranus 6 months.

BALTIMORE'S LIQUOR LICENSE REVENUE.

In 1907 the cost of a liquor license for a saloon, hotel or club was \$250. In 1908 the cost of the licenses was increased to \$500, in 1909 to \$750 and in 1910 to \$1,000.

A bottler's license costs \$160; wholesale grocer's, \$250; retail grocer's \$500. On June 2 the list was, licenses: 1,415 for saloons, 68 for hotels, 16 for clubs, 42 for wholesale liquor dealers, 25 for retail grocers, 7 for druggists and 18

for bottlers. The total receipts from all the licenses was \$1,558,130. The city's share of this was \$1,144,820.76.

The number of saloons in the city decreased from 2,153 in 1907 to 1,415 in 1910, and the number of hotels having licenses decreased from 130 in 1907 to 68 in 1910. "High license" has doubled the city's income from this source.

THE GREGORIAN CALENDAR.

The Gregorian Calendar was accepted immediately or shortly after its promulgation by all Roman Catholic countries. The Protestant states of Germany and the Kingdom of Denmark adhered to the Julian Calendar till 1750. It was in 1752 that the British Parliament abolished the Julian Calendar, or old style, as it was called. The act of Parliament decreed that the day following September 2, 1752, should be called the 14th of that month.

When the alteration was made by Gregory it was only necessary to drop ten days, the year 1700 having intervened, which was a common year in the Gregorian, but a leap year in the Julian Calendar, it was now necessary to drop eleven days.

The "old style" is still adhered to in Russia.

By far the largest negro assessments in Baltimore were in the Northwestern (\$300,186) and the Northeastern (\$131,966) police districts, where the negro population is densest. Of the 81,381 negroes in all districts, 34,332 were in the former and 11,654 in the latter. Adult males totaled 23,848, females 29,676. There were 14,565 male children and 13,292 female. Five counties are omitted from the above table because of difficulty in disentangling records of white and colored assessments. Were they included the total negro holdings would aggregate, it is estimated, \$3,000,000 in real estate, to say nothing of personality.

A TOTAL OF 48 STATES.

The bill passed admitting Arizona and New Mexico into the Union will probably enable them to become States by July 4, 1911, making the number of States 48 and increasing the membership of the Senate in 1912 to 96. It will perhaps be years before Alaska, Porto Rico or Hawaii will be admitted, to say nothing of the Philippines. Arizona's population was estimated to be 150,000; New Mexico's, 225,000.

MIDSHIPMEN OF THE UNITED STATES NAVY.

Appointments to the Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland.

The minimum age for admission is 16 years; maximum 20. Two midshipmen are allowed for each Senator, Representative and Delegate in Congress, two for the District of Columbia and five each year from the United States at large. The appointments from the District of Columbia and five each year at large are made by the President. One midshipman is appointed by the President from Porto Rico on the recommendation of the Governor of Porto Rico. Each Senator, Representative and Delegate in Congress may appoint one midshipman during each Congress.

The course for midshipmen is six years—four years at the Academy, and two years at sea, at the expiration of which time the examination for final graduation takes place.

Graduates are appointed to fill vacancies in the lower grades of the line of the Navy, and of the Marine Corps, in the order of merit.

THE EXAMINATIONS.

1. The general mental examination held on the third Tuesday in April, under the supervision of the Civil Service Commission, at points named.

2. A second mental examination at Washington, D. C., only on the second Tuesday in May, under the supervision of the Civil Service Commission.

3. A third examination at Annapolis, Md., only on the third Tuesday in June, under the supervision of the Superintendent of the Naval Academy. Candidates are notified when to appear at Annapolis for physical examination.

Alternates also are nominated and these may report for examination at the same time as the principals. There may be a special examination after the third Thursday of June.

Candidates failing to pass the entrance examination are allowed another examination for admission to the same class if recommended for re-examination by the Board of Examiners.

The Civil Service Commission examines only candidates whose names have been furnished by the Navy Department. All correspondence relative to the nomination and examination of candidates should be addressed to the Bureau of Navigation, Navy Department, Washington, D. C.

Nominations for examination in April should be forwarded to the Bureau ten days prior to the date of examination, as that is the latest date at which arrangements can be made for the examination. Candidates must enter the Academy immediately after examination. Candidates are examined mentally in reading, writing, punctuation, spelling, arithmetic, geography, English grammar, United States history, World's history, algebra through quadratic equations, and plane geometry (five books of Chauvenet's Geometry, or an equivalent.)

On entering the Academy the appointee signs an agreement to serve in the Navy eight years, including his time of probation at the Naval Academy. A midshipman's pay is \$600 a year, commencing from the date of admission. The expenses for equipment at entrance are \$226.35. A preliminary deposit of \$30 for clothing is required.

THE APPALACHIAN FOREST BILL.

The Appalachian Forest Bill, which has been before Congress for so many years, passed the House in 1910 by a vote of 130 to 111 before its adjournment. Action by the Senate was

postponed until February, 1911. The bill provides for or makes possible national forest reserves in the White Mountains and in the Southern Appalachians.

THERMOMETRIC SCALES.

Taking Fahrenheit's scale the boiling point of water is 212°, whereas in the Centigrade scale it is 100°.

The freezing point of water is 32° Fahr. and 0° Centigrade.

Consequently 180° plus 32° Fahr. is equal to 100 Centigrade.

So, to convert Fahrenheit to Centigrade, subtract 32, multiply by 5 and divide by 9.

To convert Centigrade to Fahrenheit multiply by 9, divide by 5 and add 32.

This does away with the recurrence of decimals.

Similarly, according to Reaumur's scale, the boiling point of water is 80° and the freezing point 0°.

To convert Fahrenheit to Reaumur subtract 32, multiply by 4 and divide by 9.

To convert Reaumur to Fahrenheit multiply by 9, divide by 4 and add 32.

1. New Year's day, January 1.

In addition all special days that may be appointed or recommended by the Governor of this State or the President of the United States as days of thanksgiving, fasting and prayer or other religious observances, or for the general cessation of business, become legal holidays. This is provided for in Article 13, Section 9 of the Code. Under it the following may become holidays in this State:

Labor Day—the first Monday in September—It is a national holiday by Act of Congress approved June 28, 1894.

Columbus Day—October 12.

Arbor and Bird Day—By resolution of the General Assembly of 1894, the Governor of Maryland is authorized to designate by proclamation one day in April every year for tree planting, to be known as "Arbor Day."

Maryland Day—March 25, the anniversary of the landing at St. Clements Island, now Blackstone Island, St. Mary's county, of the first settlers in Maryland, in the year 1634, is not a legal holiday, but is commemorated by special exercises in the public schools of the State.

Repudiation Day—The General Assembly of 1894 made November 23 a bank half-holiday in Frederick county, under the title of "Repudiation Day," in commemoration of the repudiation of the stamp act in 1765.

BALTIMORE'S MONUMENTS.

Baltimore has many monuments. First of these is the Washington Monument, a gigantic shaft, on Washington Place, supporting a heroic statue of George Washington, erected by the State; the Battle Monument; Wells and McComas Monument, on Aisquith street; on the Samuel Ready property, the first monument ever erected in commemoration of the discovery of America by Columbus; the monument to Thomas Wilkey, the founder of the Odd Fellows, on Broadway, near the Church Home; a monument on Mount Royal Place to the memory of the soldiers and sailors who lost their lives in the Confederate Army; the Soldiers and Sailors' Monument, at the entrance to Druid Hill Park. Bas-reliefs adorn various buildings and monuments in the city, among them the relief showing the face of Poe, the poet, on the monument in Westminster Cemetery, Fayette and Greene streets; Andrew Carnegie and Michael Jenkins, on the New Maryland Institute; on Madison Avenue, No. 908, is an inscription identifying the house in which Gen. R. E. Lee resided when living in Baltimore before the Civil War. There are also these memorials: A fine mural statue of Washington in Druid Hill Park; sitting statue of George Peabody, at Mount Vernon

Place; statue of Chief Justice Roger B. Taney, Washington Square; equestrian statue of Gen. John Eager Howard, Washington Square; statue of Severn Teackle Wallis, Charles street, near Centre; a bust of the same gifted lawyer and reformer is in the new Courthouse; a statue of Sir William Wallace, the noted Scotchman, in Druid Hill Park and a statue of Columbus nearby, erected by the Italians of the city; the bust of Wagner in Druid Hill Park; William McKinley bust, located in the Postoffice at the Calvert street entrance; the military statue of Lieut.-Col. William H. Watson, the Mexican War veteran, on Mount Royal avenue; the statue of Cecilius Calvert in front of the Courthouse; the statue of J. Chapman Ridgely, a prominent member of the Odd Fellows, in Harlem Park; the bust of Dr. William Osler, by Hans Schuler, in McCoy Hall; a fine bust of Sydney Lanier, the poet, in the University Club. A statue of Francis Scott Key will soon be placed at the intersection of Putaw Place and Lanvale street, thanks to the public spirit of Mr. Charles Marburg. A statue of John M. Hood, who created the Western Maryland Railroad, is in preparation, as also a statue of Schiller.

NEW RAILROAD LAW.

The new Federal law creates a Commerce Court, brings telegraph, telephone and cable companies within the Interstate Commerce Commission's jurisdiction and enlarges this jurisdiction as

respects the regulations and proceedings of railroads, etc. Supervision of rates is entrusted to the Commission and investigation of stock and bond issues is authorized.

RICHARD M. VENABLE.

In the death of Maj. Richard Venable, at Roland Park, July 10, 1910, Baltimore lost a valued citizen, remarkable for clarity of intellect, wide knowledge, originality, elevation of sentiment, public spirit, genial optimism and ready wit. He was a Confederate soldier, an officer, a teacher, a contributor to the press, a lawyer, a political reformer, a member of the City Council and president of the Park Commission—and successful in all.

His natural and acquired abilities qualified him well for the unique position he occupied in Baltimore's public life—a position of authority, of trust, of moral leadership.

The most striking feature of Major Venable's well-rounded character was his intellectual honesty and independence. He was independent in opinion and conduct. Having acquired early in his legal career an adequate competence, and his rugged honesty being beyond

question, he was by common consent in his public acts absolved from suspicion of self-seeking. His work, for example, of re-creating and expanding Baltimore's park system on this account received hearty co-operation.

Though intellectual in the highest degree and imbued with the modern critical and scientific spirit, he was also emotional, open, expansive, frank and generous, sharing the wide human sympathy that characterizes the civilization of the twentieth century. His heart was big, like his burly frame. By reason of his personal appearance—his build, the shape of his head and features—as well as his colloquial method, Major Venable was often compared with Socrates, whom he in many ways resembled. He was unmarried.

A few days after his death, in accordance with his wish, his body was cremated and his ashes were scattered in Druid Hill Park.

The special federal census showed that in 1909 there were 3,076 permits issued in Baltimore for buildings costing \$9,761,788, as compared with 2,893 permits in 1908 for buildings costing \$7,554,709. The gain in 1909 was \$2,207,079, or 29.21 per cent., and the

rank of Baltimore in the matter of the cost of buildings erected was 22.

The permits for new wooden buildings in 1909 were 129, and the cost \$541,529; the permits for brick buildings, 2,447, the cost \$8,712,392.

BEGINNING OF UNITED SOUTH AFRICA.

The first Cabinet was formed May 30, 1910, with General Botha in the office of Premier and Minister of Agriculture, Viscount Gladstone being the first Governor-General. Cape Town is to be the seat of the Legislature and Pretoria the seat of the Executive Government. In the elections for the first Parliament

the Boers won over the opposition, but Botha failed of election in first balloting.

The final position of parties in the Parliament is as follows: Nationalists (Boer), 67; Unionists (Pro-English), 37; Laborites, 4; Independents, 13. The Boer majority over all is 13, or with the Laborites, 21.

On May 6, 1910, Edward VII., of England, died in consequence of a chill. His son George was, at Windsor, proclaimed King in his stead with the title George V. At the dead King's

funeral nine reigning monarchs represented their respective countries, besides many princes, ministers and other eminent personages.

*The Vice-President is, of course, first in the order of succession, but till he succeeds to the Presidency he is not a member of the Executive Government. The President's salary is \$75,000; Vice-President's, \$12,000; Secretary of State, \$8,000; other members of the Cabinet, \$12,000.

EGYPTIAN POLITICS.

Ibrahim Wassif el Wardani was executed at the prison in Cairo in June, for shooting Boutros Pasha, the Egyptian Prime Minister, February 20, 1910, as he was coming out of the Foreign Office. In his possession were found documents showing he was tampering with the army and trying to import arms for rebellious purposes. His counsel held that

his crime was no crime since it was political. The sentence of death was submitted to the Mufti, the head of the Moslem community, for confirmation. The Mufti refused to sanction it on the ground that a Moslem cannot be condemned to death for the murder of a non-Moslem. He was, nevertheless, executed.

THE JUDICIARY SYSTEM.

The judges of the courts of Maryland, except the Orphans' Court, are elected for 15 years. They are required to be not less than 30 years of age at the time of election, and are re-eligible until the age of 70 years, but not thereafter, though the Legislature, by joint resolution, may enable any judge already in office to fill out an unexpired term beyond the limit. The counties are grouped into seven circuits, and the City of Baltimore is designated as the eighth circuit. A chief judge and two associate judges are provided for each circuit in the counties. The chief judges of the county circuits and a judge specially elected in Baltimore City constitute the Court of Appeals. The Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, designates the mem-

ber of the Court of Appeals who shall be the chief or presiding judge of that tribunal. A court is required to be held in each county of the State, to be styled the Circuit Court for the county in which it may be held. No two of the associate judges shall reside in the same county. Baltimore City, the eighth Judicial Circuit, is provided with a Supreme Bench—a chief and nine associate judges, in addition to one judge of the Court of Appeals. The total number of judges is 32.

Every county having 18,000 population or less, 2 Delegates.

Every county having over 18,000 and less than 28,000, 3 Delegates.

28,000 and less than 40,000, 4 Delegates.

40,000 and less than 53,000, 5 Delegates.

55,000 and upwards, 6 Delegates.

Each of the four legislative districts of Baltimore, one Senator and as many Delegates as the largest county. No county can have more than six Delegates.

THE FISHERIES AWARD.

The International Court of Arbitration at The Hague, on September 7, gave its decision in the Newfoundland fisheries case submitted by the Governments of the United States and Great Britain, involving the local governments of Canada and Newfoundland. The dispute was mainly about the meaning of the treaty of 1818 between England and the United States in regard to the right of our citizens to fish in Canadian and Newfoundland waters. Of the seven questions before the court the first and fifth were decided in favor of England, with some slight reservations; the rest, in favor of the United States. The decision of the first question asserts England's complete sovereignty of the shores under dispute, and her right to make, without consulting the United States, reasonable regulations to be ob-

served by the fishermen of both nations.

The decision on the fifth question sets aside the American contention that we were at liberty to enter all bays over six miles wide at the mouths and that in such bays the territorial limit should be three miles from low-water mark. The United States is confirmed in its right of inshore fishing all around the Magdalen Islands in the Gulf of St. Lawrence and along the southwestern and western shores of Newfoundland, from the Ramea Islands, in the south, to Cape Norman, in the Strait of Belle Isle; also along the shores of Labrador from Mount John eastwardly to a point north of the Strait of Belle Isle. England won on the large questions of sovereignty and territorial rights, while the United States won on the practical issues.

Regulations.

Class 1. Includes letters, postal cards, sealed packages, all matter wholly or partly in writing, except permissible additions to third and fourth-class matter, whether manuscript or produced by typewriter or copying press, books with written entries, manuscript for publication not accompanied by proof sheets, and all personal correspondence, whether in writing or in print.

Class 2. Nearly every newspaper and magazine published in the United States belongs to the second class and foreign publications which, if issued here, would be admitted to that class, may be mailed at the rate given above. Second-class matter must be so enveloped that it can be readily examined without destroying the wrappers. When mailed by publishers or news agents, the rate is 1 cent for each pound or fraction thereof.

Class 3. Single books may be sent at

the third-class rate, even though they may exceed the 4-pound limit of weight.

The sender may write or print on a label, tag, envelope or wrapper of third-class matter, his own name, occupation and residence or business address, preceded by the word "from."

Class 4. This embraces single books (not printed matter) which weigh more than 4 pounds. There are specific regulations for packing merchandise and samples of goods sent as fourth-class matter. Proprietary articles, such as powders, pills, fancy soaps, may be sent in original packages, sealed. Seeds and other articles requiring to be specially protected may be put in sealed envelopes if the envelopes are transparent enough to permit the nature of the contents to be ascertained. Admissible liquids, oils, pastes, salves, ointments, fresh fruits and vegetables liable to decomposition, etc., may be sent under specified regulations.

Prohibited Matter.

The following articles are unmailable under any circumstances: Liquids, ardent, vinous, spirituous or malt, cocaine or its derivatives, or those liable to explosion or spontaneous combustion; inflammable oils, poisons, explosives; animals, alive or dead (stuffed natural specimens excepted); explosive or poisonous powders, matches, insects (except queen bees and their attendant bees and dried insects when safely secured), substances exhaling an offensive odor; all articles not properly packed which are liable to destroy, deface or

damage other mail matter or to harm the person of anyone in the postal service; obscene and indecent books, prints, writings or papers; all letters upon envelopes of which, or postal cards upon which, indecent, scurrilous or defamatory delineations or language are written or printed; all matter concerning lotteries, so-called gift concerts, or other similar enterprises offering prizes, or concerning schemes devised or intended to defraud the public, or for the purpose of obtaining money under false pretenses.

POSTAL RATES AND REGULATIONS—Continued.

Special Delivery.

The delivery of a letter, or other mailable matter, immediately after its arrival at the postoffice to which it is addressed, can be secured by placing on it a "special delivery" stamp. When this stamp (cost, 10 cents) is placed on mailable matter, in addition to the postage ordinarily required, the postal authorities undertake to dispatch it for delivery, by special messenger, within a few minutes after its arrival. The period within which the Postal Regulations require special delivery to be made is between 7 A. M. and 11 P. M. If the person to whom special delivery mail is addressed cannot be found by the special messenger, such mail loses its special character and is delivered by regular carrier as ordinary mail, on next delivery. If it is difficult to obtain a special delivery stamp, special

delivery can be secured by using 10 cents worth of ordinary stamps (in addition to the postage ordinarily required), provided the words "Special Delivery" in large letters are written near the extra stamps. Otherwise clerks may, in the rush of business, readily overlook the fact that special delivery is desired. The purpose of the special delivery stamp is to secure the prompt delivery of mail by special messenger, instead of its handling by carrier with other mail. If additional safeguards are desired, mail should be registered, and for the remittance of money use should invariably be made of the Money Order System. Special delivery may be made within the carrier-limits of free delivery postoffices and within one mile of other postoffices.

Foreign Postal Rates.

The rates on *letters* mailed in the United States to Foreign Countries are as follows: To Great Britain and Ireland, Germany (if carried direct), Newfoundland, Republic of Panama, Mexico, Canada, Cuba and Shanghai, China, the same as domestic rates, *i. e.*, 2 cents the ounce or fraction thereof. To all other Foreign Countries, 5 cents the first ounce and 3 cents for each additional ounce or fraction thereof. *Postal Cards*: Single, 2 cents; double, 4 cents each. *Commercial Papers*: 1 cent for each 2 ounces or fraction, but not less than 5 cents on each packet. *Printed Matter*: 1 cent for each 2 ounces or fraction. *Samples of Merchandise*: 1 cent for each 2 ounces or fraction. *Postage* must be fully prepaid on matters to Canada, Mexico and Shanghai. *Postage*

on matter to other foreign countries should be fully prepaid, as double the deficiency will be charged on delivery. Sealed matter, other than letters in their usual and ordinary form are excluded from the mails to Canada, Mexico, Cuba, Panama and Shanghai; to all other countries they may be mailed at letter rate of postage. Canada alone admits second-class matter without limit to weight. Postage to Canada and Mexico, same rate and conditions of prepayment as for domestic matter. Merchandise at the rate of 12 cents the pound, or fraction thereof, can be mailed by *Parcels Post* at the main office between the hours of 9 A. M. and 5 P. M., daily, except Sunday, to the following countries:

A "reply-coupon" is on sale at post-offices (price six (6) cents), which, upon presentation at postoffice in Foreign Countries (with certain exceptions), will entitle the person presenting it to receive (without charge) a postage stamp of that country. By this arrangement a person in the United States can furnish his correspondent with a postage stamp with which to prepay postage on a reply to his letter.

REGISTERED MATTER.

The fee for registering mail matter is 10 cents, in addition to the regular postage. These charges must be paid in advance. The maximum amount of indemnity which may be paid for loss of domestic registered mail matter of

the first class has been increased from \$25 to \$50.

Unsealed packages of mailable merchandise may be registered and sent by parcels post to any of the countries named in the list under caption "Foreign Postal Rates," except as noted therein.

DEGREES OF LONGITUDE AND LATITUDE.

It is only on the equator that a degree of longitude is 69 $\frac{1}{4}$ statute or 60 nautical or geographic miles, the latter in the nautical language also called knots. With increasing latitudes this length decreases. So in our own latitude, about 40°, one degree of longitude

measures only 53 miles. Near the poles these distances become very small. Degrees of latitude also vary, increasing with increasing latitudes. While a degree of latitude near the equator measures about 68.7 miles, near the poles it measures nearly 69.4 miles.

CAUSE OF PELLAGRA.

Pellagra occurs in all the continents, but is specially frequent in the foothills of the Pyrenees, Alps, Carpathians and Balkans. The word means "rough skin." The disease is characterized by a rash like a severe sunburn on the face, neck, back, hands and feet. It recurs yearly in spring and autumn, after exposure to the sun. There is then a scaling, fever, giddiness, a sensation of falling backward, debility, copious salivation, insomnia and diarrhoea. These symptoms disappear in winter and return in spring. After from 3 to 30 years the patient becomes paralyzed and demented.

Dr. Sanborn has found, says the London Times of October 17, 1910, that pellagra is caused by a bacterium carried by a sand-fly of the genus Simulium. It passes its larval stage in the water of swift streams attached to stones or water plants. The fly remains near the streams, as a rule, and bites fiercely in the early morning and at sunset, never in the hot hours. It never enters towns. Its bite communicates the microbe (that causes the disease) to persons near the infested streams. Pellagra is not hereditary nor contagious and affects only country people.

WHAT FIVE-MILE LIMIT WOULD INCLUDE IN BALTIMORE.

Were the present city limits extended five miles on the west, north and east, the western boundary would be within three-quarters of a mile of Ellicott City and would extend north to a point a short distance above the McDonogh Institute. Turning east then, the new line would pass to the north of Garrison Forest, Chattolance and Brooklynville Stations and Towson, and would intersect the new eastern boundary at a point northeast of Loch Raven Postoffice. Coming south, the line would run east of Cub Hill and near Stemmers Run Postoffice, cross Back River below Hollywood and take in Sparrows Point.

STREET RAILWAYS OF BALTIMORE.

A new survey of the entire track system of the United Railways was made during 1909. The company now operates 400,764 miles of single track, of which 171,143 miles are laid with "T" rail, mainly on suburban lines; 2 miles with duplex rail; 179,951 miles with 9-inch girder rail, and 47,670 miles with various smaller girder sections. January

1, 1910, there were 210 transfer points, with 1,829 direction privileges. The number of transfers used during the year 1909 was 57,030,556, about 40 per cent. of the paying passengers having availed of the transfer privilege, and the average rate per capita was 3.46 cents, or, deducting park tax, 3.15 cents.

BALTIMORE'S PASTEUR INSTITUTE.

The Pasteur Institute of Baltimore City (College of Physicians and Surgeons), has completed, under the direction of Dr. N. G. Keirle, the treatment of 1,498 cases for the prevention of hydrophobia. Of the 1,498 cases treated only three are reported to have died of hydrophobia. The rate of mortality was one-fifth of 1 per cent. Without the Pasteur treatment, the mortality from bites of rabid animals is from 5 to 80 per cent., depending upon the situation and severity of the wounds.

It was ascertained that 838 of the 1,498 persons treated were bitten by animals that were rabid. The wounds were inflicted by dogs in 1,326 cases, in 94 cases by cats, in 3 by a calf, in 1 by a pet pig, in 11 by cows, in 14 by horses, in 1 by guinea pig, and in 4 by human beings. In 51 cases the wounds were not the result of bites.

Of the 1,498 persons treated 976 were males and 422 females. Two hundred and seventy-three children under 10 years old were treated, being 12 per cent. of all patients received. The youngest treated was 7 months old; the oldest, 82 years.

PORTUGAL'S REVOLUTION.

The President, Senhor Theophilo Braga, and Cabinet announced a policy of expulsion of monks and nuns and separation of church and state.

The qualifications of candidates for admission into this free school for boys, founded by John McDonogh, who was born in Baltimore, December 29, 1779, and died in New Orleans, October 26, 1850, are as follows:

1. They must be poor boys, of good character, of respectable associations in life, residents of the City of Baltimore.

2. They must be sound and healthy in mind and body.

3. They must be between 10 and 14 years of age.

4. They must pass a competitive examination.

Applications for admission should be made to Robert H. Smith, President of the Board of Trustees, 624 Equitable Building, at any time of the year. Applications, however, are so numerous that admission is determined by competitive examinations held early in June at some convenient place in Baltimore, of which candidates are notified. The

examinations are based on the work of the Public Schools of Baltimore, a different set of questions being given to the boys of the several grades—Third, Fourth, Fifth and Sixth. The subjects of examination are arithmetic, reading, geography and a composition on an assigned subject as a test of the knowledge of English. The regular term at the school ends when the boy is 16 years of age, but the earning of an honorary scholarship may enable him to continue there one year longer.

The property of the foundation consists of 835 acres of land in a beautiful and healthy region, 12 miles northwest of Baltimore City, with commodious buildings; an endowment fund of \$725,600 from John McDonogh invested in Baltimore City bonds; bequest of Dr. Zenus Barnum of \$80,000 to promote mechanical instruction and manual training; bequest of Samuel H. Taggart of \$175,000.

The school was organized in 1848. In 1909-10 it had 45 teachers and 1,500 pupils. The courses embrace training in drawing, design, painting in oil and water colors, modeling in clay, illustration, and the industrial features of mechanical and architectural drawing, design and applied art, carried on in the actual materials of clay, metal,

wood and leather. There are evening classes in silversmithing and jewelry.

The Mount Royal avenue building gives accommodation for the entire day school and the free-hand night classes. The mechanical and architectural divisions of the night school occupy the building at Market Place and East Baltimore street, where also there is maintained a Saturday elementary mechanical class.

STATE ROADS COMMISSION.

The State Roads Commission is charged by the Acts of 1908 and 1910 with the construction of a system of highways throughout the State for which appropriations of \$6,000,000 have been made. It also administers the State Aid and Baltimore-Washington Acts.

The Commission on May 1, 1909, had completed its work of selecting the system of State roads to be improved by indicating a continuous system of 1,200 miles of main road in and through all the counties of the State. The actual construction began in June, 1909. Work was started almost simultaneously in Caroline and Cecil counties, and before the summer was over, was under way in 18 counties. No contracts were actually completed by the close of the season, although about 42 miles of macadam had been built. Contracts had been let for 100 miles of road up to this time.

In 1910, the work was resumed and additional arrangements were made by the Commission for other work so that by October 1, 1910, plans were in effect for the improvement of 280 miles of the State road system at an estimated cost of \$3,000,000. Of these, 80 miles were completed in 1910, and the remainder are expected to be completed in 1911, together with probably some additional mileage to be arranged for early in 1911.

The Legislature of 1910 authorized, in addition to the original \$5,000,000

loan, another loan of \$1,000,000 for the improvement of the Baltimore-Annapolis road, the construction of some large inter-county bridges, and the further completion of the State Roads system.

Also this Legislature consolidated, in the hands of the State Roads Commission, all the State road work, transferring to it the administration of the State Aid or "Shoemaker" law and the Baltimore-Washington road law, formerly in the hands of the Maryland Geological Survey, this transfer taking place on June 1, 1910. Up to that date 113 miles of road costing \$890,534.35 had been completed under the State Aid Act and 19 miles of the Baltimore-Washington road costing \$218,304.55. There were outstanding on that date contracts for 45½ miles under the State Aid law (of which over 18 miles were practically, though not formally completed) and 1½ miles on the Baltimore-Washington road. Since June first contracts have been let under the State Aid law for 5 miles and the total completed mileage of State Aid roads at the close of the year 1910 is 143 miles.

The State Geological and Economic Survey is concerned with the preparation of reports and maps dealing with the geology, topography, hydrography, and agricultural soils of the State. This work is carried on as far as possible in co-operation with the scientific bureaus of the Federal Government. The Survey is engaged in the prepara-

tion and publication of a map, on the scale of one mile to one inch which affords the base for the representation of the topography, the geological formations, the forest growth, and the agricultural soils. This work is now well advanced toward completion and maps of many of the counties are available.

6. The dioceses and missionary districts within the States of Minnesota, Iowa, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Montana, Wyoming and Colorado.

7. The dioceses and missionary districts within the States of Missouri, Arkansas, Texas, Kansas, Oklahoma and the Territory of New Mexico.

8. The dioceses and missionary districts within the States of Idaho, Utah, Washington, Oregon, Nevada, California and the Territories of Arizona, Alaska and Hawaii, and the missionary district of the Philippine Islands.

In each judicial department there is a court of review, composed of a bishop therein, three presbyters, canonically resident, and three lay communicants of the Church, two at least of the laymen to be men learned in the law, having domicile in the department.

JUVENILE COURT, BALTIMORE.

The Juvenile Court was created by the Act of 1902, Chapter 611, which provides for the appointment by the Governor of a magistrate for juvenile causes, with exclusive jurisdiction in all cases of minors under sixteen years of age, except in charges of felony, and the same jurisdiction as the police magistrates in Baltimore. In 1904 these powers were enlarged. The court holds

its sessions in the Courthouse daily, except Sundays and legal holidays.

BALTIMORE'S PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

For the year ended December 31, 1909, the number of pupils enrolled was 68,120; average belonging, 61,878; average attending, 55,011; teachers, 1,682. Average cost of education per pupil enrolled in all schools, \$23.61; in attendance, \$30.65; Polytechnic, \$93.20; City College, \$74.12; Colored Training and High School, \$62.49; Eastern High School, \$48.37; Western High School, \$39.54; night schools, \$6.94.

Amount expended on the school system, \$1,686,561, of which \$1,432,086.35

went in day school salaries. The average annual salary of all teachers was \$715.20. Elementary teachers, numbering 1,514, desire increase of salary to \$900. Estimates for 1911 make the present average salary of this class of teachers nearly \$600. To give the increase demanded would call for \$478,702 and add 15 cents to the tax-rate. Advances in salaries since 1899 have been \$208,216. The City has \$5,000,000 of school property, the part represented by city stock being \$1,800,000.

LONGEST AND SHORTEST DAYS.

In the year 1911 the longest day will be the 22d day of June and the shortest the 22d day of December, as in these two days, respectively, the sun will reach its maximum declination north and south, called technically the summer and winter solstices. The equinoxes—that is, the period of the year when the sun's on the equator—take place in spring and autumn, introducing these two seasons. In the year 1911, the vernal equinox, with which the season of spring begins, occurs on the 21st of March, and the autumnal equinox, which introduces the season of autumn, is on the 23rd of September. It must

be remarked, however, that for some days before and after the solstices the difference of the length of the days is so small as to be scarcely perceptible, and this remark holds good with reference to the equinoxes, though the sun moves more swiftly near the equator than near the equinoxes.

The length of the day throughout the year depends upon the position of the sun with reference to the equator. The day on which the sun attains its northernmost position, or its greatest declination north, is the longest, and the day on which it reaches its southernmost point, or its greatest declination south, is the shortest day.

SOUTHERN PROGRESS.

The South* had good reasons in 1910 to celebrate Thanksgiving, in view of ample crops valued at over \$2,600,000,000. Cotton, including cotton seed, approached \$1,000,000,000 in value. Grain crops were as follows:

The above table shows the close seasons for game in detail in Maryland (in which county laws prevail). Special attention is called to the restrictions on shipment under the Federal and State laws:

The Federal Law prohibits shipment from the State of game killed in violation of the laws of that State; that is, game killed during the close season, by illegal methods, or for sale when sale or export are prohibited by the State. Penalty, fine not exceeding \$200. (Carrier and consignee may also be liable.)

The Federal Law also prohibits shipment of game from the State at any time, in packages not marked so that name and address of shipper, and nature of contents may be readily ascertained by inspection of the outside of the package. Penalty, fine not exceeding \$200. (Carrier and consignee may also be liable.) The State law prohibits shipment under certain conditions, as shown.

Details in regard to shipment, sale and licenses are contained in Farmer's Bulletin No. 336, "Game Laws for 1908," which may be had free upon application to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.

times except as follows: A nonresident hunting legally may take with him out of the State, open to view and labeled with his name and address, 1 deer, 50 quail (partridges), 10 grouse (pheasants), 3 wild turkeys, 30 waterfowl and shore birds to the number of 25 of each kind or 100 in all, killed by himself; any citizen of the State may, during the open season, ship from the State as a gift, and so marked on the shipping tag, 1 deer, 18 quail (partridges), 6 grouse (pheasants), 3 wild turkeys and 12 waterfowl, open to view, labeled with names and addresses of donor and donee and number and kind of game in each package; county supervisors may permit export of waterfowl.

Sale.—Sale of robins, quail (partridges), grouse (pheasants), or woodcock prohibited at all times.

Nonresident License.—Issued by county clerk. Fee (including clerk fee), \$10. Not required for hunting rabbits or sora. A guest of a landowner requires no license if hunting on his host's land, with him or a member of his family, provided his host receives no compensation directly or indirectly.

SHELL FISH COMMISSION.

The Board of Shell Fish Commissioners of Maryland consists of Walter J. Mitchell, La Plata, chairman, Caswell Grave, Johns Hopkins University, secretary, and Benjamin K. Green, Westover, treasurer.

The duties of this Board, briefly stated, are to survey the oyster grounds of the State, reserve the natural oyster bars to the Public Fishery and to endeavor to lease the bottoms outside the natural oyster bars to residents of the State for the purposes of oyster culture.

The field work of the survey of the oyster grounds was begun June 29, 1906, and was completed November 28, 1910, about 33 months of actual work on the oyster grounds having been carried on. The work of duplicating all records and constructing smooth sheets and leasing charts has been carried on during the winter months, when field work is impracticable. The complete results of the survey will be ready for publication not later than July 1, 1911.

The barren bottoms in Anne Arundel, Somerset, Wicomico, Worcester and Calvert counties have been opened for leasing and those of other tidewater counties will be opened in the order in which the counties were surveyed.

The oyster resources of the State, potential and latent, as ascertained and

developed by the Commission, consist in:

- 1 about 210,000 acres of natural oyster bar.
- 2 about 2,500 acres of leased bottom.
- 3 about 800,000 acres of barren bottom.

Detailed accounts of the entire operations of the Commission are published in reports which may be secured at the office at 312 Marine Bank Building, Baltimore.

The Haman Oyster Culture law by which the Board of Shell Fish Commissioners was created and under which it was proposed to develop an industry in oyster culture, is a perfect instrument for making the survey of the natural oyster beds, but its provisions for oyster cultural operations are inadequate and the results secured along this line are disappointing to those who expected an extensive industry in oyster culture to spring up in the State. However, the Commission will recommend the changes and additions, which are considered necessary to perfect the law, to the next General Assembly and it is hoped that these amendments will be enacted.

PROGRESS OF SEWER CONSTRUCTION.

The total length of sewers, drains and connections, completed to December 31, 1910, was about 138.50 miles; number of manholes built, 2,632; of inlets installed, 1,090. The total length of sewers and drains contracted for to December 31, 1910, was about 160 miles. The Sewage Pumping Station is about under roof and the pumps and other machinery are now being installed.

At the Disposal Plant, on Back river, units sufficient to take care of the sewage from about 275,000 people, are rapidly being completed, and it is hoped that by the middle of the summer of 1911 the Commission will begin connecting up houses in the eastern section of the city, which has been sewered first

on account of being located along the high level interceptor, which flows by gravity to the disposal plant.

After the sewage has been purified and is ready to be discharged into Back river, its flow will run turbines, which in turn will generate electricity for lighting the plant and power to run the sludge pumps and for flushing purposes, giving all power necessary for the operation of the plant simply by the flow of the sewage. This is considered unique in sewage disposal plants. Every factor of advantage is being utilized.

To December 31, 1910, the work completed and placed under contract was about \$8,000,000.

MARYLAND'S FISHERIES.

A preliminary report on the fisheries of Maryland for the year ending December 31, 1908, issued in September, 1909, by the Census Bureau, reports the number of independent fishermen to be 8,444, while the wage-earning fishermen number 9,946. The vessels employed in the industry number 1,107, valued at \$821,141. The outfit (bait, fuel, provisions, etc.) is valued at \$179,639. The boats number 8,493, valued at \$643,718.

THE YEAR'S FISTIC COMBAT.

On July 4, 1910, Jack Johnson (colored) at Reno, Nev., defeated Jim Jeffries (white) for the world's championship in 15 rounds. Johnson knocked Jeffries out easily, the latter lacking "condition." Purse \$101,000, 75 per cent. for the winner. Other profits brought his estimated gain to over \$200,000. Johnson was 6 feet 1/4 inch high, weighed 207 1/2 pounds; was born in Texas March 31, 1878. Jeffries was 6 feet 1 1/4 inches high and weighed 218 pounds; was born in Ohio April 15, 1875. Jack had fought 64 battles, Jim 20. Sporadic race riots followed Johnson's victory.

RUNNING.

At New York, September 10, at Travers Island, George V. Bonhag ran 5 miles in 25.09%, a new American record, breaking that made (25.23%) by E. C. Carter, September 17, 1897. Bonhag, in the same race, broke the American 4-mile record, making it in 20.11 against 20.15% by William Day 21 years ago, and also Carter's 4 1/4-mile record 23 years ago. Bonhag made 22.43%, against Carter's 22.59%.

In municipal games at Patterson Park, Baltimore, in September, Marty McDonagh covered the 220-yard course in 26 1/4 seconds, making a new record.

LATHAM'S FLIGHT OVER BALTIMORE.

On November 7, 1910, in consideration of \$5,000 offered by THE SUN and EVENING SUN, M. Hubert Latham, the French aeronaut, flew in his Antoinette monoplane from Halethorpe by way of Fort McHenry to Baltimore, and after passing over THE SUN Building, went eastward as far as Patterson Park, northward as far as Druid Hill Park, southward as far as THE SUN Building, westward out Baltimore street and southwestward to Carroll Park, whence he returned directly to Halethorpe. The average height was 1,500 feet, the scarcity of safe landing places making it inexpedient to fly lower. There was a wind of a velocity of some 20 miles an hour. The distance of 22 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles was covered in 42 minutes and 25 $\frac{1}{2}$ seconds. The day was a fine one and over 500,000 persons crowded the roofs of buildings and the streets to see the wonderful sight. It was thrilling to behold the Antoinette—in shape like a

huge dragon fly—swiftly cleaving the air 1,000 feet over one's head. An impressive demonstration of man's victory in a new realm and of the practical success of aviation was thus given.

The aviator used a 50-horsepower monoplane, weighing 1,200 pounds, made at the Antoinette factory, in Paris. The chassis, or body, was shaped like a narrow boat. In front was a wooden, two-bladed propeller, capable of making 1,200 revolutions a minute and of forcing the machine through the air at 50 miles or more an hour. Projecting from the chassis on each side were large planes, suggesting wings. Two small pneumatic wheels supported the aeroplane when making a start from the ground. The rudder was at the tail. The machine was controlled by a wheel and levers at the driver's side, while the motor was beneath him.

Hubert Latham was born in Paris in 1883, studied at Oxford two years and served a year in the French Army.

WELLMAN'S AMERICA.

On October 15 the dirigible balloon America, commanded by Walter Wellman, with crew of five, left Atlantic City to cross the ocean to England. Commander and crew were rescued

October 18 some 350 miles east of Cape Hatteras by the British steamer Trent, when about to encounter disaster, having covered 1,008½ miles. The long and heavy equilibrator, trailing in the sea, was blamed for the failure.

METEOR WINS.

At Kiel, June 29, Emperor William's American-built Meteor won the 48-mile handicap race from Eckernförde to Kiel. Herr Krupp von Bohlen und Hal-

bach's Germania was second, the Hamburg of the Norddeutsche Regatta Verein third and the American schooner-yacht Westward, owned by Alexander S. Cochran, of New York, fourth.

RACING IN EUROPEAN WATERS.

The American schooner Westward finished the season with the remarkable record of having won every first-class match in which she started. She had 11 first prizes from 11 starts in British waters. Her trophies included the Royal Victoria Gold International Challenge Cup, and an astonishing performance in her first season's sailing was the manner in which she beat Shamrock—the crack cutter of the British

fleet—to windward in one of the Solent races. Cicely had three firsts and a second from seven starts, while Germania had five seconds from ten and Meteor two seconds from seven.

Lipton's Shamrock started 28 times during the season, and finished with a string of 19 flags, 18 being for first prizes and 1 for a second. With one start less, White Heather had nine firsts and one second.

DEMOCRATIC CONGRESSIONAL PLATFORM.

On October 3 the six Democratic candidates—J. H. Covington, J. P. C. Talbot, George Konig, J. C. Linthicum, J. E. Ray, Jr., and D. J. Lewis—adopted the following platform of principles:

"We, the Democratic candidates for Congress in the State of Maryland, in a campaign involving national issues alone, hereby declare our firm adherence to the fundamental Democratic principle that tariff taxation is constitutional for the single purpose of producing funds necessary for the support of the Government, economically administered; and we denounce the Republican doctrine of protection as a system primarily intended to benefit private and selfish interests.

"The continued operation of this doctrine through Republican legislation has been the creating cause of those monopolies and trusts which have oppressed the people by the excessive prices of the ordinary necessities of life; and the failure of the Republican party to keep its solemn platform promise to the people to revise the tariff downward, in order to reduce the cost of living and of the ordinary manufactured articles used in everyday life, is a positive proof that the only party which can be trusted to revise the tariff for the welfare of the people, and not for the benefit of the protected interests, is the Democratic party, which always has been and is today in favor of a tariff for revenue.

"The enactment into law of the Payne-Aldrich tariff bill not only failed to redeem the Republican platform promise to bring about a much needed reduction of prices to the American consumer, but by inordinate taxation through the operation of this law there has been caused an oppressive increase in the cost of living to every family in the land. The question of an honest reduction of the tariff to a revenue basis, thereby reducing the cost of living, is, therefore, the overshadowing issue to be settled by the American people at the coming election, and we pledge ourselves, if elected, to aid in the accomplishment of this great purpose at the earliest possible moment.

Coalition.

"Furthermore, the insidious robbery to which the American people have been subjected by the protection extended by the Republican party to specially favored interests has produced a coalition between Republican party government and monopoly. The maintenance of such a coalition and the continued aggrandizement of the Federal power are Republican policies that go hand in hand, and they have made the Republican party essentially a party of extravagance. Under the administration of that party there is a riotous waste and profligacy of expenditure which

constitute an indefensible drain upon the purses of the people.

"Public sentiment demands that there be an end of this wasteful and ruinous extravagance, and we declare that such an end can only come by the destruction of the partnership now maintained between predatory business and government. And this can only be accomplished through the instrumentality of the Democratic party, standing for the rights of the people, as against the illegal legislative benefits of the privileged classes, and pledged to taxation solely for government economically administered.

To Curb Extravagance.

"Moreover, we specifically assert our intention to advocate a searching investigation of the several departments of the government in order to expose the existing waste and extravagance, and to inaugurate those honest and economical business methods which will result in the saving of hundreds of millions of the people's money annually, according to the unchallenged declarations of Republican leaders themselves.

"The Democratic party believes that the powers of the Federal Government are supreme within their true sphere. In the restriction of the national activities of monopolies and trusts, in the protection of the rights of the people through all the various avenues of interstate commerce, in the effective conservation of our natural resources on the public domain and their protection from plunder, and in the preservation of equal rights for all and special privileges for none, through every lawful channel of Federal legislation, its candidates, if elected, will actively aid.

Upholds States' Rights.

"It is, however, a cardinal tenet of Democratic faith that the reserved rights of the States must be resolutely maintained against Federal encroachment. In the Constitution alone are to be found the extent and limitations of Federal jurisdiction, and we declare our unalterable opposition to that dangerous doctrine of the republicanism of today, that the Constitution may be easily expanded by executive interpretation.

"The issue of Cannonism, so called, is of serious importance to the American people, but it is by no means entirely embodied in the personality of the present Speaker of the House of Representatives, and it will not do for the Republican party, through its candidates, to seek to obtain public favor by the valueless pledge that they will not vote for the re-election of Joseph C. Cannon as Speaker of the House of Representatives in the next Congress. Cannonism is merely a word coined to describe the great question of the maintenance unimpaired of the legislative

power of the House of Representatives as a whole. The Republican machine in the House, in order to perpetuate the alliance between predatory business and that party, has devised a system of control by which the House has ceased to be a deliberative body.

Majority Rule Throttled.

"The power of the majority to legislate against the will of the leaders of that machine has been throttled almost entirely. To the continuance of this system the whole power of the Republican national organization is pledged, and the only way to destroy this system is by preventing the future control of the House by any of the leaders of the existing machine. To accomplish this purpose and thereby restore to the House its original vigor as the primary constructive body in the legislative branch of the Federal Government it must be obvious to all that it is necessary to elect Democrats in such numbers as to insure a working majority in that body.

"The wide range of national politics necessarily embraces many issues of importance, and we have dwelt only upon those which most immediately and seriously concern the welfare of the people. Upon all other national issues, standing upon the sound ground of steady adherence to the fundamental traditions of the Democratic party, we shall advocate a definite constructive program which will meet in the interest of the whole people the great problems that are facing the country.

MARYLAND REPUBLICAN CONGRESSIONAL PLATFORM.

(Adopted by the Six Candidates October 10, 1910.)

"The Republican candidates for Representatives from Maryland in the Sixty-second Congress of the United States reaffirm their loyalty to the principles of the Republican party embodied in its platform of 1908 and indorsed by the people in the election of President Taft, and if elected we pledge our effort in the coming Congress to aid the President in securing a complete fulfillment of every promise, expressed and implied, in our last national platform.

"We favor the conservation of our natural resources for development under such regulations and by such means as may best assure the use of the country's wealth for the country's good.

"We favor the effective supervision by the Federal Government of interstate and foreign commerce as a safeguard against the dangers of monopoly and to protect the commercial liberties of the people, thus preserving their commercial equality.

"The new tariff law was enacted without upsetting business. Rates of duty on some articles of luxury were increased, and on common food products and necessities of life were either unchanged or decreased; notwithstanding a general average reduction of 11 per cent. in all duties, it resulted in converting a deficit into a surplus and, unlike the last Democratic tariff law, which blasted industry, closed mills and factories and threw thousands of wage earners out of employment, the new law has given renewed impetus to industry, employment to labor at remunerative wages, and to the agriculturist the greatest prosperity known in years.

"We heartily approve the wise and far-seeing decision of this administration that, in amending our tariff laws hereafter, the attention of the Congress and of public opinion shall be concentrated upon one schedule at one time and that all changes shall be made in the light of trustworthy information furnished by a permanent and disinterested commission of public experts; and we applaud the energy and persistency of President Taft in seeking, and his success in securing, appropriate legislation to give practical effect to this salutary determination.

"We are in hearty sympathy with the great moral awakening of the people, under the inspiring leadership of men like William Howard Taft, Theodore Roosevelt and Charles E. Hughes, in demanding the very highest integrity in public life as being essential to the perpetuity of the liberties of the people. We insist upon this high standard of official conduct as vital to the welfare of our own State as well as the nation. The unfortunate plight of some of our cities and States where exist bribery and corruption, governmental inefficiency in public affairs, attempts to override organic law, extravagance and increasing taxes, stands out in bold contrast to that high standard of civic righteousness for which all right-thinking men are today earnestly striving.

PROHIBITION PARTY OF MARYLAND.**Platform, 1910.**

1—We favor the submission by Congress to the several states of an amendment to the federal constitution prohibiting the manufacture, sale, importation, exportation, or transportation of alcoholic liquors for beverage purposes.

And until such a time as when the American workers will be in complete possession of the wealth of this country, we demand the following:

1. An eight-hour labor day for all workers, and a progressive diminution of the labor time to keep pace with the improvement of machinery.
2. Equal political rights for women as for men, and equal compensation for the same services rendered.
3. A pension for the aged and disabled workers ample enough to enable them to live according to the prevailing standards.
4. The unqualified employers' liability for all injuries to their employees during working hours.
5. The employment of the unemployed by the establishment of public works

for the production of the more immediate necessities of life.

6. The initiative, referendum, power of recall, and proportional representation in the interest of a more complete democracy.

7. The election of Federal Judges, the Judges of the Supreme Court, the President and the Vice-President of the United States by popular vote.

8. The abolition of the United States Senate.

9. Abolition of the employment of children under the age of 16 years, in gainful occupations.

10. The unqualified right of the workers to strike and to boycott.

11. A progressive income and inheritance tax.

12. The prohibition of contract convict labor.

13. The prohibition of the employment of girls and women at night in factories, mills and canning houses.

14. Emfranchisement within the District of Columbia.

15. The appointment of factory and mine inspectors under civil service rule.

PLATFORM.

We, the Socialist Party of the State of Maryland, in Convention assembled, reassert our allegiance to the Socialist Party of America and to the principles of International Socialism.

The Socialist Party holds, with the founders of this Republic, that life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness are among the primary and fundamental rights of man. But ordinary experience teaches us that these rights are dependent for their exercise upon the possession of the material things that constitute the necessities and luxuries of life; and that when deprived of these things, life, liberty and happiness are denied to the same degree.

Everyday experience forces upon us a realization of the fact that the things which constitute the necessities and luxuries of life, the products of the workers' labor, have been taken away from the workers by a small class of non-producers known as the capitalist class; and that in consequence of this, the life, liberty and happiness of the workers are dependent upon the will of that class.

Thus, the capitalist non-producing class, by possessing the wealth produced by the workers, is also in possession of the lives and fortunes of the latter class.

By possessing the workers' wealth, the capitalist class has been enabled, through the Democratic and Republican Parties, to possess itself of the government and to employ the forces of government, the courts, the army, the navy, the militia and the police to coerce the workers into submission. Thus every revolt of the workers against capitalist oppression has been effectively crushed.

Not satisfied with the subjugation of the American working class, our capitalist class, in its unquenchable thirst for power, has of late years been employing the wealth extorted from the American workers for the subjugation of foreign peoples in distant lands, ruthlessly tramping out the spirit of liberty and independence under its iron heel.

By the possession of the workers' wealth, the capitalist class has been enabled to possess itself of the forces of education and publicity, and to employ those forces for the further subjugation of the workers. The press defends capitalist aggression, exalts the oppressors of labor, blackguards and slanders the workers' leaders, suppresses facts that would enlighten the workers as to their condition, and by systematic misrepresentation and distortion of the truth, corrupts the electorate and leads, on election days, the masses of the people to the Republican and Democratic Parties to be sold into wage slavery to the masters of those parties, the capitalist class.

Against all these forces of corruption and coercion wielded by the capitalist class, the Socialist Party rises in revolt. Our purpose is to possess ourselves, by means of the ballot, of the powers of government, and to employ those powers to ensure to the workers the entire value of the product of their labor. Our weapon of war is education. Our field of action is among all the classes of society, but our faith is in the working class, for it is their own business to emancipate themselves from the yoke of capitalism, and it is to them that we raise our battle cry—Workers of all countries, nations, races and creeds, unite! You have nothing to lose but your chains, you have a world to gain.

ELECTIONS IN 1911.

In the spring Baltimore will elect a Mayor, President of the Second Branch of the City Council, First and Second branches of the City Council and Comptroller. A loan of \$10,000,000 for sewers, \$5,000,000 for paving in the old city limits and \$2,500,000 for paving in the Annex will be voted on. The primaries will be in April and there will be conventions of both parties. Those elected will enter upon their official duties in May. There will be no spring elections in the counties.

In the fall there will be elections throughout the State for Governor, Attorney-General, State Comptroller, a new House of Delegates and half the Senate. County officers will be elected in the counties* and in Baltimore sev-

eral court clerks, sheriff, State's attorney, etc. Judges will be elected to succeed Judges Stockbridge and Stump of the Supreme Bench of Baltimore. Judges are to be elected also in the First, Second and Sixth Circuits.

Throughout the State nominations will be by direct vote, the voter for State officers signifying his first, second, third and fourth choices. The Governor, Attorney-General and Comptroller will be nominated by a convention, after primaries held in September. A constitutional amendment imposing a property qualification on negro voters will be voted on, as also an amendment increasing Baltimore's representation in the Legislature, giving the city 6 senators instead of 4 and 35 members of the House instead of 24.

MRS. EDDY.

Mrs. Mary Baker Glover Eddy was born at Bow, New Hampshire, July 16, 1821. Her father was a Congregationalist. She had much personal beauty. In 1843 she married G. W. Glover, a bricklayer, who died six months later. In 1853 she married Daniel Patterson, a dentist from whom she was divorced in 1873. In 1883 she married G. G. Eddy, who died in 1883. About 1859 her health failed and she became interested after a time in a method of mind-healing taught by Phineas Parkhurst Quimby, of Lebanon, New Hampshire. She discovered "Christian Science." It is stated, about 1866, adding certain religious and metaphysical ideas to a former system of healing. In 1867 she started a school for her method at Lynn. In 1881 she set up at Boston a Meta-

physical College, through which some 4,000 students passed. A text-book of her "Church," called "Science and Health, with Key to the Scriptures," was put forth in 1875. Her doctrine spread throughout the United States and throughout the world with amazing rapidity, and churches in which it is taught are now found almost everywhere. The "First Church of Christ, Scientist," built in Boston in 1879, at a cost of \$2,000,000, is a magnificent structure, seating 5,000 people. Some have called in question the science, the metaphysics and the Christianity of Mrs. Eddy's system, but all confess that it has usefully called attention to the relation of the will to recovery from certain forms of illness. Mrs. Eddy died at Boston December 3.

ENDOWMENT AND EXTENSION OF THE HOPKINS.

The alumni and friends of the Johns Hopkins University in December set to work to raise \$2,000,000 for the expansion of the work of the university into new fields and for the removal to the new site at Homewood, making special effort to raise \$750,000 by December 31 in order to obtain \$250,000 which the General Education Board offered to contribute if the former sum were raised

by the date named. The \$750,000 was raised by the 31st with \$125,000 over and work was continued for the rest of the second million. The subscriptions indicated widely diffused popular interest in the institution.

With the \$2,000,000 in hand it is proposed to add a school of apollo science, a scientific law school, a school of public hygiene and a training school for teachers.

Maryland in 1910 had officially inspected 116,706 apple trees, 561,371 peach trees, 117,970 pear trees, 23,383 other fruit trees. Some 2,240 orchards were visited and 70,481 trees were found with scale. Frederick and Washington counties have most apple trees, Kent, Washington and Anne Arundel most peach trees and Anne Arundel, Baltimore and Frederick most pear trees.

In the year ended June 30, 1909, the total mileage was 236,868.53 miles single track; increased mileage during year, 3,215 miles; number of railways, 2,196; passenger locomotives, 13,317; freight locomotives, 33,935; passenger cars, 45,584; freight cars, 2,973,606; company cars, 99,090; locomotives and cars, 2,275,492; employees, 1,502,823 men; engineers, 57,077 men; firemen, 60,349; conductors, 43,608; trainmen, 11,476; switch tenders, 44,698; wages paid, \$988,323,694; killed, 8,722; injured, 95,626; one passenger killed for every 3,523,606 carried; passengers killed,

253; passengers injured, 10,311; total passengers carried, 891,472,425 persons; passenger increase over 1908, 1,462,851; operating revenues, \$2,393,805,989 in 1908 and \$2,418,677,410 in 1909; operating expenses, \$1,599,443,410 in 1909 and \$1,669,547,876 in 1908; stocks and bonds (par) outstanding, \$17,487,868,035; stock, \$7,686,278,545; bonds, \$9,801,590,390; average receipts per passenger per mile, 1.928 cents; per ton per mile, .763 cents; average ratio of operating expenses to operating revenue, 66.16 per cent.

PLANTING TREES. DISTANCES, ETC.

The figures given are feet apart each way: Apples 25 to 35; Pears, standard, 10 to 20; Pears, dwarf, 10; Cherries, standard, 18 to 20; Cherries, Dukes and Morellos, 16 to 18; Plums, standard, 16 to 20; Peaches, 16 to 18; Quinces, 10 to 12; Currants, 2 to 4;

Gooseberries, 2 to 4; Raspberries, 3 to 5; Blackberries, 6 to 7; Grapes, 8 to 12. To estimate the number of plants required for an acre, multiply the distance between the rows by the distance between the plants and divide this number into 43,560, the number of square feet in an acre.

INSECTICIDES.

Prepared for THE SUN ALMANAC by members of the Maryland Experiment Station staff.

Diseases of Crops,

The most important communicable diseases of cultivated plants in Maryland are: Apple—scab, bitter-rot, black-rot and canker, blight, leaf-spot, rust. Pear—blight, leaf-spot, scab. Quince—black-rot, leaf-spot, blight. Cherry—black-knot, brown-rot, leaf-spot. Peach—brown-rot, leaf-curl, scab, yellows. Plum—black-knot, brown-rot.

Blackberry and raspberry—anthracnose, rust, crown-gall. Currant and gooseberry—leaf-spot, mildew. Grape—black-rot, downy mildew. Strawberry—leaf-spot.

Asparagus—rust. Bean—anthracnose, bacteriosis, downy mildew. Cabbage—black-rot, club-root, wilt. Cantaloupe—leaf-blight, wilt. Celery—leaf-blight. Cucumber—anthracnose, wilt, downy mildew. Potato—brown-rot, dry-rot, early blight, scab. Sweet potato—black-rot. Tomato—blight, fruit-rot, leaf-spot. Watermelon—anthracnose. Corn—leaf-blight, smut. Oats and wheat—rust, smut, scab. Alfalfa—leaf-spot. Clover—anthracnose, leaf-spot, rust.

Carnation—stem-rot, leaf-spot, rust. Chrysanthemum—rust, leaf-spot. Rose—powdery mildew, black-spot.

Most of these are caused by very minute parasites (fungi or bacteria) which grow in the diseased tissue. Their development can often be prevented and a great deal of loss saved by the application of certain chemicals (usually in the form of sprays). Different diseases require quite different treatment and full discussion cannot be given here, but instructions regarding treatment of any particular disease can be obtained from the State Experiment Station or the United States Department of Agriculture.

The following are formulas for some of the principal fungicides now in use.

Bordeaux Mixture—For most leaf and fruit diseases, to kill spores that may be on the outside of the plants, 5 pounds

of copper sulphate dissolved in 25 gallons of water, 5 pounds fresh stone lime slacked in 25 gallons of water. When cool pour both at same time through strainer into sprayer and use while fresh, keeping well stirred. Paris green can be added to kill insects. Do not use iron vessels.

For peach, some plums, and other things liable to injury by strong Bordeaux mixture, use 3 pounds of copper sulphate to 9 pounds of lime, to 50 gallons of water.

Ammoniacal copper carbonate is used to spray fruit or foliage where discoloration of Bordeaux mixture is undesirable, but is not so effective as the latter.

Dissolve 5 ounces copper carbonate in 2 to 3 pints of ammonia diluted with 2 gallons of water. (Use only enough ammonia to dissolve carbonate) and add water to make 50 gallons.

Dibasic copper acetate can be used, 6 ounces to 50 gallons of water without the ammonia.

Sulphur dusted on plants affected with mildew or many other diseases, e. g. asparagus rust, is an effective fungicide. Burning sulphur is destructive to vegetable life.

Corrosive sublimate, 1 part to 1,000 parts of water, is one of the best disinfectants. It is used 2 ounces to 15 gallons of water for potato scab. (Soak seed potatoes in this 2 hours before cutting); use wooden vessels.

Formalin, 1 pint to 30 gallons of water, is used for same purpose.

Potassium sulphide, 1 ounce to 4 gallons of water, is used for gooseberry mildew.

Whenever practicable, all diseased material should be burned to prevent further infection. Such sanitary measures are especially necessary with peach yellows, pear blight, black-knot of plum and cherry, and is very desirable in case of various rots, as brown-rot of peach and plum, black-rot of sweet potato, bitter-rot of apple.

Some Important Insecticides.

The fundamental facts of insect control are: First, to be able to distinguish the manner in which the pest does its injury; second, to be thoroughly familiar with its life history; and third, to apply the proper remedies, if such are known, in a thorough manner. In general, one of three methods are employed in combating all common pests. First, the application of an arsenite or stomach poison for those insects who do their injury by eating the foliage and other parts of plants; second, treating with a contact insecti-

cide those insects that suck the juices of plants, and thirdly, the employment of either mechanical means or culture methods for those insects that cannot be attacked in a practical manner by the preceding methods.

ARSENITES.

This class of poisons are usually applied in the form of a spray or dusted on the plants. When adding a dry arsenite to water for spraying, first mix it in a small quantity of water, so as to form a paste; then dilute to proper

BALTIMORE SHIPBUILDING INDUSTRY.

In the calendar year 1910 Baltimore yards launched 48 vessels of aggregate tonnage of 39,644 tons, value \$3,692,300, exceeding all previous records. Six steel freight and passenger steamers were built, besides tugs, fireboat, dredges, lighters, power boats and car floats.

The Maryland Steel Company at Sparrows Point launched the steel ocean passenger and freight steamers Honolulan (7,059 tons), Kentuckian (6,606 tons) and Georgian (6,606 tons), each 414.1 by 53.5 by 39 feet, for the American-Hawaiian Steamship Company, of New York, for Atlantic and Pacific service. Steel propeller passenger and freight steamers City of Baltimore and City of Norfolk, each 2,200 tons and 310 by 46.1 by 18 feet, for the Norfolk route of the Chesapeake Steamship Company, of Baltimore. Steel freight steamer Millinocket, 3,336 tons, for the A. H. Bull Steamship Company, of New York. Steel suction dredges Wahalak and Norman H. Davis for the Ellicott Machine Company, of Baltimore. There is now in the hands of the builders preparing for launching in 1911 the 10,000-ton naval collier Neptune.

The Skinner Shipbuilding and Dry-dock Company: Steel tug Lynn Haven, 94 by 22 by 12 feet, for the Norfolk and Southern Railway, of Norfolk. Steel tug Comet, 80 by 20 by 9.5 feet, for the Hartford and New York Transportation Company, of Hartford, Conn. Steel fireboat Deuge, 120.7 by 28 by 15 feet, for the Fire Board of Baltimore. Two modern car floats, each 185 by 35 by 8 feet. Six modern derrick lighters, each 115 by 34 by 8.3 feet. The new year begins with an order for a modern car float to be 120 feet long.

Oliver Reeder & Sons launched one open lighter, 80 by 24 by 66 feet, and one covered lighter, 92 by 28 by 8.6 feet.

McIntyre & Henderson built the steel tug Fulton, 105 by 21 by 12.3 feet, for stock.

William E. Woodall & Co. launched two open lighters, each 75 by 22 by 6½ feet; one covered lighter, 80 by 24 by 7½ feet; two open lighters, each 90 by 28 by 8½ feet. The same firm rebuilt the United States engineer's steamer Cynthia, of the Wilmington (N. C.) station, and the schooner John Maginnis, which was renamed Mary Lee.

The Spedden Shipbuilding Company completed the steel tug Neptune, 121 by 24 by 13.3 feet, which will be used by the builders in the towing business. At the same yard there is on the stocks a fishing steamer, 151 by 27 by 13.3 feet, for Philip Wever & Sons, which will be the first steel steamer trawler on the coast.

Two open lighters, each 92 by 28 by 8½ feet, were built by the Chesapeake Marine Railway Company.

Charles Rohde & Sons Company's output was four open lighters, each 100 by 32 by 8 feet; one suction dredge, 105 by 30 by 9 feet; one derrick lighter, 92 by 28 by 7½ feet; one covered lighter, 80 by 24 by 7½ feet, for the Atlantic Transport Company; one open lighter, 75 by 22 by 6½ feet; one power launch, 32 by 9 by 4 feet. The firm rebuilt the schooners George C. A. Travers, Emily E. Burton, Lottie and Annie and Charles T. Strann.

The Nilson Yachtbuilding Company turned out the power barge Surrey Lumber Company No. 1, 40 by 10 by 5 feet, for that concern, and also eight power boats and yachts of smaller register.

FACTS FOR BUILDERS.

Buy one-fifth more siding and flooring than the square surface to be covered, on account of the lap or grooving. For 100 square feet of roof buy 1,000 4-inch shingles and 5 pounds nails. One thousand laths will cover 70 yards of surface, and 11 lbs. nails will fasten

them on. Eight bushels of good lime, 16 bushels of sand and one bushel of hair will plaster 100 square yards. Paint is an uncertain quantity, but as a general rule one gallon will cover 200 square feet of surface, two coats. One pound of pure ground white lead should cover 18 feet, three coats.

QUANTITY OF GARDEN SEED TO USE.

Asparagus, beet, radish, spinach, 1 oz. to 50 ft. drill; celery, carrot, onion, leek, 1 oz. to 100 ft. drill; endive, lettuce, parsley, turnip, 1 oz. to 150 ft. drill; egg plant, 1 oz. to 300 ft. drill; okra, 4 oz. to 100 ft.; parsnip, 3 oz. to 100 ft.; salsify, 1 oz. to 70 ft.; onion sets, peas, dwarf beans, 1 qt. to 100 ft.; pole beans, 2 qts. to 150 ft.; corn, 1 qt.

to 200 hills. One ounce will plant—cucumber, 50 hills; watermelon, 30 hills; cantaloupe, 60 hills; pumpkin, 40 hills; early squash, 50 hills; marrow squash, 16 hills. One ounce of seed will produce 1,500 tomato plants, 2,000 cabbage or cauliflower plants, 3,000 celery or lettuce plants, 1,000 pepper plants or egg plants.

RATES OF FARE IN BALTIMORE*

By the Trip and Hour.

One-horse vehicles. Day rates, between 6 A. M. and 12 midnight—Between points in the Central Section, 75 cents for one or two passengers, and 25 cents for each additional passenger.

One-horse vehicles. Night rates, between 12 midnight and 6 A. M.—Between points in the Central Section, \$1.00 for one or two passengers, and 25 cents for each additional passenger.

Two-horse vehicles. Day rates, between 6 A. M. and 12 midnight—Between points in the Central Section, \$1.00 for one or two passengers, and \$1.50 for three or four passengers.

Two-horse vehicles. Night rates, between 12 midnight and 6 A. M.—Between points in the Central Section, \$1.25 for one or two passengers, and \$2.00 for three or four passengers.

Outside the Central Section rates are higher, according to the number of squares covered.

The rates by the hour are: If a one-horse vehicle is employed for a single hour the charge shall be \$1.50; if such carriage is hired for or kept more than one hour, the charge shall be \$1.50 for the first hour and at the rate of \$1.00 per hour after the first hour. If a two-horse vehicle is employed for a single hour the charge shall be \$2.00; if such carriage is hired for or kept more than one hour, the charge shall be \$2.00 for the first hour and at the

rate of \$1.50 per hour after the first hour. A charge not to exceed 25 cents may be made for each trunk and 10 cents for each large valise or bag carried outside the vehicle.

Rates of fare for taxicabs between points within the limits of the city.—For one to three persons, first half mile or fraction thereof, 50 cents; each quarter mile thereafter, 10 cents; each six minutes' waiting, 10 cents.

For more than three passengers—First third of a mile or fraction thereof, 50 cents; each sixth of a mile thereafter, 10 cents; each six minutes' waiting, 10 cents.

For calling or shopping—Inside the Central Section \$1.50; outside the Central Section \$2.00.

When taxicab is engaged by the hour for touring or for purposes other than shopping or calling \$4.00 per hour may be charged.

Without taximeters.—For motor vehicles without taximeters between points in the Central Section for one or two passengers, 75 cents, and 25 cents for each additional passenger. Between points outside the Central Section, one or two passengers, 10 squares or less, 50 cents each additional 2 squares or parts of squares, 10 cents; each additional passenger, 10 squares or less, 25 cents; each additional 2 squares or parts of squares, 5 cents. Waiting, \$1.00 per hour.

OF HISTORICAL INTEREST.

Important treaties signed in 1910 included that between Russia and Japan, insuring the status quo in the far East, while the Russo-Austrian, Turko-Roumanian and Turko-Bulgarian documents tend to preserve the peace in the Balkan region.

The cause of peace was advanced by decisions of The Hague Court, covering the Newfoundland fisheries and the Orinoco Steamship Company questions, while the fourth Pan-American Congress, sitting at Buenos Ayres, brought agreement on several moot points in South and Central American matters.

Suffragism won in Washington, which joined Colorado, Utah, Wyoming and

Idaho in granting universal suffrage, and Norway gave woman the ballot in all local elections.

Little wars marked the year in Nicaragua, Uruguay, Albania and Mexico, with lesser outbreaks at Chan-Sha, China, and in Senegal, in Honduras, and at Rio de Janeiro, and fourteen great strikes disturbed the industrial progress of two continents.

The United States of South Africa was formed.

Korea and Finland lost their independence.

Portugal became a republic under a virtual dictator.

PROPER PHYSICAL PROPORTIONS FOR MEN.

For enlistment in the United States Army one must be between 18 and 35, healthy, temperate and capable of speaking English. He must be a citizen or have made legal declaration of intention to become a citizen. Five feet four inches is, as a rule, the minimum height. The weight required varies from 120 to 190 pounds. The following table shows what are considered the best physical proportions:

BUSINESS OF THE UNITED STATES POSTOFFICE, BALTIMORE, MD., JANUARY 1 TO DECEMBER 31, 1910.

The increase of business was marked. The receipts from the sale of stamps, stamped envelopes, postal cards, wrappers and other postal goods were \$2,250,250.33, against \$2,091,897.92 in

1909, an increase of \$158,352.41. There were 330,091,541 pieces of ordinary mail handled during 1910, against 320,320,100 in 1909, an increase of 9,771,411.

THE METRIC SYSTEM'S CRITICS.

The metric system was originally intended to be exclusively decimal, but this idea has proved to be impracticable. The kilogram and meter are now habitually divided into halves, quarters, etc., in European trade and industry. The English pound or yard does not become metric because it is divided decimally. The fundamental difference between the English and metric systems of weights and measures is in the size of the units, not in the manner in which the units are divided. American coinage is decimal, not metric. The use of the meter as the basis makes a system metric, not the decimal division. The metric system is required by law in France and Germany, but the old measures still persist in the trades.

In 1900 at the Paris Congress it was stated that: "Notwithstanding the decree of 1810, and in spite of the serious efforts put forth by the industrial societies of many districts, we still have the ancient units of weights and measures, and we scarcely compre-

hend each other when we talk of spinning at Reims, Roubaix, Elbeuf, Sedan or Vienna, where the skeins measure 1,420, 710, 3,600 or 1,500 meters (metric equivalents of old standards.)"

The Allgemeine Zeitung, of Munich, in 1902 said: "The introduction of the metric system would throw the German weaving industry into hellose Verwirrung, because the German machinery is based on the English system."

At St. Helena Napoleon said to General Gourgaud: "I have never approved the system of weights and measures adopted by the Directory and invented by La Place. It is all based on the meter, and conveys no ideas, to my mind. I can understand the twelfth part of an inch, but not the thousandth part of a meter (millimeter). The system created much dissatisfaction with the Directory. La Place himself assured me that, if before its adoption all the objections I had made to it had been pointed out to him, he would have recognized its defects and given it up."

THE VETO BILL.

Text of the bill presented to the British House of Commons in 1910 entitled "A bill to make provision with respect to the powers of the House of Lords in relation to those of the House of Commons, and to limit the duration of Parliament."

Whereas, It is intended to substitute for the House of Lords as it at present exists a Second Chamber constituted on a popular instead of hereditary basis; be it enacted as follows:

MONEY BILLS.

I. (1) If a money bill, having been passed by the House of Commons, and sent up to the House of Lords at least one month before the end of the session, is not passed by the House of Lords without amendment within one month after it is so sent up to that House, the bill shall, unless the House of Commons direct to the contrary, be presented to his Majesty and become an Act of Parliament on the royal assent being signified, notwithstanding that the House of Lords have not consented to the bill.

(2) A money bill means a bill which in the opinion of the Speaker of the House of Commons contains only provisions dealing with all or any of the following subjects, namely, the imposition, repeal, remission, alteration or regulation of taxation; charges on the consolidated fund or the provision of money by Parliament; supply; the appropriation, control or regulation of public money, the raising or guarantee of any loan or the repayment thereof; or matters incidental to those subjects or any of them.

(3) When a bill to which the House of Lords has not consented is presented to his Majesty for assent as a money bill, the bill shall be accompanied by a certificate of the Speaker of the House of Commons that it is a money bill.

(4) No amendment shall be allowed to a money bill which, in the opinion of the Speaker of the House of Commons, is such as to prevent the bill retaining the character of a money bill.

BILLS OTHER THAN MONEY BILLS.

II. (1) If any bill other than a money bill is passed by the House of Commons in three successive sessions (whether of the same Parliament or not), and, having been sent up to the House of Lords at least one month before the end of the session, is rejected by the House of Lords in each of those sessions, that bill shall, on its rejection for the third time by the House of Lords, unless the House of Commons direct to the contrary, be presented to his Majesty and become an Act of Parliament on the royal assent being signified thereto, notwithstanding that the House of Lords has not consented to the bill.

Provided, that this provision shall not take effect unless two years have elapsed between the date of the first introduction of the bill in the House of Commons and the date on which it passes the House of Commons for the third time.

(2) A bill shall be deemed to be rejected by the House of Lords if it is not passed by the House of Lords either without amendment or with such amendments only as may be agreed to by both Houses.

(3) A bill shall be deemed to be the same bill as a former bill sent up to the House of Lords in the preceding session if, when it is sent up to the House of Lords, it is identical with the former bill or contains only such alterations as are certified by the Speaker of the House of Commons to be necessary owing to the time which has elapsed since the date of the former bill, or to represent amendments which have been made by the House of Lords in the former bill in the preceding session.

III. Any certificate of the Speaker of the House of Commons given under this act shall be conclusive for all purposes, and shall not be questioned in any court of law.

IV. Nothing in this act shall diminish or qualify the existing rights and privileges of the House of Commons.

DURATION OF PARLIAMENT.

V. Five years shall be substituted for seven years as the time fixed for the maximum duration of Parliament under the Septennial Act, 1715.

ONE ASPECT OF BALTIMORE'S TAXATION.

The rate \$1.98 for 1911 is only for property subject to full tax rates. The area under suburban (\$1.30) and rural (66 cents) rates produce respectively \$165,906 and \$190,416. Thus the average on all real estate in the city limits is, according to an Appeal

Tax Court Judge, really \$1.85, not \$1.98. If street paving, sewers, water mains, etc., were in Baltimore, as in other cities, paid for in part by abutting property owners, the case would be still better, it is held, for the proposition that Baltimore has really a low tax rate.

THE NEW STATES.

The New Mexico and Arizona conventions have framed constitutions which await ratification by the people and approval at Washington. In the conservative East both constitutions would be considered radical. New Mexico rejected the initiative but adopted a referendum clause which enables 25 per cent. of the voters, on petition, to suspend a law within ninety days of a legislative session, and 10 per cent. of the voters, on petition, to submit a law passed by the last legislature to the popular vote at the next election. The Arizona constitution goes farther. It includes both the initiative and the

referendum, and also a provision for the recall of elective officers, including judges. This last is an extreme innovation, even in the radical West. In New Mexico no distinction is to be made in the franchise, in jury duty, or in qualifications for holding office, other than state and legislative offices, on account of inability to speak English, but in Arizona all voters are required to be able to read the constitution in English, a qualification which, it is said, will deprive a considerable percentage of the state's population of the franchise. It is expected that both territories will have become fully fledged states before the end of 1911.

RULES FOR FORETELLING THE WEATHER.

(For use with Aneroid Barometers.)

A RISING BAROMETER.

A rapid rise indicates unsettled weather.

A gradual rise indicates settled weather.

A rise with dry air and cold increasing in summer indicates wind from the northward, and if rain has fallen, better weather may be expected.

A rise with moist air and a low temperature indicates wind and rain from the northward.

A rise with southerly winds indicates fine weather.

A STEADY BAROMETER.

With dry air and seasonable temperature indicates a continuance of very fine weather.

A FALLING BAROMETER.

A rapid fall indicates stormy weather.

A rapid fall with westerly wind indicates stormy weather from the northward.

A fall with a northerly wind indicates storm, with rain and hail in summer and snow in winter.

A fall with increased moisture in the air, and heat increasing, indicates wind and rain from the southward.

A fall with dry air and cold increasing in winter indicates snow.

A fall after very calm and warm weather indicates rain with squally weather.

The barometer rises for northerly winds, including from northwest by north to the eastward for dry, or less wet weather, for less wind or for more than one of these changes, except on a few occasions, when rain, hail or snow comes from the northward with strong wind.

The barometer falls for southerly wind, including from southeast by south to the westward, for wet weather, for stronger wind or for more than one of these changes, except on a few occasions, when moderate wind, with rain or snow, comes from the northward.

February 2—Candlemas: Festival of the Purification of the Virgin. Consecration of the lighted candles to be used in the church during the year.

February 14—Old Candlemas: St. Valentine's Day.

March 25—Lady Day: Annunciation of the Virgin. April 6 is old Lady Day.

June 24—Midsummer Day: Feast of the Nativity of John the Baptist. July 7 is old Midsummer Day.

July 15—St. Swithin's Day. There was an old superstition that if rain fell on this day it would continue forty days.

August 1—Lammas Day. Originally in England the festival of the wheat harvest. In the church the festival of St. Peter's miraculous deliverance from prison. Old Lammas Day is August 13.

September 29—Michaelmas: Feast of St. Michael, the Archangel. Old Michaelmas is October 11.

November 1—All-hallowmas: All-hallows, or All Saints' Day. The previous evening is All-hallowe'en, observed by home gatherings and old-time festive rites.

November 2—All Souls' Day. Day of prayer for the souls of the dead.

November 11—Martinmas: Feast of St. Martin. Old Martinmas is November 23.

December 28—Childermas: Holy Innocents' Day.

Lady Day, Midsummer Day, Michaelmas and Christmas are quarter (rent) days in England, and Whitsunday, Martinmas, Candlemas and Lammas Day in Scotland.

Shrove Tuesday, the day before Ash Wednesday, and Maundy Thursday, the day before Good Friday, are observed by the church. Mothering Sunday is Mid-Lent Sunday, in which the old rural custom obtains of visiting one's parents and making them presents.

OBTAINING PATENTS.

A patent makes a grant for a term of 17 years—except in the case of design patents—to anyone who discovers a new and useful art, machine, manufacture or composition of matter, or new and useful improvement thereof, or original and ornamental design not already known and not already patented here or elsewhere and not in use two years prior to the application, upon payment of certain fees.

Applications for a patent must be made in writing to the Commissioner of Patents. The applicant must file in the Patent Office a written description of the invention or discovery, and of the manner and process of making, constructing, compounding and using it, in such terms as to enable any person skilled in the art or science to which it appertains, or with which it is most nearly connected, to make, construct, compound and use the same; and in case of a machine, he must explain the principle thereof, and the best mode in which he has contemplated applying that principle, so as to distinguish it from other inventions, and point out and distinctly claim the part, improvement or combination which he claims as his invention. The specification and claim must be signed by the inventor and attested by two witnesses.

When the case admits of drawings, the applicant must furnish a drawing of the required size, signed by the inventor or his attorney in fact, and attested by two witnesses. In cases which admit of representation by model the applicant, if required by the Patent Office, shall furnish a model of convenient size to exhibit the parts of his invention or discovery.

The applicant shall make oath that he verily believes himself to be the original and first inventor or discoverer of the art, machine, manufacture, composition or improvement for which he solicits a patent.

On the filing of such application and the payment of the fees required by law, if, on examination, it appears that the applicant is justly entitled to a patent under the law, and that the same is sufficiently useful and important, the Commissioner will issue a patent therefor.

Every patent or any interest therein shall be assignable in law by an instrument in writing, and the patentee or his assigns or legal representatives may, in like manner, grant and convey

an exclusive right under his patent to the whole or any specified part of the United States.

A caveat is a notice given to the office of the caveator's claim as inventor in order to prevent the grant of a patent to another for the same alleged invention upon an application filed during the life of a caveat without notice to the caveator.

FEES.

Fees must be paid in advance, and are as follows: On filing each original application for a patent, \$15. On issuing each original patent, \$20. In design cases: For three years and six months, \$10; for seven years, \$15; for fourteen years, \$30. On every application for the reissue of a patent, \$30. On filing each disclaimer, \$10. For certified copies of patents and other papers in manuscript, ten cents per hundred words and twenty-five cents for the certificate; for certified copies of printed patents, eighty cents. For uncertified printed copies of specifications and drawings of patents, five cents each. For recording every assignment, agreement, power of attorney, or other paper, of three hundred words or under, \$1; of over three hundred and under one thousand words, \$2; of over one thousand words, \$3. For copies of drawings, the reasonable cost of making them. The Patent Office is prepared to furnish positive photographic copies of any drawing, foreign or domestic, in the possession of the office, in sizes and at rates as follows: Large size, 10x15 inches, twenty-five cents; medium size, 8x12½ inches, fifteen cents. Fee for examining and registering trade-mark, \$10, which includes certificate. Stamps cannot be accepted by the Patent Office in payment of fees. Stamps and stamped envelopes should not be sent to the office for replies to letters, as stamps are not required on mail matter emanating from the Patent Office.

Joint inventors are entitled to a joint patent; neither can claim one separately. Independent inventors of distinct and independent improvements in the same machine cannot obtain a joint patent for their separate inventions; nor does the fact that one furnishes the capital and another makes the invention entitle them to make application as joint inventors; but in such case they may become joint patentees.

"IN GOD WE TRUST."

"In God We Trust" first appeared on the copper two-cent issue of 1864, and was the first use of the word "God" in any government act. The sentence was introduced by James Pollock, director of the Mint, with the approval of Secretary of the Treasury Salmon

P. Chase. It appeared on the 1866 issue of the double eagle, eagle, half-eagle, silver dollar, half dollar and nickel five-cent piece, in lieu of the long existing motto of "E Pluribus Unum." In the Trade Dollar issue (1873) both mottoes were retained. "In God We Trust" appearing on the obverse.

PROGRESS OF THE PANAMA CANAL.

The chairman of the Isthmian Canal Commission is Col. Geo. W. Goethals; address, Washington, D. C.

The canal is to have a summit elevation of 85 feet above sea level, with 3 locks at Gatun, 1 lock at Pedro Miguel and 2 at Miraflores. Each lock is to be 1,000 feet long and 110 wide. There will be earth dams at Gatun and Pedro Miguel, with level water 31.5 miles between them. The canal is to be about 50 miles long from deep water in the Caribbean to deep water in the Pacific. The average bottom width will be 649 feet, the minimum 300 feet, and the minimum depth of water will be 41 feet. The Gatun dam, a formidable work, will be 9,040 feet long, and in some places 1,900 feet wide. The crest of the dam will be 115 feet above sea level, or 30 feet above Gatun Lake (area 164.23 square miles) and 100 feet wide. The width of the dam embankment at water level will be 375 feet.

The excavation required to complete the canal under the present plan is 212,445,766 cubic yards. The excavation by the French before May 4, 1904, was 29,908,000 cubic yards. The excavation by Americans to October 1, 1910, was 118,514,927 cubic yards, leaving 64,022,839 cubic yards to be excavated. In the calendar year 1909 the excavation was 35,096,166 cubic yards. A sea level canal would have required an excavation of 319,146,000 cubic yards, as against the 212,445,766 required under the lock canal scheme. The dams and locks are being vigorously pushed and much material is in place. The Gatun dam is being built between two stone walls, the upper 60 feet high, the lower 30 feet high. These walls are 1,200 feet apart, and the space between them is being filled with impervious material. Other material will be dumped below the dam. The amount appropriated for the canal to June 30, 1910, was \$210,146,468. The estimated cost is \$375,000,000; the time of completion, December 1, 1913.

THE SALVATION ARMY.

The Salvation Army was organized July, 1865, to reach non-churchgoers. It was known for 13 years as "the Christian Mission." Its founder was William Booth, born in Nottingham, England, April 10, 1829. In 1852 he entered the Methodist ministry, but resigned to establish the "Army." The headquarters of the "Army" are at 101 Queen Victoria street, London. It op-

erates in 54 countries and colonies, having 8,224 posts, under 21,186 officers and employees, with 52,789 local officers and 20,325 bandmen. It publishes 71 periodicals. The Army owns real estate of over \$4,000,000. Its personal property is \$800,000, and its annual turnover is near \$400,000. The American headquarters are at 120 West Fourteenth street, New York.

BALTIMORE'S LEAD IN ELECTRIC TRACTION.

The first electric railway operated in America was run in Baltimore August 10, 1885, between that city and Hampden, a suburban village two miles distant, at a speed of 12 miles an hour, with passengers. A Daft motor was used. Three days later two other Daft motors, the "Morse" and "Farady," were performing regular service, making the round trip in 25 minutes. An ordinary car was attached to the motor car. There was a protected third rail between the tracks. At street crossings the current was carried overhead. This line was operated with electricity several years. The first American elevated electric railway was the Lake Roland line to the City Hall, which was in operation after May 5, 1893.

At Paris in November, 1881, an electric car for passengers ran from the Place de la Concorde to the Palace de l'Industrie. A similar car was run it is said, in Vienna some months before.

May 23, 1890, the North Avenue Electric Railway began running; May 28,

1892, the Baltimore and Curtis Bay Electric Railway; July 25, 1892, the Pikesville Electric Line; September 17, 1892, the Central Passenger Electric Line; April 23, 1893, the Lake Roland Elevated Electric Line from North avenue; April 26, 1893, the York Road Electric Line; May 6, 1893, Lake Roland Elevated Electric Line to City Hall, with Walbrook division; May 15, 1893, Carey Street Electric Line; May 22, 1893, North Avenue Electric Line, City and Suburban; July 23, 1893, South Baltimore part Carey Street Electric Line; July 30, 1893, Wilkens Avenue Electric Line, City and Suburban; August 6, 1893, Highlandtown Electric Line of City and Suburban; September 3, 1893, Maryland Avenue Electric Line of City and Suburban; September 20, 1893, Linden Avenue Electric Line; October 4, 1893, John Street Electric Line of City and Suburban.

The Gilmore Street Cable Line began operation August 30, 1892; the "Blue" Cable Line May 22, 1893; the "Red" Cable Line July 23, 1893; the "White" Cable Line August 20, 1893.

APPOINTMENT TO WEST POINT MILITARY ACADEMY.

Each Congressional District is entitled to have one cadet at West Point. Each State is also entitled to have two cadets at the Academy from the State at large, and forty are also allowed from the United States *at large*. The appointments (except those from the United States *at large*), are made by the Secretary of War at the request of the Senator, Representative or Delegate in Congress; and the person appointed must be an actual resident of the State, District or Territory from which the appointment is made. The appointments from the United States

at large and from the District of Columbia are conferred by the President.

Application is made by letter to the Adjutant-General, to have the name of the applicant placed upon the register that it may be furnished to the proper Senator. Representative or Delegate, when a vacancy occurs.

Appointments are made one year in advance of the date of admission. For each candidate appointed there may be nominated *two alternates*. No candidate is admitted under seventeen or over twenty-two, and he should not fall below five feet four inches in height; if eighteen or over, not below five feet five inches in height.

SOME SALARIES.

The President of the United States, \$75,000. Cabinet officers, \$12,000 each, except the Secretary of State, who gets \$8,000. Senators of the United States receive \$7,500, besides mileage; Representatives, \$7,500, besides mileage. The

Speaker gets \$12,000. The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court gets \$13,000; Associate Justices each \$12,500. Judges of the Circuit Court of the United States receive \$7,000; District Judges, \$6,000. Members of the Maryland Legislature receive \$5 a day.

FOR BALTIMORE'S INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT.

An event of importance for Baltimore's manufacturing industry was the opening of the new plant of the Pennsylvania Water and Power Company at McCall's Ferry, developing power cheaply from the Susquehanna River for transmission to Baltimore.

The city's dock system is to be further extended with \$2,000,000 voted in November, 1910. The \$1,000,000 voted for covering Jones Falls will give a direct thoroughfare of easy grade from the water front to the railway stations of the Northern section of the city.

THE MOON.

The earth's satellite is interesting and important. The moon completes her circuit around the earth in a mean period of 27 days 7 hours 43.2 minutes, but in consequence of her motion in common with the earth around the sun, the mean duration of the lunar month, the time from new moon to new moon, is 29 days 12 hours 44.05 minutes. If the earth were motionless in space the moon's orbit would be nearly an ellipse, hence her distance from the earth varies. Her mean distance from the earth is 238,850 miles. Her maximum distance may reach 252,830 miles, and the least distance to which she approaches the earth is 221,520 miles. Her diameter is 2,162 miles, and the nearest approach of the surfaces of the earth and moon 216,477 miles. Her orbit is intricate, because the earth in moving around the sun carries the moon with it; hence the latter is sometimes within and sometimes without the earth's orbit. Its form is that of a serpentine curve, and inclined to the plane of the earth's orbit at an angle of $5^{\circ} 9'$.

The moon always presents the same face to us. Witness the permanency of the various markings on its surface. She revolves on an axis, and the time of rotation is exactly equal to the time of revolution around the earth, viz., 27.32166 days. The moon's axis is not perpendicular to the plane of her orbit, but deviates therefrom by an angle of about $6^{\circ} 41'$. In consequence of this fact, and of the inclination of the lunar orbit to that of the ecliptic, the poles of the moon lean alternately to and from the earth. When the north pole leans toward the earth we see somewhat more of the region surrounding it, and somewhat less when it leans the other way. This displacement is known by the name of libration in latitude.

The moon's motion on her axis is uniform, but her angular velocity in her orbit is subject to slight variations by reason of the form of her orbit; hence it happens that we sometimes see a little more of the eastern or western

edges at one time than at another. This phenomenon is known as libration in longitude.

The moon's surface contains about 14,685,000 square miles. Her volume is $\frac{1}{49}$ and her mass $\frac{1}{81}$ that of the earth. Hence her density is about $\frac{3}{4}$ that of the earth, or about 3% that of water. At the lunar surface gravity is only $\frac{1}{6}$ of what it is at the earth, and therefore a body which weighs 20 pounds here would weigh only 3 pounds there.

The center of gravity of the earth and the moon, or the point about which they both actually revolve in their course around the sun, lies *within* the earth; it is 1,063 miles below the surface.

The attractive force of the moon acting on the water of our oceans is mainly instrumental in raising them into protuberances or tides in such a manner as to give the total mass a spheroidal figure whose principal axis would continually coincide with the line joining the centers of the earth and moon, but in consequence of the resistance which this movement of the water encounters from continents and islands, as well as from the liquid molecules themselves, the tidal wave can never arrive at any place until about one hour after the moon has crossed the meridian of the place.

The moon has no atmosphere and no water. The suddenness with which stars are occulted by the moon is regarded as a conclusive proof that a lunar atmosphere does not exist, and the spectroscope furnishes negative evidence of the same character.

In remote ages the lunar surface was the theater of violent volcanic action, being elevated into cones and ridges exceeding 20,000 feet high, and at other places rent into furrows or depressions of corresponding depth. The lunar volcanoes are now extinct. A profound silence reigns over a desolate and rugged surface. The moon is a dead world, utterly unfit to support animal or vegetable life.
