ASTRONOMICAL CALCULATIONS FOR THE YEAR 1913.

Comprising the latter part of the 137th and the beginning of the 138th year of the Independence of the United States of America.

The Astronomical Calculations in this Almanac are made for Baltimore, Md., or, more exactly, the position of Johns Hopkins University, in Long. 5 h. 6 m. 26 s. west of Greenwich and Lat. 39° 17' 48" N., and are given in Eastern Standard time (which corresponds to Long. 5 h. west of Greenwich). To express the data given in Baltimore Mean time, subtract 6 m. 26 s. from the values given.

The year 1913 corresponds to—

The year 6626 of the Julian Period.

The year 7421-7422 of the Byzantine Era, the year 7422 commencing on Sept. 1st.

The year 5673-5674 of the Jewish Era, the year 5674 commencing on October 2d or, more exactly, at sunset of October 1.

The year 2666 since the foundation of Rome, according to Varro.

The year 2573 of the Japanese Era, and to the 46th year of the period entitled "Meiji."

The year 1332 of the Mohammedan Era, or the era of the Hegira, begins on the 30th day of November, 1913.

The first day of January of the year 1913 is the 2,419,769th day since the commencement of the Julian Period.

ECLIPSES.

In the year 1913 there will be *five* eclipses, three solar and two lunar.

1. A Total Eclipse of the Moon, 1913, March 21-22, partly visible at Baltimore, the Moon setting eclipsed; the beginning visible generally in North America, western South America, throughout the Pacific Ocean, Australia, and the eastern border of Asia; the ending visible generally in western North America, the Pacific Ocean, Australia, central and eastern Asia.

2. A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, 1913, April 6, invisible in Baltimore.

3. A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, 1913, August 31, invisible in Baltimore.

4. A Total Eclipse of the Moon, 1913, September 14-15, the moon setting at Baltimore as the eclipse begins; the beginning visible generally in North America, excepting the extreme northern portion, the Pacific Ocean, Australia, and eastern Asia; the ending visible generally in Alaska, the Pacific Ocean, excepting the eastern portion, Australia, and Asia.

5. A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, 1913, September 29, invisible at Baltimore.

MORNING AND EVENING STARS.

Venus is evening star till April 24, and then morning star for the rest of the year.

Mars is morning star throughout the year.

Jupiter is morning star till July 5, and evening star for the balance of the year.

Saturn is evening star till May 29, then morning star until December 7, and then evening star again for the remainder of the year.

TO MEASURE HAY.

Multiply together the length, breadth and height of a windrow in yards, and divide the product by 25. The quotient will be the number of tons. Multiply the length, height and width in yards of hay in a mow and divide by 15, if the hay is well packed. If the mow be shallow and the hay has been but recently placed, divide by 18 or 15, according as the hay is packed. In square stacks multiply length and width of base in yards by half the height and divide by 1. In a load multiply length, width and height in yards and divide by 20.

MARYLAND TUBERCULOSIS SANATORIUM.

Postoffice, State Sanatorium, Frederick County, Md.

CONDITIONS OF ADMISSION.

The Sanatorium is open to any white bona fide resident of the State who is suffering from tuberculosis in its primary stage. Patients able to pay are charged for board and medical attention from \$3.50 to \$10.00 per week. Patients unable to pay are treated free.

These are the examining physicians, for the various localities: H. Warren Buckler, Baltimore; Gordon Wilson, Baltimore; Charles Conley, Frederick; Guy Steele, Cambridge; W. P. Miller, Hagerstown; Arthur Hawkins, Cumberland; Paul Jones, Snow Hill; Harry Fitzhugh, Westminster; Louis B. Henkel, Annapolis; Robert Page, Belair; Gordon Atkinson, Crisfield; F. F. Greenwell, Leonardtown; J. A. Stevens, Easton; McFaddin Dick, Salisbury; H. G. Simpers, Chestertown; V. F. Cullen, State Sanatorium, and any physician who is a member of his medical society may examine applicants for admission to the Sanatorium.

The capacity of the institution is 400. So far 1,700 patients have been treated. Dr. Victor F. Cullen is superintendent, assisted by Dr. Walter H. Mayhew, Dr. R. C. Hussey, Dr. J. I. Hirschmann and Dr. A. L. Deuchfield.

The board of managers consists of Senator John Walter Smith, president; Dr. H. Warren Buckler, vice-president; Samuel K. Dennis, treasurer; Drs. Henry Barton Jacobs, Gordon Wilson, Guy Steele and V. M. Richard, members of the board.

Over sixty of the brightest stars have special names, besides the Greek letters, which Bayer in his star-map, published in 1603, assigned to each star, thus designating their places and rank in a constellation, Alpha (α) being the brightest star of the constellation, and Beta (β) the next brightest, etc. Sometimes, however, they are applied to the star in their order of position rather than in that of brightness. The proper names of stars are partly of Latin and Greek origin like Regulus, Sirius, Arcturus, Procyon, Capella, etc., and partly Arabic like Vega, Alnitah, Mintaka, Alnilam, Saiph, etc. The name Deneb, meaning "the tall," is applied to several stars, as Deneb Cygni, Deneb Kaitos in the constellation Cetus.

There were 376 Chinese, of whom 314 were in Baltimore; 22 Japanese, of whom 11 were in Baltimore, and 55 "Indians," of whom 23 were in Baltimore and 15 in Cecil.

DEGREES OF LONGITUDE AND LATITUDE.

It is only on the equator that a degree of longitude is 69½ statute or 60 nautical or geographical miles, the latter in the nautical language also called knots. With increasing latitudes this length decreases. So in our own latitude, about 40°, one degree of longitude measures only 53 miles. Near the poles these distances become very small. Degrees of latitude also vary, increasing with increasing latitudes. While a degree of latitude near the equator measures about 68.7 miles, near the poles it measures nearly 69.4 miles.

In 1907 the cost of a liquor license for a saloon, club, hotel or wholesale dealer was \$250; in 1908, \$500; in 1909, \$750; in 1910 and thereafter \$1,000. The first wholesale druggist's liquor license was issued in 1908, when the cost was fixed at \$250 by the high license law, which increased the cost of a retail-grocer's license from \$250 to \$500. The cost of a bottler's license was \$40 in 1907, \$80 in 1908, \$125 in 1909 and \$160 in 1910 and thereafter.

WHAT CONGRESS DID.

At its adjournment late in the summer Congress had authorized one battleship and a parcel post, passed a Panama Canal bill disregarding England's idea of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty, admitted two new States, ousted Senator Lorimer, approved an amendment for direct election of Senators, authorized impeachment of Judge Archbold, abrogated the Russian treaty, increased Civil War pensions, made an eight-hour Federal labor law, etc.

THE JUDICIARY SYSTEM.

The judges of the courts of Maryland, except the Orphans' Court, are elected for 15 years. They are required to be not less than 30 years of age at the time of election, and are re-eligible until the age of 70 years, but not thereafter, though the Legislature, by joint resolution, may enable any judge already in office to fill out an unexpired term beyond the limit. The counties are grouped into seven circuits, and the City of Baltimore is designated as the eighth circuit. A chief judge and two associate judges are provided for each circuit in the counties. The chief judges of the county circuits and a judge specially elected in Baltimore City constitute the Court of Appeals. The Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, designates the member of the Court of Appeals who shall be the chief or presiding judge of that tribunal. A court is required to be held in each county of the State, to be styled the Circuit Court for the county in which it may be held. No two of the associate judges shall reside in the same county. Baltimore City, the Eighth Judicial Circuit, is provided with a Supreme Bench—a chief and nine associate judges, in addition to one judge of the Court of Appeals. The total number of judges is 32.

The salaries of judges are as follows: Court of Appeals, \$5,800; Associate of the Circuit Courts, \$3,600; Supreme Bench, Baltimore City, \$5,000, of which \$4,500 is paid by the State and \$500 by the City of Baltimore.

THE SOUTH POLE.

On March 8, 1912, a dispatch from Tasmania announced the discovery by Capt. Roald Amundsen, a Norwegian, December 14, 1911, of the South Pole, where there is a plateau 10,500 above sea level. The temperature was 9.4° below zero. (Fahr.) The trip from the Fram inland was made with four men and 18 dogs.

At the Pole, says Amundsen, there is calm—no blizzard. "Astonishing" meteorological observations are reported.

To find the high water at Havre de Grace, for instance, March 1st, 1913, find the times of water at Baltimore, which are 12h. 57m. A. M. and 2h. 24m. P. M. To these add 2h. 39m., as found in the above table, and we have 3h. 36m. A. M. and 5h. 3m. P. M. as the time of high water at Havre de Grace on that day.

PORTLAND CEMENT CONCRETE.

Under heavy buildings use 2 parts of cement, 5 parts of sand and 9 parts of broken stone. The proportions of 1:2:5 are good; that is, 1 barrel cement, 9 cubic feet of sand and 20¼ cubic feet of stone, making 21.5 cubic feet of concrete.

To mix, spread the sand on a tight floor and put the cement on the sand. Mix with hoe thoroughly. Dump the stone on top. Work over dry with shovels. Keep working while water is added with a sprinkler on end of hose. Work over twice after water is added, using only so much water as will enable the mortar to coat the stone completely and flush to the surface when tamped. Best have the water at about 65° Fahrenheit.

FACTS FOR BUILDERS.

Buy one-fifth more siding and flooring than the square surface to be covered, on account of the lap or grooving. For 100 square feet of roof buy 1,000 4-inch shingles and 5 pounds nails. One thousand laths will cover 70 yards of surface, and 11 pounds of nails will fasten them on. Eight bushels of good lime, 16 bushels of sand and one bushel of hair will plaster 100 square yards. Paint is an uncertain quantity, but as a general rule one gallon will cover 200 square feet of surface, two coats. One pound of pure ground white lead should cover 18 feet, three coats.

UNITED STATES ARMY CADETS.

Appointments to West Point Military Academy.

Each Congressional District and Territory, the District of Columbia, and also Porto Rico, is entitled to have one cadet at West Point. Each State is also entitled to have two cadets at the Academy from the State at large, and forty are also allowed from the United States *at large*. The appointments (except those from the United States *at large*, the District of Columbia, and from Porto Rico), are made by the Secretary of War at the request of the Senator, Representative or Delegate in Congress, and the person appointed must be an actual resident of the State, District or Territory from which the appointment is made. The appointments from the United States *at large* and from the District of Columbia are conferred by the President. The appointment of the cadet from Porto Rico is made by the President on the recommendation of the resident Commissioner.

Application is made by letter to the Adjutant-General, to have the name of the applicant placed upon the register that it may be furnished to the proper Senator, Representative or Delegate, when a vacancy occurs. The application must exhibit the full name, date of birth, and permanent abode of the applicant, with the number of the Congressional District in which his residence is situated.

Appointments are made one year in advance of the date of admission, except in cases where, by reason of death or other cause, a vacancy occurs which cannot be provided for by such appointment in advance. These vacancies are filled in time for the next examination.

For each candidate appointed there may be nominated *two alternates*. The principal and each alternate receives from the War Department a letter of appointment, and must appear for examination at the time and place designated; those previously accepted by the Academic Board on certificate as mentally qualified appear for physical examination only.

No candidate is admitted under seventeen or over twenty-two, or who is deformed, or afflicted with any infirmity which would render him unfit for the military service, or who has, at the time of presenting himself, any disorder of an infectious or immoral character. Accepted candidates, if between seventeen and eighteen years of age, should not fall below five feet four inches in height; if eighteen or over, not below five feet five inches in height. Candidates must be unmarried.

Candidates are examined mentally and physically before boards of Army officers, at such places as the War Department may designate, on May 1 of each year. Those who pass report to the Superintendent at West Point June 15 the same year. The mental examination is in reading, writing, spelling, English grammar, English composition, English literature, arithmetic, algebra through quadratic equations, plane geometry, descriptive geography, and the elements of physical geography, especially the geography of the United States; United States history, the outlines of general history, and the general principles of physiology and hygiene.

The Academic Board will consider and may accept properly attested certificates of competitive examinations or certificates from public high schools, colleges or universities in lieu of the regular mental entrance examination.

Every candidate is subjected to a physical examination by an Army medical board after his mental qualification has been ascertained. Before appointment he signs an engagement of service for eight years.

A cadet's pay is \$500 per year and one ration or thirty cents per day; total \$609.50, to commence with admission to the Academy. There is no provision for the travelling expenses of candidates who fail. A deposit of \$100 is made at entrance to cover cost of outfit. After receiving a diploma the cadet may be promoted and commissioned as second lieutenant in any arm or corps of the Army in which there is a vacancy.

MIDSHIPMEN OF THE UNITED STATES NAVY.**Appointments to the Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland.**

The minimum age for admission is 16 years; maximum 20. Two midshipmen are allowed for each Senator, Representative and Delegate in Congress, two for the District of Columbia and five each year from the United States at large. The appointments from the District of Columbia and five each year at large are made by the President. One midshipman is appointed by the President from Porto Rico on the recommendation of the Governor of Porto Rico. Each Senator, Representative and Delegate in Congress may appoint one midshipman during each Congress.

The Course for midshipmen is six years—four years at the Academy, and two years at sea, at the expiration of which time the examination for final graduation takes place.

Graduates are appointed to fill vacancies in the lower grades of the line of the Navy, and of the Marine Corps, in the order of merit.

EXAMINATIONS.

1. The general mental examination held on the third Tuesday in April, under the supervision of the Civil Service Commission, at points named.

2. A second mental examination at Washington, D. C., only, on the second Tuesday in May, under the supervision of the Civil Service Commission.

3. A third examination at Annapolis, Md., only, on the third Tuesday in June, under the supervision of the Superintendent of the Naval Academy. Candidates are notified when to appear at Annapolis for physical examination. Alternates also are nominated and these may report for examination at the same time as the principals. There may be a special examination after the third Thursday of June.

Candidates failing to pass the entrance examination are allowed another examination for admission to the same class if recommended for re-examination by the Board of Examiners.

The Civil Service Commission examines only candidates whose names have been furnished by the Navy Department. All correspondence relative to the nomination and examination of candidates should be addressed to the Bureau of Navigation, Navy Department, Washington, D. C.

Nomination for examination in April should be forwarded to the Bureau ten days prior to the date of examination, as that is the latest date at which arrangements can be made for the examination. Candidates must enter the Academy immediately after examination. Candidates are examined mentally in reading, writing, punctuation, spelling, arithmetic, geography, English grammar, United States history, world's history, algebra through quadratic equations, and plane geometry (five books of Chauvenet's geometry, or an equivalent).

On entering the Academy the appointee signs an agreement to serve in the Navy eight years, including his time of probation at the Naval Academy. A midshipman's pay is \$600 a year, commencing from the date of admission. The expenses for equipment at entrance are \$226.35. A preliminary deposit of \$30 for clothing is required.

THE TITANIC DISASTER.

On Sunday night, 10.20 P. M., April 14, the Titanic, of the White Star Line, while on her maiden voyage, carrying 2,340 persons, collided about 800 miles off the coast of Newfoundland with an iceberg, and four hours later sank. Some 1,635 of her passengers and crew perished owing to lack of sufficient lifeboats. At daybreak on the 15th the Carpathia, a Cunarder, picked up 20 boat-loads, or 705 persons, mostly women and children. The Titanic, the largest ship in the world, was 882½ feet long, with 11 decks and 30 water-tight bulkheads. Registered tonnage 45,000 and 66,000 tons displacement. She could accommodate a crew of 860 and 2,500 passengers. Cost \$7,500,000.

THE COAL RECORD.

In the year ended June 30, 1912, a half billion tons of coal were mined, Maryland producing 4,685,795 tons, worth \$13,000,000; Pennsylvania 144,721,000 tons, worth \$146,311,000, and West Virginia 59,831,000 tons, worth \$53,000,000. In the coal and coke industry 722,322 men are employed.

EXPORTS INCREASED.

In the fiscal year ended June 30, 1912, exports of manufactured products for the first time exceeded a billion dollars. The figures: exports \$1,021,753,918, of which \$674,302,903 represented articles ready for consumption. The total is ten times that of 1876, four times that of 1896, double that of 1903. The chief values were iron, steel, copper, oil and articles of wood, leather and cotton, carriages, autos and paper.

ILLITERACY IN THE UNITED STATES.

Between 1900 and 1910 the percentage of illiteracy of persons over 10 years of age fell from 10.7 per cent. to 7.7 per cent. In Maryland there was a decline of 3 per cent. In 1910 there were in Maryland 73,397 illiterates, of whom 30,999 were whites and 42,289 negroes. Virginia and West Virginia also show decreased illiteracy, in the former over 7 per cent. in the latter 3.1 per cent. Iowa had 1.7 per cent. of illiterates; Louisiana, with a large negro population, 29 per cent.

Consisting of representatives of the State Dental Association, Baltimore Dental Club and Association of Dental Surgeons, the O. H. C. of Md. has for its object the dissemination of information as to the hygiene of the mouth. It maintains a clinic, gives lectures and aims to furnish gratuitous dental service to the poor.

GEN. JOHN GILL.

At Ventnor, N. J., July 2, died John Gill, aged 72 years. He entered the University of Virginia in 1860 and the Confederate service in 1861, served as sergeant of couriers at Gen. Fitzhugh Lee's headquarters till the end of the Civil War, and ever retained a hearty interest in former comrades. After the war he engaged largely and successfully in Baltimore's grain exporting business. He organized in 1880 the Mercantile Trust and Deposit Company, and was its president till 1910, when, after bringing the company to a position of great prosperity and influence, he resigned on account of declining health. With accession of wealth General Gill gave increased attention in a liberal way to the promotion of deserving local objects. He was an active Democrat till 1896, when his party's assent to the free-silver idea impressed him as radically unwise. A strong character, with large intelligence and positive convictions, he was not to be swayed in politics by opportunistic expedients. His large and handsome physique, with countenance open, frank and cheerful, preoccupied acquaintances in his favor, and his urbanity, geniality, generosity and honesty gained him warm friends and universal esteem. In 1904 he wrote and had printed for private distribution a book of reminiscences of the Civil War. As a Marylander of the ante-bellum type, he was fond of sport and good cooking. He often had his friends with him at Croftan Lodge, his 2,300-acre gunning estate in North Carolina. With J. P. Morgan and seven others, he was a member of the Grace Quarter Ducking Club, near Chase's Station. He and Morgan were personal friends, and in 1910 the latter was for the last time his guest at 929 North Charles street, Baltimore, at a dinner given in payment of a wager on a day's speed record while crossing the Atlantic. For General Gill was fond of travel, and, with advancing age and increased leisure, went abroad frequently and spent long periods in pursuit of diversion, information and health.

JUVENILE COURT, BALTIMORE.

The Juvenile Court has exclusive jurisdiction in all cases of minors under sixteen years of age, except in charges of felony, and in addition the same jurisdiction as the police magistrates in Baltimore. The Court holds its sessions in the Courthouse daily, except Sundays and legal holidays.

LEGAL AND OTHER HOLIDAYS IN MARYLAND.

1. New Year's day, January 1. 2. Washington's Birthday, February 22. 3. Decoration day, May 30. 4. Independence day, July 4. 5. Defenders' day, September 12. 6. Christmas day, December 25. 7. Good Friday. 8. General election day. 9. Congressional election day. 10. Sundays.

All special days that may be appointed or recommended by the Governor of this State or the President of the United States as days of thanksgiving, fasting and prayer or other religious observances, or for the general cessation of business, become legal holidays. Thus the following may become holidays in this State:

Labor Day—The first Monday in September. It is a national holiday by Act of Congress approved June 28, 1894.

Columbus Day—October 12.

Arbor and Bird Day—The Governor of Maryland is authorized to designate by proclamation one day in April every year for tree planting, to be known as "Arbor Day."

Maryland Day—March 25, the anniversary of the landing in St. Mary's county of the first settlers in Maryland, in the year 1634, is not a legal holiday, but is commemorated by special exercises in the public schools of the State.

Repudiation Day—November 23 is a bank half-holiday in Frederick county, to commemorate the repudiation of the stamp act in 1765.

BALTIMORE'S STREET CAR SYSTEM.

The United Railways and Electric Company of Baltimore now operates 403.64 miles of single track, of which 170.86 miles are laid with "T" rail, mainly on suburban lines; 1.38 miles with duplex rail; 188.04 miles with 9-inch girder rail, and 43.36 miles with various smaller girder sections. On January 1, 1912, there were 214 transfer points, with 1,900 direction privileges; 64,643,636 transfers were used during the year 1911, about 40% of the revenue passengers having availed of this privilege, and the average rate per capita was 3.46 cents, or 3.15 cents after deducting park tax.

Regulations.

Class 1. Includes letters, postal cards, sealed packages, all matter wholly or partly in writing, except permissible additions to third and fourth-class matter, whether manuscript or produced by typewriter or copying press, books with written entries, manuscript for publication not accompanied by proof sheets, and all personal correspondence, whether in writing or in print.

Class 2. Nearly every newspaper and magazine published in the United States belongs to the second class and foreign publications which, issued here, would be admitted to that class, may be mailed at the rate given above. Second-class matter must be so enveloped that it can be readily examined without destroying the wrappers. When mailed by publishers or news agents, the rate is 1 cent for each pound or fraction thereof.

Class 3. Single books may be sent at the third-class rate, even though they may exceed the 4-pound limit of weight.

The sender may write or print on a label, tag, envelope or wrapper of third-class matter, his own name, occupation and residence or business address, preceded by the word "from."

Class 4. This embraces single books (not printed matter) which weigh more than 4 pounds. There are specific regulations for packing merchandise and samples of goods sent as fourth-class matter. Proprietary articles, such as powders, pills, fancy soaps, may be sent in original packages, sealed. Seeds and other articles requiring to be specially protected may be put in sealed envelopes if the envelopes are transparent enough to permit the nature of the contents to be ascertained. Admissible liquids, oils, pastes, salves, ointments, fresh fruits and vegetables liable to decomposition, etc., may be sent under specified regulations.

Prohibited Matter.

Unmailable under any circumstances: Liquids, ardent, vinous, spirituous or malt, cocaine or its derivatives, or those liable to spontaneous combustion; inflammable oils, poisons, explosives; animals, (stuffed specimens excepted); explosive or poisonous powders, matches, insects (except queen bees and their attendant bees), substances exhaling an offensive odor; articles improperly packed and likely to damage other mail matter or to harm anyone in the postal service; obscene and indecent books, prints, writings or papers; all mail matter upon which indecent, scurrilous or defamatory delineations or language are written or printed; all matter concerning lotteries, so-called gift concerts, or similar enterprises offering prizes, or concerning schemes devised to defraud the public, or for obtaining money under false pretenses.

POSTAL RATES AND REGULATIONS—Continued.

Special Delivery.

The delivery of a letter, or other mailable matter, immediately after its arrival at the postoffice to which it is addressed, can be secured by placing on it a "special delivery" stamp. When this stamp (cost, 10 cents) is placed on mailable matter, in addition to the postage ordinarily required, the postal authorities undertake to dispatch it for delivery, by special messenger, within a few minutes after its arrival.

Special delivery can be secured by using 10 cents worth of ordinary stamps (in addition to the postage ordinarily required), provided the words "Special Delivery" in large letters are written near the extra stamps.

Foreign Mail.

CAUTION: Make the address legible and complete, giving the name of the country, as well as that of the town or post office. Avoid using flimsy paper for envelopes, as they are liable to be torn or destroyed in long transits. Avoid using sealing wax on the covers, as letters so sealed often adhere to each other, and the addresses of some of the articles are destroyed by the tearing of the covers in the attempt to separate the articles. See that postage stamps affixed to the covers of articles of printed matter do not adhere to the articles themselves, thus virtually sealing the packages and thereby subjecting them to additional postage at the letter rate on delivery.

Foreign Postal Rates.

The rates on *letters* mailed in the United States to Foreign Countries are as follows: To Great Britain and Ireland, Germany (if carried direct), Newfoundland, Republic of Panama, Mexico, Canada, Cuba and Shanghai, China, the same as domestic rates, *i. e.*, 2 cents the ounce or fraction thereof. To all other Foreign Countries, 5 cents the first ounce and 3 cents for each additional ounce or fraction thereof. Postal Cards: Single, 2 cents; double, 4 cents each. Commercial Papers: 1 cent for each 2 ounces or fraction, but not less than 5 cents on each packet. Limit of weight, 4 pounds 6 ounces. Printed Matter: 1 cent for each 2 ounces or fraction. Samples of Merchandise, 1 cent for each 2 ounces or fraction. Minimum charge, 2 cents. Maximum weight, 12 ounces. Postage must be fully prepaid on matters to Canada, Mexico and Shanghai. Postage on matter to other foreign countries should be fully prepaid, as double the deficiency will be charged on delivery. Sealed matter, other than letters in their usual and ordinary form, are excluded from the mails to Canada, Mexico, Cuba and Panama; to all other countries they may be mailed at letter rate of postage; Canada alone admits second-class matter without limit to weight. Postage to Canada, Mexico, Panama and Cuba, same rate and conditions as for domestic matter.

Foreign Parcel-Post.

Merchandise at the rate of 12 cents the pound or fraction thereof, can be mailed by Parcel-Post in unsealed packages to certain countries at the Mail Post Office between the hours of 9.00 A. M. and 5.00 P. M. daily except Sunday. The limit of weight is 11 pounds for all countries. For Barbadoes, Curacao, Dutch Guiana, France, Great Britain and Ireland, The Netherlands, and Uruguay, there is no registration. Limit of value to Australia, Italy, Japan and Sweden is \$80, to Ecuador, \$50. No limit of value to other countries.

Registered Matter.

The fee for registering mail matter is 10 cents, in addition to the regular postage.

A "reply-coupon" is on sale at post-offices (price six (6) cents), which, upon presentation at a postoffice in Foreign Countries (with certain exceptions), entitles the person presenting it to receive (without charge) a postage stamp of that country equivalent in value to 5 cents.

Postal Savings System.

The opportunities afforded by the recently established Postal Savings System are available at the Main Post Office and at its several Stations as follows: Arlington Branch, Belvedere Ave., near Reisterstown Road; Station B, 1217 W. North Avenue; Station C, Fort Avenue near Light Street; Station D, Frederick Road and Old Frederick Road, Carroll; Station F, Garrison Avenue near Clifton Avenue; Govans Branch, Homeland Avenue and York Road. Govans; Station J, S. E. Corner of Eastern Avenue and Wolfe Street; Station M, 904 W. 36th Street, Hampden; Mt. Washington Branch, S. W. Corner 1st and Smith Avenue, Mt. Washington; Station N, 3104 York Road; Station O, 1603 N. Washington Street; Station P, S. E. Corner of Lombard and Stricker Streets; Roland Park Branch, Roland Avenue near Upland Road, Roland Park; Sparrows Point Branch, N. E. Corner 4th and C. Streets, Sparrows Point; Towson Branch, Pennsylvania Avenue near York Road, Towson; Catonsville Branch, Frederick Road near Newburg Avenue, Catonsville.

Deposits may be made by the use of Savings Stamps from ten cents to one dollar and by deposits of currency in sums from one dollar to five hundred, not more than one hundred dollars being received at any time in any calendar month. Deposits may be withdrawn upon presentation and endorsement of certificate at the office of deposit and semiannually—January and July.

Postal Savings may be converted into United States two and one-half per cent. non-taxable bonds, which are issued in multiples of twenty dollars. Interest at the rate of two per cent. is paid upon deposits maintained for twelve months or longer. Money deposited with the Government through the Post Office Department is by it deposited in depository banks in the City.

The State Geological and Economic Survey prepares reports and maps describing the natural resources and physical features of the State. They represent extensive studies of the topography, geology, mineral resources, agricultural soils, climate and forest growths. The reports as issued deal with individual counties, special subjects like coal or clay, or questions of general interest. The county maps are on the scale of one mile to one inch and show the distribution of the roads, geological formations, agricultural soils, and forests within the county. Other more general State maps, suitable for wall purposes, auto-mobiling, etc., are also issued on different scales.

The State Board of Forestry is engaged in promoting the forest interests of the State. The State Forester investigates forest conditions and needs. On July 1st, 1912, the field work of the forest survey of the State by counties was completed. Forest reports with maps have been published for Kent, Allegany, Prince George's and Garrett, and those for other counties will soon follow. A forest protection organization is maintained, consisting of forest wardens, patrolmen and watchmen at lookout stations, in all about one hundred men. Woodlot and timberland examinations are made upon the application of any landowner in the State and advice given as to management. Advice is also given in the establishment of tree plantations. The State Forest Reserves, three in Garrett county and one in Baltimore county (in all 1,950 acres) are being protected from fires and improved. The Patapsco Reserve along the Patapsco River will be very much enlarged by the addition of several tracts that are to be given to the State and other lands to be purchased with the \$50,000 appropriated by the General Assembly of 1912 for this purpose. Information concerning the forests and forest uses has been published in the four biennial reports, the county reports and special reports and leaflets, any of which may be obtained upon application.

6. Minnesota, Iowa, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Montana, Wyoming and Colorado.

7. Missouri, Arkansas, Texas, Kansas, Oklahoma, and the Territory of New Mexico.

8. Idaho, Utah, Washington, Oregon, Nevada, California and the Territories

of Arizona, Alaska and Hawaii, and the missionary district of the Philippine Islands.

In each judicial department there is a court of review, composed of a bishop therein, three presbyters, canonically resident, and three lay communicants of the Church, two at least of the laymen to be men learned in the law, having domicile in the department.

The benevolent offerings were \$766,517. Literature secretary, Rev. Dr. William L. Hunton, with headquarters, Publishing House, 1522 Arch street, Philadelphia.

The United Synod, South, numbers 49,799 communicants, 462 congregations and 246 ministers. Benevolent offerings \$68,367. Its officers are: President, Prof. J. A. Morehead, D. D., Salem, Va.; secretary, Rev. Dr. S. T. Hallman, Newberry, S. C.; treasurer, J. E. Cooper, Esq., Winchester, Va. The membership is mostly English-speaking. Next convention in the fall of 1915.

The Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Maryland, in its 93d annual convention at Williamsport, Md., Oct. 22, 1912, re-elected officers as follows: President, Rev. John C. Bowers, Catonsville; secretary, Rev. John C. Cregler, Lutherville; statistical secretary, Rev. W. G. Minnick, Cumberland; treasurer, Mr. L. Russell Alden, Washington, D. C. The Synod has 52 pastorates, 100 ministers, 38,879 baptized members and property worth \$2,504,700.

In Baltimore are 28 churches, with 8,457 members. Of the local ministers' association (under the General Synod), Rev. Henry Manken, Jr., 808 W. 36th street, is secretary.

The English District of the Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Missouri, Ohio and other States will hold their next synodical convention at the Church of the Redeemer, St. Paul, Minn., of which Rev. O. C. Kreinheder is pastor.

CONGREGATIONAL CHURCHES.

The next triennial National Council of Congregational Churches will meet at Kansas City, Mo., October, 1913, Rev. Nehemiah Boynton, D. D., of Brooklyn, N. Y., Moderator.

The six churches in Maryland are connected with the Washington Conference, which embraces Northern Virginia, District of Columbia, Maryland and Southern Pennsylvania—16 churches with a membership of 3,840. Mr. Paul E. Sleman, 515 Colorado Building, Washington, D. C., is secretary. The Washington Association meets semi-annually on the third Tuesday of May and November.

The Congregational State Conference of New Jersey, which includes sixty-six churches of Washington, Maryland and New Jersey, meets annually in Washington, D. C., on the third Tuesday in April.

We note with gratification the unanimous sentiment in favor of publicity, before the election, of campaign contributions—a measure demanded in our national platform of 1908 and at that time opposed by the Republican Party—and we commend the Democratic House of Representatives for extending the doctrine of publicity to recommendations, verbal and written, upon which presidential appointments are made, to the ownership and control of newspapers, and to the expenditures made by and in behalf of those who aspire to presidential nominations; and we point for additional justification for this legislation to the enormous expenditures of money in behalf of the President and his predecessor in the recent contest for the Republican nomination for President.

The movement toward more popular government should be promoted through legislation in each State which will permit the expression of the preference of the electors for national candidates at presidential primaries.

We direct that the national committee incorporate in the call for the next nominating convention a requirement that all expressions of preference for presidential candidates shall be given, and the selection of delegates and alternates made through a primary election conducted by the party organization in each State where such expression and election are not provided for by State law. Committeemen who are hereafter to constitute the membership of the Democratic national committee, and whose election is not provided for by law, shall be chosen in each State at such primary elections, and the service and authority of the committeemen, however chosen, shall begin immediately upon the receipt of their credentials, respectively.

CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS.

We pledge the Democratic Party to the enactment of a law prohibiting any corporation from contributing to a campaign fund and any individual from contributing any amount above a reasonable maximum.

TERM OF PRESIDENT.

We favor a single presidential term, and to that end urge the adoption of an amendment to the Constitution making the President of the United States ineligible for re-election, and we pledge the candidate of this convention to this principle.

DEMOCRATIC CONGRESS.

At this time when the Republican Party after a generation of unlimited power in its control of the Federal Government is rent into factions, it is opportune to point to the record of accomplishment of the Democratic House of Representatives in the Sixty-second Congress. We indorse its action, and we challenge comparison of its record with that of any Congress which has been controlled by our opponents.

We call the attention of the patriotic citizens of our country to its record of efficiency, economy, and constructive legislation.

It has, among other achievements, revised the rules of the House of Representatives so as to give to the representatives of the American people freedom of speech and of action in advocating, proposing, and perfecting remedial legislation.

It has passed bills for the relief of the people and the development of our country: it has endeavored to revise the tariff taxes downward in the interest of the consuming masses, and thus to reduce the high cost of living.

It has proposed an amendment to the Federal Constitution providing for the election of United States Senators by the direct vote of the people.

It has secured the admission of Arizona and New Mexico as two sovereign States.

It has required the publicity of campaign expenses both before and after election and fixed a limit upon the election expenses of United States Senators and Representatives.

It has also passed a bill to prevent the abuse of the writ of injunction.

It has passed a law establishing an eight-hour day for workmen on all national public work.

It has passed a resolution which forced the President to take immediate steps to abrogate the Russian treaty.

And it has passed the great supply bills which lessen waste and extravagance, and which reduce the annual expenses of the Government by many millions of dollars.

We approve the measure reported by the Democratic leaders in the House of Representatives for the creation of a council of national defense, which will determine a definite naval program with a view to increased efficiency and economy. The party that proclaimed and has always enforced the Monroe Doctrine,

and was sponsor for the new Navy, will continue faithfully to observe the constitutional requirements to provide and maintain an adequate and well-proportioned Navy sufficient to defend American policies, protect our citizens, and uphold the honor and dignity of the Nation.

REPUBLICAN EXTRAVAGANCE.

We denounce the profligate waste of the money wrung from the people by oppressive taxation through the lavish appropriations of recent Republican Congresses, which have kept taxes high and reduced the purchasing power of the people's toll. We demand a return to that simplicity and economy which befits a democratic government and a reduction in the number of useless offices, the salaries of which drain the substance of the people.

RAILROADS, EXPRESS COMPANIES, TELEGRAPH AND TELEPHONE LINES.

We favor the efficient supervision and rate regulation of railroads, express companies, telegraph and telephone lines engaged in interstate commerce. To this end we recommend the valuation of railroads, express companies, telegraph and telephone lines by the Interstate Commerce Commission, such valuation to take into consideration the physical value of the property, the original cost, the cost of reproduction, and any element of value that will render the valuation fair and just.

We favor such legislation as will effectually prohibit the railroads, express, telegraph and telephone companies from engaging in business which brings them into competition with their shippers or patrons, also legislation preventing the overissue of stocks and bonds by interstate railroads, express companies, telegraph and telephone lines, and legislation which will assure such reductions in transportation rates as conditions will permit, care being taken to avoid reduction that would compel a reduction of wages, prevent adequate service, or do injustice to legitimate investments.

BANKING LEGISLATION.

We oppose the so-called Aldrich bill or the establishment of a central bank; and we believe the people of the country will be largely freed from panics and consequent unemployment and business depression by such a systematic revision of our banking laws as will render temporary relief in localities where such relief is needed, with protection from control or dominion by what is known as the Money Trust.

Banks exist for the accommodation of the public and not for the control of business. All legislation on the subject of banking and currency should have for its purpose the securing of these accommodations on terms of absolute security to the public and of complete protection from the misuse of the power that wealth gives to those who possess it.

We condemn the present methods of depositing Government funds in a few favored banks, largely situated in or controlled by Wall Street, in return for political favors, and we pledge our party to provide by law for their deposit by competitive bidding in the banking institutions of the country, national and State, without discrimination as to locality upon approved securities and subject to call by the Government.

RURAL CREDITS.

Of equal importance with the question of currency reform is the question of rural credits or agricultural finance. Therefore, we recommend that an investigation of agricultural credit societies in foreign countries be made, so that it may be ascertained whether a system of rural credits may be devised suitable to conditions in the United States; and we also favor legislation permitting national banks to loan a reasonable proportion of their funds on real estate security.

We recognize the value of vocational education, and urge Federal appropriations for such training and extension teaching in agriculture in co-operation with the several States.

WATERWAYS.

We renew the declaration in our last platform relating to the conservation of our natural resources and the development of our waterways. The present devastation of the lower Mississippi Valley accentuates the movement for the regulation of river flow by additional bank and levee protection below, and the diversion, storage, and control of the flood waters above, and the utilization for the beneficial purposes in the reclamation of arid and swamp lands and the development of water power instead of permitting the floods to continue, as heretofore, agents of destruction.

DEMOCRATIC PLATFORM, 1912—Continued.

We hold that the control of the Mississippi River is a national problem. The preservation of the depth of its water for the purpose of navigation, the building of levees to maintain the integrity of its channel, and the prevention of the overflow of the land and its consequent devastation, resulting in the interruption of interstate commerce, the disorganization of the mail service, and the enormous loss of life and property, impose an obligation which alone can be discharged by the General Government.

To maintain an adequate depth of water the entire year, and thereby encourage water transportation, is a consummation worthy of legislative attention, and presents an issue national in its character. It calls for prompt action on the part of Congress, and the Democratic Party pledges itself to the enactment of legislation leading to that end.

We favor the co-operation of the United States and the respective States in plans for the comprehensive treatment of all waterways with a co-operative plan for channel improvement, with plans for drainage of swamp and overflowed lands, and to this end we favor the appropriation by the Federal Government of sufficient funds to make surveys of such lands, to develop plans for drainage of the same, and to supervise the work of construction.

We favor the adoption of a liberal and comprehensive plan for the development and improvement of our inland waterways with economy and efficiency, so as to permit their navigation by vessels of standard draft.

POST ROADS.

We favor national aid to State and local authorities in the construction and maintenance of post roads.

RIGHTS OF LABOR.

We repeat our declarations of the platform of 1908, as follows:

"The courts of justice are the bulwark of our liberties, and we yield to none in our purpose to maintain their dignity. Our party has given to the bench a long line of distinguished justices, who have added to the respect and confidence in which this department must be jealously maintained. We resent the attempt of the Republican Party to raise a false issue respecting the judiciary. It is an unjust reflection upon a great body of our citizens to assume that they lack respect for the courts.

"It is the function of the courts to interpret the laws which the people enact, and if the laws appear to work economic, social, or political injustice, it is our duty to change them: The only basis upon which the integrity of our courts can stand is that of unswerving justice and protection of life, personal liberty, and property. As judicial processes may be abused, we should guard them against abuse.

"Experience has proved the necessity of a modification of the law relating to injunction, and we reiterate the pledges of our platforms of 1896 and 1904 in favor of a measure which passed the United States Senate in 1896, relating to contempt in Federal courts, and providing for trial by jury in cases of indirect contempt.

"Questions of judicial practice have arisen, especially in connection with industrial disputes. We believe that the parties to all judicial proceedings should be treated with rigid impartiality, and that injunctions should not be issued in any case in which an injunction would not issue if no industrial disputes were involved.

"The expanding organization of industry makes it essential that there should be no abridgment of the right of the wage earners and producers to organize for the protection of wages and the improvement of labor conditions, to the end that such labor organizations, and their members, should not be regarded as illegal combinations in restraint of trade.

"We pledge the Democratic Party to the enactment of a law creating a department of labor, represented separately in the President's Cabinet, in which department shall be included the subject of mines and mining."

We pledge the Democratic Party, so far as the Federal jurisdiction extends, to an employees' compensation law providing adequate indemnity for injury to body or loss of life.

CONSERVATION.

We believe in the conservation and the development, for the use of all the people, of the natural resources of the country. Our forests, our sources of water supply, our arable and our mineral lands, our navigable streams, and all the other material resources with which our country has been so lavishly endowed, constitute the foundation of our national wealth. Such additional legislation as

may be necessary to prevent their being wasted or absorbed by special or privileged interests should be enacted and the policy of their conservation should be rigidly adhered to.

The public domain should be administered and disposed of with due regard to the general welfare. Reservations should be limited to the purposes which they purport to serve and not extended to include land wholly unsuited therefor. The unnecessary withdrawal from sale and settlement of enormous tracts of public land, upon which tree growth never existed and can not be promoted, tends only to retard development, create discontent, and bring reproach upon the policy of conservation.

The public-land laws should be administered in a spirit of the broadest liberality toward the settler exhibiting a bona fide purpose to comply therewith, to the end that the invitation of this Government to the landless should be as attractive as possible; and the plain provisions of the forest-reserve act permitting homestead entries to be made within the national forest should not be nullified by administrative regulations which amount to a withdrawal of great areas of the same from settlement.

Immediate action should be taken by Congress to make available the vast and valuable coal deposits of Alaska under conditions that will be a perfect guaranty against their falling into the hands of monopolizing corporations, associations, or interests.

We rejoice in the inheritance of mineral resources unequalled in extent, variety, or value, and in the development of a mining industry unequalled in its magnitude and importance. We honor the men who, in their hazardous toil underground, daily risk their lives in extracting and preparing for our uses the products of the mine, so essential to the industries, the commerce, and the comfort of the people of this country. And we pledge ourselves to the extension of the work of the Bureau of Mines in every way appropriate for national legislation with a view of safeguarding the lives of miners, lessening the waste of essential resources, and promoting the economic development of mining, which, along with agriculture, must in the future, even more than in the past, serve as the very foundation of our national prosperity and welfare, and our international commerce.

We believe in encouraging the development of a modern system of agriculture and a systematic effort to improve the conditions of trade in farm products so as to benefit both the consumers and producers. And as an efficient means to this end we favor the enactment by Congress of legislation that will suppress the pernicious practice of gambling in agricultural products by organized exchanges or others.

MERCHANT MARINE.

We believe in fostering, by constitutional regulation, of commerce, the growth of a merchant marine, which shall develop and strengthen the commercial ties which bind us to our sister Republics of the South, but without imposing additional burdens upon the people and without bounties or subsidies from the Public Treasury.

We urge upon Congress the speedy enactment of laws for the greater security of life and property at sea; and we favor the repeal of all laws, and the abrogation of so much of our treaties with other nations as provide for the arrest and imprisonment of seamen charged (with desertion?) with violation of their contract of service. Such laws and treaties are un-American, and violate the spirit, if not the letter, of the Constitution of the United States.

We favor the exemption from toll of American ships engaged in coastwise trade passing through the Panama canal.

We also favor legislation forbidding the use of the Panama Canal by ships owned or controlled by railroad carriers engaged in transportation competitive with the canal.

PURE FOOD AND PUBLIC HEALTH.

We reaffirm our previous declarations advocating the union and strengthening of the various governmental agencies relating to pure foods, quarantine, vital statistics, and human health. Thus united and administered without partiality to or discrimination against any school of medicine or system of healing, they would constitute a single health service, not subordinated to any commercial or financial interests, but devoted exclusively to the conservation of human life and efficiency. Moreover, this health service should co-operate with the health agencies of our various States and cities, without interference with their prerogatives, or with the freedom of individuals to employ such medical or hygienic aid as they may see fit.

DEMOCRATIC PLATFORM, 1912—Continued.

CIVIL-SERVICE LAW.

The law pertaining to the civil service should be honestly and rightly enforced, to the end that merit and ability shall be the standard of appointment and promotion rather than service rendered to a political party; and we favor a reorganization of the civil service, with adequate compensation commensurate with the class of work performed, for all officers and employees; we also recommend the extension to all classes of civil-service employees of the benefits of the provisions of the employers' liability law; we also recognize the right of direct petition to Congress by employees for the redress of grievance.

LAW REFORM.

We recognize the urgent need of reform in the administration of civil and criminal law in the United States, and we recommend the enactment of such legislation and the promotion of such measures as will rid the present legal system of the delays, expense, and uncertainties incident to the system as now administered.

THE PHILIPPINES.

We reaffirm the position thrice announced by the Democracy in national convention assembled against a policy of imperialism and colonial exploitation in the Philippines or elsewhere. We condemn the experiment in imperialism as an inexcusable blunder, which has involved us in enormous expenses, brought us weakness instead of strength, and laid our Nation open to the charge of abandonment of the fundamental doctrine of self-government. We favor an immediate declaration of the Nation's purpose to recognize the independence of the Philippine Islands as soon as a stable government can be established, such independence to be guaranteed by us until the neutralization of the Islands can be secured by treaty with other powers.

In recognizing the independence of the Philippines our Government should retain such land as may be necessary for coaling stations and naval bases.

ARIZONA AND NEW MEXICO.

We welcome Arizona and New Mexico to the sisterhood of States and heartily congratulate them upon their auspicious beginning of great and glorious careers.

ALASKA.

We demand for the people of Alaska the full enjoyment of the rights and privileges of a Territorial form of government, and we believe that the officials appointed to administer the government of all our Territories and the District of Columbia should be qualified by previous bona fide residence.

THE RUSSIAN TREATY.

We commend the patriotism of the Democratic Members of the Senate and House of Representatives which compelled the termination of the Russian treaty of 1832, and we pledge ourselves anew to preserve the sacred rights of American citizenship at home and abroad. No treaty should receive the sanction of our Government which does not recognize that equality of all of our citizens, irrespective of race or creed, and which does not expressly guarantee the fundamental right of expatriation.

The constitutional rights of American citizens should protect them on our borders, and go with them throughout the world, and every American citizen residing or having property in any foreign country is entitled to and must be given the full protection of the United States Government, both for himself and his property.

PARCEL POST AND RURAL DELIVERY.

We favor the establishment of a parcel post or postal express, and also the extension of the rural delivery system as rapidly as practicable.

PANAMA CANAL EXPOSITION.

We hereby express our deep interest in the great Panama Canal Exposition to be held in San Francisco in 1915, and favor such encouragement as can be properly given.

PROTECTION OF NATIONAL UNIFORM.

We commend to the several States the adoption of a law making it an offense for the proprietors of places of public amusement and entertainment to discriminate against the uniform of the United States, similar to the law passed by the Congress applicable to the District of Columbia and the Territories in 1911.

PENSIONS.

We renew the declaration of our last platform relating to a generous pension policy.

RULE OF THE PEOPLE.

We direct attention to the fact that the Democratic Party's demand for a return to the rule of the people expressed in the national platform four years ago has now become the accepted doctrine of a large majority of the electors. We again remind the country that only by a larger exercise of the reserved power of the people can they protect themselves from the misuse of delegated power and the usurpation of governmental instrumentality by special interests. For this reason the national convention insisted on the overthrow of Cannonism and the inauguration of a system by which United States Senators could be elected by direct vote. The Democratic Party offers itself to the country as an agency through which the complete overthrow and extirpation of corruption, fraud, and machine rule in American politics can be effected.

CONCLUSION.

Our platform is one of principles which we believe to be essential to our national welfare. Our pledges are made to be kept when in office as well as relied upon during the campaign, and we invite the co-operation of all citizens, regardless of party, who believe in maintaining unimpaired the institutions and traditions of our country.

Held in Fifth Regiment Armory, Baltimore, Md., June 25-July 3.

June 24.—The National Democratic Committee elected Judge Alton Brooks Parker Temporary Chairman, by a vote of Parker 31, Ollie M. James 20, O'Gorman 2, disregarding the declaration of W. J. Bryan that Parker, as being conservative, was unsatisfactory to him.

June 25.—The Convention was called to order by Norman E. Mack, Chairman of the National Committee. Cardinal Gibbons made the opening prayer. When Mack announced that Parker was to be Temporary Chairman, W. J. Bryan nominated Senator Kern for that position. Parker declined Kern's suggestion that both should withdraw in favor of some compromise candidate, whereupon Kern nominated W. J. Bryan and Bryan accepted the nomination. A call of the roll showed 579 votes for Parker, 510 for Bryan.

June 26.—Senator Ollie M. James, of Kentucky, was chosen by the Committee on Permanent Organization Permanent Chairman, with E. E. Britton, of Raleigh, N. C., Permanent Secretary, and Grey Woodson as Assistant Secretary. Kern was made Chairman of the Resolutions Committee. The Convention decided to name candidates before adopting a platform. By a vote of 565½ to 491½ the seventy-six-year-old unit rule was discarded.

June 27.—The ten South Dakota delegates (favorable to Wilson), seated by the National Committee and unseated by the Credentials Committee, were re-seated by the Convention, the vote being 633½ to 437. At the night session W. J. Bryan moved a resolution debaring from nomination for the Presidency any representative of certain extremely wealthy men, or of "any other members of the privilege-hunting class," and demanding the withdrawal of such men (referring to T. F. Ryan and August Belmont, delegates, respectively, from Virginia and New York), from the Convention. After indignant protests against the latter part of the resolution on the part of the Virginia and New York delegations, Bryan was allowed to withdraw it. As amended the resolution was passed, 889 to 196, many States changing their votes to "aye" after Virginia and New York voted for it as innocuous.

The roll of States was then called for nominations, and there were numerous lengthy speeches and demonstrations. It was after 5 A. M. of the 28th before the first ballot was taken.

DEMOCRATIC NATIONAL CONVENTION, 1912—Continued.

June 28.—The balloting continued without result. The first ballot gave Clark 440½ votes, Wilson 324, Harmon 148, Underwood 117½, with smaller numbers for favorite sons. At the tenth ballot Clark reached his maximum, or 556 votes.

June 29.—Balloting continued. Bryan deserted Clark because New York voted for him. Adjournment was taken over Sunday.

July 1.—More ballots were taken. At the forty-second Clark had 430 votes, Wilson 494 and Underwood 104. The drift toward Wilson was manifest.

July 2.—On the forty-third ballot Wilson had 602 votes, Clark 329 and Underwood 98½. After forty-five ballots Underwood's name was withdrawn and Clark's delegates were released. At the forty-sixth and last ballot Wilson had 990 votes and Clark 84. Wilson was nominated. At night Gov. Thomas R. Marshall, of Indiana, was nominated on the second ballot. The platform was then adopted and, at 1.50 A. M. of July 3, the Convention adjourned sine die.

THERMOMETRIC SCALES.

Taking Fahrenheit's scale, the boiling point of water is 212°, whereas in the Centigrade it is 100°.

The freezing point of water is 32° Fahr. and 0° Centigrade.

Consequently 180° plus 32° Fahr. is equal to 100° Centigrade.

So, to convert Fahrenheit to Centigrade, subtract 32, multiply by 5 and divide by 9.

To convert Centigrade to Fahrenheit multiply by 9, divide by 5, and add 32. This does away with the recurrence of decimals.

Similarly, according to Reaumur's scale, the boiling point of water is 80° and the freezing point 0°.

To convert Fahrenheit to Reaumur subtract 32, multiply by 4, and divide by 9.

To convert Reaumur to Fahrenheit multiply by 9, divide by 4, and add 32.

The Republican Convention of 1912 was held in Chicago, Ill., on June 18-22. William Howard Taft, of Ohio, was nominated for President and James S. Sherman, of New York, was nominated for Vice-President.

The following platform was adopted:

The Republican Party, assembled by its representatives in national convention, declares its unchanging faith in government of the people, by the people, for the people. We renew our allegiance to the principles of the Republican Party and our devotion to the cause of Republican institutions established by the fathers.

It is appropriate that we should now recall with a sense of veneration and gratitude the name of our first great leader, who was nominated in this city, and whose lofty principles and superb devotion to his country are an inspiration to the party he honored—Abraham Lincoln.

In the present state of public affairs we should be inspired by his broad statesmanship and by his tolerant spirit toward men.

PRIDE IN PARTY'S RECORD.

The Republican Party looks back upon its record with pride and satisfaction, and forward to its new responsibilities with hope and confidence. Its achievements in government constitute the most luminous pages in our history. Our greatest national advance has been made during the years of its ascendancy in public affairs. It has been genuinely and always a party of progress; it has never been either stationary or reactionary. It has gone from the fulfillment of one great pledge to the fulfillment of another in response to the public need and to the popular will.

We believe in our self-controlled representative democracy, which is a government of laws not of men, and in which order is the prerequisite of progress.

The principles of constitutional government, which make provision for orderly and effective expression of the popular will, for the protection of civil liberty and the rights of men, and for the interpretation of law by an untrammelled and independent judiciary, have proved themselves capable of sustaining the structure of a government which, after more than a century of development, embraces 100,000,000 people, scattered over a wide and diverse territory, but bound by common purpose, common ideals, and common affection to the Constitution of the United States.

HOW NATION HAS GROWN.

Under the Constitution and the principles asserted and vitalized by it, the United States has grown to be one of the great civilized and civilizing powers of the earth. It offers a home and an opportunity to the ambitious and the industrious from other lands. Resting upon the broad basis of a people's confidence and a people's support and managed by the people themselves, the Government of the United States will meet the problems of the future as satisfactorily as it has solved those of the past.

The Republican Party is now, as always, a party of advanced and constructive statesmanship. It is prepared to go forward with the solution of those new questions which social, economic, and political development have brought into the forefront of the Nation's interest. It will strive, not only in the Nation, but in the several States, to enact the necessary legislation to safeguard the public health, to limit effectively the labor of women and children, to protect wage-earners engaged in dangerous occupations, to enact comprehensive and generous workman's compensation laws in place of the present wasteful and unjust system of employers' liability, and in all possible ways to satisfy the just demand of the people for the study and solution of the complex and constantly changing problems of social welfare.

PROTECTION OF LIBERTY.

In dealing with these questions it is important that the rights of every individual to the freest possible development of his own powers and resources and to the control of his own justly acquired property, as far as those are compatible with the rights of others, shall not be interfered with or destroyed. The social and political structure of the United States rests upon the civil liberty of the individual, and for the protection of that liberty the people have wisely, in the national and State constitution, put definite limitations upon themselves and upon their governmental officers and agencies. To enforce these limitations, to secure the orderly and coherent exercise of governmental powers, and to protect the rights of even the humblest and least favored individual are the function of independent courts of justice.

The Republican Party reaffirms its intention to uphold at all times the authority and integrity of the courts, both State and Federal, and it will ever insist that their powers to enforce their processes and to protect life, liberty, and property shall be preserved inviolate. An orderly method is provided under our system of government by which the people may, when they choose, alter or amend the constitutional provisions which underlie that government. Until these constitutional provisions are so altered or amended, in orderly fashion, it is the duty of the courts to see to it that when challenged they are enforced.

WOULD HURRY LAWSUITS.

That the courts, both Federal and State, may bear the heavy burden laid upon them to the complete satisfaction of public opinion we favor legislation to prevent long delays and the tedious and costly appeals which have so often amounted to a denial of justice in civil cases and to a failure to protect the public at large in criminal cases.

Since the responsibility of the judiciary is so great, the standards of judicial action must be always and everywhere above suspicion and reproach. While

we regard the recall of judges as unnecessary and unwise, we favor such action as may be necessary to simplify the process by which any judge who is found to be derelict in his duty may be removed from office.

Together with peaceful and orderly development at home, the Republican party earnestly favors all measures for the establishment and protection of the peace of the world and for the development of closer relations between the various nations of the earth. It believes most earnestly in the peaceful settlement of international disputes and in the reference of all controversies between nations to an international court of justice.

MONOPOLY AND PRIVILEGE.

The Republican Party is opposed to special privilege and to monopoly. It placed upon the statute book the interstate commerce act of 1887 and the important amendments thereto, and the antitrust act of 1890, and it has consistently and successfully enforced the provisions of these laws. It will take no backward step to permit the re-establishment in any degree of conditions which were intolerable.

Experience makes it plain that the business of the country can be carried on without fear and without disturbance and at the same time without resort to practices which are abhorrent to the common sense of justice. The Republican Party favors the enactment of legislation supplementary to the existing antitrust act which will define as criminal offenses those specific acts that uniformly mark attempts to restrain and to monopolize trade, to the end that those who honestly intend to obey the law may have a guide for their action and that those who aim to violate the law may the more surely be punished. The same certainty should be given to the law prohibiting combinations and monopolies that characterizes other provisions of commercial law, in order that no part of the field of business opportunity may be restricted by monopoly or combination, that business success honorably achieved may not be converted into crime, and that the right of every man to acquire commodities, and particularly the necessities of life, in an open market, uninfluenced by the manipulation of trust or combination, may be preserved.

FEDERAL TRADE COMMISSION.

In the enforcement and administration of Federal laws governing interstate commerce and enterprises impressed with a public use engaged therein there is much that may be committed to a Federal trade commission, thus placing in the hands of an administrative board many of the functions now necessarily exercised by the courts. This will promote promptness in the administration of the laws and avoid delays and technicalities incident to court procedure.

THE TARIFF POLICY.

We reaffirm our belief in a protective tariff. The Republican tariff policy has been of the greatest benefit to the country, developing our resources, diversifying our industries, and protecting our workmen against competition with cheaper labor abroad, thus establishing for our wage-earners the American standard of living. The protective tariff is so woven into the fabric of our industrial and agricultural life that to substitute for it a tariff for revenue only would destroy many industries and throw millions of our people out of employment. The products of the farm and of the mine should receive the same measure of protection as other products of American labor.

We hold that the import duties should be high enough, while yielding a sufficient revenue, to protect adequately American industries and wages. Some of the existing import duties are too high, and should be reduced. Readjustment should be made from time to time to conform to changing conditions and to reduce excessive rates, but without injury to any American industry. To accomplish this, correct information is indispensable. This information can best be obtained by an expert commission, as the large volume of useful facts contained in the recent reports of the Tariff Board has demonstrated.

TARIFF BOARD INDORSED.

The pronounced feature of modern industrial life is its enormous diversification. To apply tariff rates justly to these changing conditions requires closer study and more scientific methods than ever before. The Republican Party has shown by its creation of a Tariff Board its recognition of this situation and its determination to be equal to it. We condemn the Democratic Party for its failure either to provide funds for the continuance of this board or to make some other provision for securing the information requisite for intelligent tariff

legislation. We protest against the Democratic method of legislating on these vitally important subjects without careful investigation.

We condemn the Democratic tariff bills passed by the House of Representatives of the Sixty-second Congress as sectional, as injurious to the public credit, and as destructive of business enterprise.

COST OF LIVING.

The steadily increasing cost of living has become a matter not only of national but of world-wide concern. The fact that it is not due to the protective tariff system is evidenced by the existence of similar conditions in countries which have a tariff policy different from our own, as well as by the fact that the cost of living has increased while rates of duty have remained stationary or been reduced.

The Republican Party will support a prompt scientific inquiry into the causes which are operative, both in the United States and elsewhere, to increase the cost of living. When the exact facts are known, it will take the necessary steps to remove such abuses as may be found to exist, in order that the cost of food, clothing, and shelter of the people may in no way be unduly or artificially increased.

BANKING AND CURRENCY.

The Republican Party has always stood for a sound currency and safe banking methods. It is responsible for the resumption of specie payment and for the establishment of the gold standard. It is committed to the progressive development of our banking and currency system. Our banking arrangements today need further revision to meet the requirements of current conditions. We need measures which will prevent the recurrence of money panics and financial disturbances and which will promote the prosperity of business and the welfare of labor by producing constant employment. We need better currency facilities for the movement of crops in the West and South. We need banking arrangements under American auspices for the encouragement and better conduct of our foreign trade. In attaining these ends the independence of individual banks, whether organized under national or State charters, must be carefully protected, and our banking and currency system must be safeguarded from any possibility of domination by sectional, financial, or political interests.

It is of great importance to the social and economic welfare of this country that its farmers have facilities for borrowing easily and cheaply the money they need to increase the productivity of their land. It is as important that financial machinery be provided to supply the demand of farmers for credit as it is that the banking and currency systems be reformed in the interest of general business. Therefore we recommend and urge an authoritative investigation of agricultural credit societies and corporations in other countries and the passage of State and Federal laws for the establishment and capable supervision of organizations having for another purpose the loaning of funds to farmers.

THE CIVIL SERVICE.

We reaffirm our adherence to the principle of appointment to public office based on proved fitness, and tenure during good behavior and efficiency. The Republican Party stands committed to the maintenance, extension, and enforcement of the civil-service law, and it favors the passage of legislation empowering the President to extend competitive service so far as practicable. We favor legislation to make possible the equitable retirement of disabled and super-annuated members of the civil service, in order that a higher standard of efficiency may be maintained.

We favor the amendment of the Federal employers' liability law so as to extend its provisions to all Government employees, as well as to provide a more liberal scale of compensation for injury and death.

CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS.

We favor such additional legislation as may be necessary more effectually to prohibit corporations from contributing funds, directly or indirectly, to campaigns for the nomination or election of the President, the Vice-President, Senators, and Representatives in Congress.

We heartily approve the recent act of Congress requiring the fullest publicity in regard to all campaign contributions, whether made in connection with primaries, conventions, or elections.

REPUBLICAN PLATFORM, 1912—Continued.

CONSERVATION POLICY.

We rejoice in the success of the distinctive Republican policy of the conservation of our national resources for their use by the people without waste and without monopoly. We pledge ourselves to a continuance of such a policy.

We favor such fair and reasonable rules and regulations as will not discourage or interfere with actual bona fide homeseekers, prospectors, and miners in the acquisition of public lands under existing laws.

PARCEL POST ASKED.

In the interest of the general public, and particularly of the agricultural or rural communities, we favor legislation looking to the establishment under proper regulations, of a parcel post, the postal rates to be graduated under a zone system—in proportion to the length of carriage.

PROTECTION AND CITIZENSHIP.

We approve the action taken by the President and the Congress to secure with Russia, as with other countries, a treaty that will recognize the absolute right of expatriation, and that will prevent all discrimination of whatever kind between American citizens, whether native born or alien, and regardless of race, religion, or previous political allegiance. The right of asylum is a precious possession of the people of the United States, and it is to be neither surrendered nor restricted.

NEW BATTLESHIPS URGED.

We believe in the maintenance of an adequate navy for the national defense, and we condemn the action of the Democratic House of Representatives in refusing to authorize the construction of battleships.

We believe that one of the country's most urgent needs is a merchant marine. There should be American ships and plenty of them, to make use of the great American interoceanic canal now nearing completion.

FOR FLOOD PROTECTION.

The Mississippi River is the Nation's drainage ditch. Its flood waters, gathered from 31 States and the Dominion of Canada, constitute an overpowering force which breaks the levees and pours its torrents over many million acres of the richest land in the Union, stopping mails, impeding commerce, and causing great loss of life and property. These floods are national in scope, and the disasters they produce seriously affect the general welfare. The States, unaided, can not cope with this giant problem. Hence, we believe the Federal Government should assume a fair proportion of the burdens of its control, so as to prevent the disasters from recurring floods.

RECLAMATION OF LANDS.

We favor the continuance of the policy of the Government with regard to the reclamation of arid lands; and for the encouragement of the speedy settlement and improvement of such lands we favor an amendment to the law that will reasonably extend the time within which the cost of any reclamation project may be repaid by the landowners under it.

We favor a liberal and systematic policy for the improvement of our rivers and harbors. Such improvements should be made upon expert information and after a careful comparison of cost and prospective benefits.

LIBERAL ALASKAN POLICY.

We favor a liberal policy toward Alaska to promote the development of the great resources of that District, with such safeguards as will prevent waste and monopoly.

We favor the opening of the coal lands to development through a law leasing the lands on such terms as will invite development and provide fuel for the Navy and the commerce of the Pacific Ocean, while retaining title in the United States to prevent monopoly.

PHILIPPINE ATTITUDE.

The Philippine policy of the Republican Party has been and is inspired by the belief that our duty toward the Filipino people is a national obligation which should remain entirely free from partisan politics.

We ratify in all its particulars the platform of 1908 respecting citizenship for the people of Porto Rico.

REPUBLICAN PLATFORM, 1912—Continued.

We pledge the Republican Party to the enactment of appropriate laws to give relief from the constantly growing evil of induced or undesirable immigration, which is inimical to the progress and welfare of the people of the United States.

SAFETY AT SEA.

We favor the speedy enactment of laws to provide that seamen shall not be compelled to endure involuntary servitude, and that life and property at sea shall be safeguarded by the ample equipment of vessels with life-saving appliances and with full complements of skilled, able-bodied seamen to operate them.

REPUBLICAN ACCOMPLISHMENT.

The approaching completion of the Panama Canal, the establishment of a Bureau of Mines, the institution of postal savings banks, the increased provision made in 1912 for the aged and infirm soldiers and sailors of the Republic and for their widows, and the vigorous administration of the laws relating to pure food and drugs, all mark the successful progress of Republican administration and are additional evidence of its effectiveness.

We commend the earnest effort of the Republican administration to secure greater economy and increased efficiency in the conduct of Government business. Extravagant appropriations and the creation of unnecessary offices are an injustice to the taxpayer and a bad example to the citizen.

We call upon the people to quicken their interest in public affairs, to condemn and punish lynchings and other forms of lawlessness, and to strengthen in all possible ways a respect for law and the observance of it. Indifferent citizenship is an evil from which the law affords no adequate protection, and for which legislation can provide no remedy.

We congratulate the people of Arizona and New Mexico upon the admission of those States, thus merging in the Union in final and enduring form the last remaining portion of our continental territory.

REPUBLICAN ADMINISTRATION.

We challenge successful criticism of the 16 years of Republican administration under Presidents McKinley, Roosevelt and Taft. We heartily reaffirm the indorsement of President McKinley contained in the platform of 1900 and of 1904, and that of President Roosevelt contained in the platforms of 1904 and 1908.

We invite the intelligent judgment of the American people upon the administration of William H. Taft. The country has prospered and been at peace under his Presidency. During the years in which he had the co-operation of a Republican Congress an unexampled amount of constructive legislation was framed and passed in the interest of the people and in obedience to their wish. That legislation is a record on which any administration might appeal with confidence to the favorable judgment of history.

We appeal to the American electorate upon the record of the Republican Party, and upon this declaration of its principles and purposes. We are confident that under the leadership of the candidates here to be nominated our appeal will not be in vain; that the Republican Party will meet every just expectation of the people whose servant it is; that under its administration and its laws our Nation will continue to advance; that peace and prosperity will abide with the people, and that new glory will be added to the great Republic.

When the Convention, 1,078 strong, opened, Taft's supporters claimed 600 votes, Roosevelt's 582 votes, and 36 were credited to La Follette and 10 to Cummins. Roosevelt contended that only delegates whose seats were uncontested should vote in the temporary organization, his list and that made out by the

National Committee differing by nearly 100 names. Taft delegates enrolled for districts which Roosevelt men contested he denounced as so many "thefts." Their voting was bitterly objected to, and the Convention's endorsement of their claims led finally to a bolt and the formation of a new party. The proceedings were as follows:

Tuesday, June 18.—Senator Root, a supporter of Taft, was elected Temporary Chairman by a vote of 558 against 502 cast for Governor McGovern, of Wisconsin. This was deemed favorable to Taft, but not conclusive.

Wednesday.—By a vote of 564 to 510 a motion to remove from the temporary roll 78 delegates whose seats were contested was defeated. The Committee on Credentials took similar action. Roosevelt, indignant, advised "the real and lawful majority" to bolt.

Thursday.—Convention in session but five minutes. The reports of Committees on Credentials and Platform were awaited. Roosevelt decided to form a new party and announces his willingness to be its candidate.

Friday.—The Convention upheld the National Committee's decisions on contested seats, the votes in the several cases ranging from 605 vs. 464 to 542 vs. 529.

Saturday.—The temporary organization was made permanent and the platform was adopted. Roosevelt delegates refused to vote. Taft and Sherman were renominated on the first ballot. A "Progressive" Convention, composed largely of Roosevelt bolters, met in Orchestra Hall, Chicago, and nominated for President Theodore Roosevelt, who accepted the nomination. On the Republican platform the vote was 666 ayes, nays 53, absent 16, present but not voting 343. La Follette repudiated the platform.

PROGRESSIVE PARTY.

For President—Theodore Roosevelt, New York.

For Vice-President—Hiram W. Johnson, California.

A Declaration and Platform were adopted at the first National Convention, August 7, 1912, at Chicago.

The "Declaration" says that "Behind the ostensible government sits enthroned an invisible government * * * acknowledging no responsibility to the people" and that "To destroy this invisible government, to dissolve the unholy alliance between corrupt business and corrupt politics is the first task of the statesmanship of the day." The old parties are unfit. "The deliberate betrayal of its trust by the Republican Party and the fatal incapacity of the Democratic Party to deal with the new issues of the new time have compelled the people to forge a new instrument of government." Hence the Progressive Party which "pledges itself to secure such alterations in the fundamental law of the several States and of the United States as shall insure the representative character of the government." It declares for direct primaries for State and National officers, nation-wide preferential primaries for the Presidency, direct election of United States Senators, the short ballot, the initiative, referendum and recall. The party also pledges itself to provide an easier and more expeditious method of amending the federal constitution: the restriction of States' rights and enlargement of federal rights of making labor laws and other laws affecting problems "beyond the reach of the individual States"; laws to prevent industrial accidents, overwork and unemployment; the fixing of minimum safety standards; the prohibition of child labor; the minimum wage; prohibition of night work for women; woman suffrage; abolition of convict contract labor; standards of compensation for death and injury by industrial accidents; insurance against sickness, old age and non-employment; organization of labor; strong national regulation of corporations; publicity, supervision and regulation of corporation business; the creation of a strong federal administrative commission to supervise industrial corporations in interstate business as national banks and railways are now supervised; extension of foreign commerce by co-operation with producers; maintenance of a protective tariff which will "equalize conditions of competition" with foreign producers and "maintain for labor an adequate standard of living"; downward revision of excessive tariff duties; conservation of natural resources and water powers; development of natural waterways and especially of the Mississippi River and its tributaries; exemption from tolls of American Coasting vessels traversing the Panama Canal; publicity of campaign contributions; registration of lobbyists and preventing federal officials from participating in politics; restriction of the power of courts; provision for overriding by popular vote a State court decision pronouncing a State law unconstitutional; revision by the Supreme Court of decisions of State Supreme Courts pronouncing State laws in violation of the federal constitution; restriction of injunctions in labor disputes and jury trials of cases of contempt of court in certain contingencies; creation of a Department of Labor; restriction of patent rights in certain cases; the abolition of the Commerce Court; valuation of the physical property of railways; construction of national roads; a graduated inheritance tax on large estates and an income tax; approval of the Southern States' pensioning ex-Confederates; parcels post; faithful enforcement of the Civil Service regulation and extension of its scope; federal supervision of investments offered for sale to the public.

Platform.

1. The alcoholic drink traffic is wrong; is the most serious drain on the wealth and resources of the nation; is detrimental to the general welfare and destructive of the inalienable rights of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. All laws taxing or licensing a traffic which produces crime, poverty and political corruption, and spreads disease and death, should be repealed. To destroy such a traffic there must be elected to power a political party which will administer the government from the standpoint that the alcoholic drink traffic is a crime and not a business, and we pledge that the manufacture, importation, exportation, transportation and sale of alcoholic beverages shall be prohibited. We favor also:
2. Suffrage for women on the same terms as for men.
3. A uniform marriage and divorce law. The extermination of polygamy. And the complete suppression of the traffic in girls.
4. Absolute protection of the rights of labor, without impairment of the rights of capital.
5. The settlement of all international disputes by arbitration.
6. The abolition of child labor in mines, workshops and factories, with the rigid enforcement of the laws now flagrantly violated.
7. The election of United States Senators by direct vote of the people.
8. A Presidential term of six years, and one term only.
9. Court review of Post Office and other departmental decisions and orders; the extension of the Postal Savings Bank system, and of Rural Delivery, and the establishment of an efficient parcels post.
10. The initiative, referendum and recall.
11. As the tariff is a commercial question it should be fixed on the scientific basis of accurate knowledge, secured by means of a permanent, omni-partisan tariff commission, with ample powers.
12. Equitable graduated income and inheritance taxes.
13. Conservation of our forest and mineral reserves, and the reclamation of waste lands. All mineral and timber lands, and water powers, now owned by the government, should be held perpetually, and leased for revenue purposes.
14. Clearly defined laws for the regulation and control of corporations transacting an interstate business.
15. Efficiency and economy in government administration.
16. The protection of one day in seven as a day of rest.

WORKING PROGRAM.

As measures calculated to strengthen the working class in its fight for the realization of its ultimate aim, the co-operative commonwealth, and to increase its power of resistance against capitalist oppression, we advocate the following program:

COLLECTIVE OWNERSHIP.

The collective ownership and democratic management of railroads, wire and wireless telegraphs and telephones, express services, steamboat lines and all other social means of transportation and communication and of all large-scale industries. The immediate acquirement by the municipalities, the States or the federal government of all grain elevators, stock yards, storage warehouses, and other distributing agencies, in order to reduce the present extortionate cost of living. The extension of the public domain to include mines, quarries, oil wells, forest and water power. The further conservation and development of natural resources for the use and benefit of all the people. By scientific forestation and timber protection and by the reclamation of arid and swamp tracts. By the storage of flood waters and the utilization of water power. By the stoppage of the present extravagant waste of the soil and of the products of mines and oil wells. By the development of highway and waterway systems. The collective ownership of land wherever practicable, and in cases where such ownership is impracticable, the appropriation by taxation of the annual rental value of all land held for speculation or exploitation. The collective ownership and democratic management of the banking and currency system.

UNEMPLOYMENT.

The immediate government relief of the unemployed by the extension of all useful public works. All persons employed on such works to be engaged directly by the government under a workday of not more than eight hours and at not less than the prevailing union wages. The government also to establish employment bureaus; to lend money to states and municipalities without interest for the purpose of carrying on public works, and to take such other measures within its power as will lessen the widespread misery of the workers caused by the misrule of the capitalist class.

INDUSTRIAL DEMANDS.

The conservation of human resources, particularly of the lives and well-being of the workers and their families: 1, by shortening the workday; 2, a rest period of not less than a day and a half in each week; 3, a more effective inspection of workshops, factories and mines; 4, forbidding the employment of children under sixteen years of age; 5, co-operative organization of industries in the federal penitentiaries for the benefit of convicts; 6, forbidding the interstate transportation of products of child labor, of convict labor and of uninspected factories and mines; 7, abolishing the profit system in government work, and substituting either the direct hire of labor or the awarding of contracts to co-operative groups of workers; 8, establishing minimum wage scales; 9, abolishing official charity and substituting a non-contributory system of old-age pensions, a general system of insurance by the State of all its members against unemployment and invalidism and a system of compulsory insurance by employers of their workers, without cost to the latter, against industrial diseases, accidents and death.

POLITICAL DEMANDS.

The absolute freedom of press, speech and assemblage. The adoption of a graduated income tax, the increase of the rates of the present corporation tax and the extension of inheritance taxes, graduated in proportion to the value of the estate and to nearness of kin—the proceeds of these taxes to be employed in the socialization of industry. The abolition of the monopoly ownership of patents and the substitution of collective ownership, with direct rewards to inventors by premiums or royalties. Unrestricted and equal suffrage for men and women. The adoption of the initiative, referendum and recall and of pro-

portional representation, nationally as well as locally. The abolition of the Senate and of the veto power of the President. The election of the President and the Vice-President by direct vote of the people. The abolition of the power usurped by the Supreme Court of the United States to pass upon the constitutionality of the legislation enacted by Congress. National laws to be repealed only by act of Congress or by a referendum vote of the whole people. The abolition of the present restrictions upon the amendment of the constitution, so that that instrument may be made amendable by a majority of the voters in the country. The granting of the right of suffrage in the District of Columbia with representation in Congress and a democratic form of municipal government for purely local affairs. The extension of democratic government to all United States territory. The enactment of further measures for general education and particularly for vocational education in useful pursuits. The Bureau of Education to be made a department. The enactment of further measures for the conservation of health. The creation of an independent bureau of health, with such restrictions as will secure full liberty to all schools of practice. The separation of the present Bureau of Labor from the Department of Commerce and Labor and its elevation to the rank of a department. Abolition of all federal district courts and the United States Circuit Courts of Appeals. State courts to have jurisdiction in all cases arising between citizens of the several States and foreign corporations. The election of all judges for short terms. The immediate curbing of the power of the courts to issue injunctions. The free administration of the law. The calling of a convention for the revision of the Constitution of the United States. Such measures of relief as we may be able to force from capitalism are but a preparation of the workers to seize the whole powers of government, in order that they may thereby lay hold of the whole system of socialized industry and thus come to their rightful inheritance.

SOCIALIST LABOR PARTY.

The National Convention of the Socialist Labor Party in New York, April 10, 1912, nominated: For President—Arthur Elmer Reimer, Massachusetts; for Vice-President, August Gillhaus, New York. The platform adopted, after denouncing the capitalist social system, says:

The program of the Socialist Labor Party is Revolution—the Industrial or Socialist Republic, the Social Order where the Political State is overthrown; where the Congress of the land consists of the representatives of the useful occupations of the land; where, accordingly, government is an essential factor in production; where the blessings to man that the Trust is instinct with are freed from the trammels of the private ownership that now turn the potential blessings into a curse; where, accordingly, abundance can be the patrimony of all who work; and the shackles of wage slavery are no more.

The means firmly adhered to by the Socialist Labor Party for realizing its programme is the constitutional method of political action; backed by the industrially and class-consciously organized proletariat, to the exclusion of Anarchy, and all that thereby hangs. The means in contemplation by Reaction is the bayonet. To this end Reaction is seeking to lash the proletariat into acts of violence that may give color of reason to resort to the bayonet. By its maneuvers, it is egging the Working Class on to deeds of fury. The capitalist press echoes the policy, while the pure and simple political Socialist party press, generally, is snared into the trap.

The Socialist Labor Party calls upon all intelligent citizens to place themselves squarely upon the ground of Working Class interests, and join in this mighty and noble work of human emancipation, so that we may put summary end to the existing barbarous class conflict by placing the land and all the means of production, transportation and distribution into the hands of the people as a collective body, and substituting for the present state of planless production, industrial war and social disorder, the Socialist or Industrial Commonwealth—a commonwealth in which every worker shall have the free exercise and full benefit of his faculties, multiplied by all the modern factors of civilization.

BALTIMORE'S DIFFERENTIALS AFFIRMED.

The Interstate Commerce Commission, June 15, announced its decision affirming Baltimore's right to a differential of 3 cents per 100 pounds over New York and Boston, and 1 cent over Philadelphia on eastbound freight shipped all rail; on westbound traffic an advantage of 8 cents over New York and Boston, and 2 cents over Philadelphia for freight of the first and second class; for the third, fourth, fifth and sixth classes 3 cents and 1 cent respectively, the same as for eastbound business.

On export shipments of grain from the West, the decision continues Baltimore's present differential of 1½ cents per 100 pounds and Philadelphia's 1 cent under New York, as also a rate under New York and Boston to Baltimore and Philadelphia on grain, ex-lake, for export, from Buffalo, Erie and West Fairport, of two-tenths of 1 cent per bushel on barley and oats and three-tenths of 1 cent per bushel on wheat, corn and rye.

January 1st, 1912, the Commission had completed 174.97 miles of State road, costing \$1,981,569.42. To the same date there had been completed by the Maryland Geological Survey (and its successors, the State Roads Commission, after June 1st, 1910) 166.49 miles of State-aid road, costing \$1,405,180.45, and 18.57 miles of the Baltimore-Washington road (State Road No. 1), costing \$237,723.28. The outstanding work was: State roads, 169.51 miles; estimated cost, \$2,288,648.62; State-aid roads, 12.10 miles; estimated cost, \$138,143.74.

During 1912 work under both the State road and the State-aid road laws went forward: 34 contracts were let for 112 miles, at a cost of \$626,749.57 for State roads, and for State-aid roads 8 contracts for 10.85 miles, at a cost of \$117,622.74. October 1st, 1912, the situation was as follows:

THE HOPKINS SCHOOL OF TECHNOLOGY.

The Maryland Legislature of 1912 appropriated \$600,000 with which to erect and equip a school of advanced technology in connection with the Johns Hopkins University and provided a continuing appropriation of \$50,000 yearly for its support. The University, in return, is to provide 120 free technical scholarships for Maryland boys who meet entrance examinations and other requirements. The unties and Baltimore get scholarships in number equaling their legislative districts. There are to be besides six scholarships at large and three graduate scholarships for each of seven Maryland colleges. The University's control of its aims, its studies, examinations and standards of scholarship remains unimpaired.

The school was organized in 1848. In 1911-1912 it had 50 teachers and nearly 1,600 pupils enrolled. The courses embrace drawing, design, painting in oil and water colors, modeling in clay, illustration, and the industrial features of mechanical and architectural drawing, design and applied art, with actual materials of clay, metal, wood and leather. There are evening classes in jewelry and in sheet metal pattern drafting.

The Mount Royal avenue building accommodates the day school and the free-hand night classes. The mechanical and architectural divisions of the night school occupy the building at Market Place and East Baltimore street, where also there is maintained a Saturday elementary mechanical class.

Examinations are based on the work of the Public Schools of Baltimore, a different set of questions being given to the boys of the several grades.—Third, Fourth, Fifth and Sixth. The subjects are arithmetic, reading, geography and composition on an assigned subject as a test of knowledge of English. The regular term at the school ends when the boy is 16 years of age, but the earning of an honorary scholarship may enable him to continue one year longer.

The property of the foundation consists of 835 acres of land in a beautiful and healthy region, 12 miles northwest of Baltimore City, commodious buildings and an endowment aggregating \$980,600.

BALTIMORE'S NEARNESS TO THE WEST.

Baltimore's advantage over Philadelphia, New York and Boston, as a point of exportation, is seen in the fact that it is but 395 miles from Buffalo, 782 miles from Chicago and 927 miles from St. Louis. Philadelphia is 416 miles from Buffalo, 817 from Chicago, 962 from St. Louis. New York is 411 miles from Buffalo, 907 from Chicago, 1,052 from St. Louis. Boston is 481 miles from Buffalo, 1,000 from Chicago, and 1,221 from St. Louis. Baltimore's "differential" is based largely on the fact that its greater nearness to these western centres justifies a smaller charge for carriage of bulky freights. Baltimore's greater distance from the open sea does not neutralize the advantage here shown.

BALTIMORE'S PASTEUR INSTITUTE.

Of the 1,701 cases treated for the prevention of hydrophobia at the College of Physicians and Surgeons only three are reported to have died of hydrophobia. The rate of mortality was one-fifth of 1 per cent. Without the Pasteur treatment, the mortality from bites of rabid animals is from 5 to 80 per cent., depending upon the situation and severity of the wounds.

It was ascertained that 890 of the 1,701 persons treated were bitten by animals that were rabid. The wounds were inflicted by dogs in 1,503 cases, in 108 cases by cats, in 3 by a calf, in 1 by a pet pig, in 13 by cows, in 17 by horses, in 1 by guinea pig, and in 4 by human beings. In 58 cases the wounds were not the result of bites.

Of the 1,701 persons treated 1,116 were males and 486 females. Three hundred and thirty-two under 10 years old were treated, being 18 per cent. of all patients received. The youngest treated was 7 months old; the oldest, 82 years.

Four Miles—Two Saints, 162, May 4, 1912, 8.10.

The latter was the first four-mile race run on the flat since the new Maryland Jockey Club revived racing at Pimlico in 1904.

Calgary, who made the four and a half furlongs record at the spring meeting at Pimlico, was supposed at that time to be one of the best two-year-olds in this country. Bought as a yearling in Kentucky by Mr. Robert Davies, of Toronto, Canada, the colt was so well thought of that he was entered for the English Derby, to run in the spring of 1913. But he got sick after leaving Pimlico and never got back to his best form. He will not, perhaps, be shipped to England, as was intended.

PROGRESS OF SEWER CONSTRUCTION.

Length of sewers, drains and connections completed to December 31st, 1912, 315 miles; manholes built, 5,650; inlets installed, 2,150; length of sewers and drains built and contracted for to December 31st, 1912, 375 miles.

The Sewerage Pumping Station was formally put in operation by Mayor James H. Preston, January 31st, 1912, and has been in operation daily since. Besides sanitary sewage from the Low Level sewers, much water has been drawn from Jones' Falls, with improvement in the condition of the harbor. The Disposal Plant at Back River, put in operation late in the Fall of 1911, has since been in daily service. The sprinkling filters already completed are of capacity sufficient to purify the sewage from about 275,000 people. A contract was let, September, 1912, for 18 acres of additional filter surface. When these filters are completed, the Disposal Plant will suffice to purify the sewage from over 600,000 people. Over 10,000 houses are now connected with the sanitary sewers.

The total value of work completed and placed under contract to December 31st, 1912, including all costs, was approximately \$15,500,000.00.

TURKISH LOSSES OF EMPIRE.

Since 1683, when Sobieski at Vienna checked the advance of the Turk upon Christendom, the disintegration of the Ottoman Empire has been in progress, these being some of the later steps: Greece became independent, 1830; Algeria, occupied by France, 1830; Serbia, autonomous 1830, independent 1878, Kingdom 1881; Rumania, autonomous 1862, independent 1878, Kingdom 1881; Montenegro, independent 1878, Kingdom 1910; Bosnia and Herzegovina occupied by Austria, 1878, annexed 1908; Bulgaria, autonomous 1878, independent Kingdom 1908; Eastern Rumelia, autonomous 1878, annexed to Bulgaria 1885; Cyprus ceded to England 1878; Tunis French Protectorate 1881; Egypt occupied by England, 1882; Crete autonomous 1898; Tripoli seized by Italy, 1911; Macedonia taken by Bulgaria, Serbia, Montenegro and Greece, 1912; Albania and Epirus at the same time being severed from Turkey. Russia has made gains at Turkey's expense on the Black Sea. On the other hand, Turkish power has been extended in Arabia and eastward.

PANAMA-PACIFIC INTERNATIONAL EXPOSITION.

SAN FRANCISCO, 1915.

This is a National undertaking, determined upon by Congress and designated by the President to celebrate the opening of the Panama Canal. The Exposition will open February 20 and close December 4, 1915. Being a great inter-hemisphere waterway, the celebration of its opening will be participated in by all countries. In February, 1912, President Taft by proclamation announced the Exposition and invited the nations of the world to take part. He also invited the representatives of foreign nations and their fleets to assemble in the harbor of Hampton Roads, Virginia, and proceed thence to Washington for a formal welcome by the President of the United States who will accompany them back to Hampton Roads for a review of the assembled fleets as they start on their voyage via the Panama Canal to San Francisco. By November, 1912, twenty-one foreign countries had declared their intention to participate. At the same date thirty-one States and Territories had accepted the invitation to take part. The Exposition Grounds contain 625 acres in the "Harbor View" section, forming a natural amphitheatre overlooking San Francisco Bay and its "Golden Gate" entrance from the Pacific, extending over two miles on the water front. Citizens of San Francisco have subscribed \$7,000,000, and additional sums have been pledged. California has appropriated \$5,000,000, and San Francisco \$5,000,000, to the general fund of the Exposition management. The counties of California are raising several million dollars for their individual representation. Including the large sums to be expended by foreign countries and States of the Union for their official participation, and by industrial and other concerns for private exhibits, the total expenditures for the Universal Exposition of 1915 will approximate \$50,000,000.

ENGLAND HOLDS LAWN TENNIS TITLE.

At Melbourne, Australia, November 30, in fine weather, England won title to the Dwight F. Davis Cup, or the world's championship in lawn tennis, by taking the third match from the Australian defenders. There were four single matches and one double, the team winning three of the five getting the cup, the international trophy. On the 28th J. C. Parke and Charles P. Dixon, of England, defeated Norman E. Brookes and R. W. Heath, of Australasia, respectively, in the first two single matches. On the 29th, in the doubles match, Norman E. Brookes and A. W. Dunlop, Australasia, beat John C. Parke and A. E. Beamish, British, On the 30th Brookes beat Dixon.

The rubber being now two all, the 7,000 spectators were intent upon the final game. Score: J. C. Parke, England, vs. R. W. Heath, Australasia, 6—2, 6—4, 6—4.

THE NEW CONGRESSIONAL REAPPORTIONMENT.

Under the new Reapportionment Act (Public No. 5, approved August 8, 1911) is provided that after March 3, 1913 (this being the day marking the close of a Sixty-second and the beginning of the Sixty-third Congress), the House of representatives, on the basis of the thirteenth census, taken in 1910, shall consist of 433 members, instead of 391, as at present. This will be an increase of members. In salaries of members alone, this represents an additional expense \$315,000 annually. The new reapportionment—shown in comparison with the old—and the increased representation of various States in the House is as follows:

The new Reapportionment Law further provides that in the event that both the Territories of Arizona and New Mexico shall become States before apportionment is made under the next census (that of 1920) they shall each have one representative, and if either become a State before such apportionment it shall have one representative, which representative or representatives shall be in addition to the number 433.

APPORTIONMENT OF DELEGATES.

By the Constitution of the State of Maryland, Article 3, Section 5, it is made the duty of the Governor, "immediately after the taking and publishing of the next national census, or after any State enumeration of population, to arrange the representatives in the House of Delegates, as follows:

Every county having 18,000 population or less, 2 delegates.

Every county having over 18,000 and less than 28,000, 3 delegates.

55,000 and upwards, 6 delegates.

28,000 and less than 40,000, 4 delegates.

40,000 and less than 55,000, 5 delegates.

Each of the four legislative districts of Baltimore, one Senator and as many Delegates as the largest county. No county can have more than six delegates.

By proclamation April 15, 1911, Governor Crothers fixed the apportionment in accord with the Federal census of 1910, as follows:

A FEW POINTERS ABOUT BALTIMORE.

Baltimore ranks first in the canning and preserving industry.

It is one of the first cities of the country in the manufacture of clothing and straw hats.

More fertilizer is shipped from Baltimore factories than from the combined factories of any other State.

Baltimore has the largest copper refining plant in the country. The copper smelting and refining works and the coppersmithing business in Baltimore represents an investment of \$20,000,000. Copper exports amount to \$22,000,000 a year.

The National and State banks and trust companies of Baltimore have a capital surplus and undivided profits of approximately \$50,000,000 and deposits of \$210,000,000. There has not been a bank failure in Baltimore for many years, and the big fire of 1904, which caused a loss of \$125,000,000, caused no embarrassment to the city's financial institutions.

As a jobbing center, Baltimore ranks third among the cities of the United States. Its trade amounts to \$400,000,000 a year.

Baltimore has one of the best harbors in the country and has a 35-foot channel. Twenty foreign and domestic steamship lines have regular sailings from this port.

The percentage of persons owning their own homes is probably larger in Baltimore than in any other large city in the country.

Baltimore has the most noted markets in the country, well known for variety and excellence.

Baltimore is a center of learning. The Johns Hopkins University is the foremost institution in the United States devoted to research work. It is about to move to its new location, Homewood, on the outskirts of the city, and the State has just made an appropriation of \$600,000 and provided a maintenance fund of \$60,000 a year for a school of technology. Goucher is one of the leading colleges for girls in the country, while the private schools and the medical, dental and law schools of the city are famous. Its libraries are especially rich in works of reference.

The Walters art collection is one of the largest and finest in the United States.

AUSTIN LANE CROTHERS.

Born at Conowingo, Cecil county, 1860, Austin Lane Crothers was educated at the West Nottingham Academy. After some years of teaching he studied law at the University of Maryland, graduating in 1890. In 1897 he was elected State Senator, having previously served a term as State's Attorney and developed considerable oratorical power. In 1906 he was appointed Associate Judge of the Second Circuit, but voluntarily a year later returned to his law practice at Elkton. In 1907 he was elected Governor of Maryland and served his term with the hearty approbation of the public, whose interests he looked after sedulously. His chief work lay in the economic development of the State by the inauguration of a comprehensive system of good roads. Governor Crothers was eminently genial, practical, progressive and wise. He was a bachelor. His death occurred May 25, 1912, at Elkton from kidney trouble.

PARCELS POST ZONES, RATES AND INSURANCE.

Zones—Circles are conceived to be drawn around one's own postoffice, taken as the centre, eight circles in all, one outside the other. The area within the first circle is called the first zone; the area between the first circle and the second circle, the second zone, and so on. Any place within 50 miles is in the first zone; within 150 miles, in the 2d zone; within 300 miles, 3d zone; within 600 miles, 4th zone; within 1,000 miles, 5th zone; within 1,400 miles, 6th zone; within 1,800 miles, 7th zone. All places over 1,800 miles distant are in the 8th zone.

Postage must be prepaid with distinctive parcels post stamps and no others. Some kinds of farm produce and many other articles in common use, if packed as prescribed, can be sent at Parcels Post rates. But exceptions are numerous and the working of the system is complicated, so that it is advisable for the shipper to send a 75-cent money order to the Chief Clerk of P. O. Dept., Washington, D. C., for a map and copy of the Official Parcels Post Guide.

Rates—Parcels weighing 4 ounces or less, are mailable at a rate of 1 cent for each ounce, or fraction thereof, regardless of distance. Parcels, of not excessive size, weighing over 4 ounces and not over 11 pounds can be mailed at the pound rates shown in the following table, a fraction of a pound being rated as if a full pound:

An article, for example, mailed in Baltimore, for delivery in Baltimore, would go at the local rate; if for delivery outside Baltimore, but within the first zone, it would go at the first zone rate. Similarly, an article mailed on a rural route, for delivery on that route, would go at the local rate.

Insurance—A prepaid mailable parcel may be insured to an amount equal to its value (not exceeding \$50) on paying 10 cents in affixed parcels post stamps. This insurance takes the place of registration.

An official (C. H. H.) of the Baltimore Postoffice has devised the following compact table, with the help of which the cost of mailing any parcel to any distance can be quickly calculated:

NOTE—To ascertain the amount of postage required for zones 1 to 7 inclusive, multiply the first figure of the rate for the proper zone by the number of pounds and add the second figure. For the 8th zone multiply the rate by the number of pounds; the result will be the postage stated in cents. The fraction of a pound, if any, is to be rated as a pound, except that parcels weighing four ounces or less may be mailed for one cent an ounce or fraction of an ounce to any zone. In the expressions 1+4, 3+2, etc., for fixing rates, the first figure (1, 3, etc.) means so many cents.

BALTIMORE'S DEBT.

A statement from the City Hall, Oct. 13, 1912, figured so as to eliminate (as in New York) all but the face value of sinking funds made the City's debt 5.127 per cent. of the estimated 1913 assessable basis of \$741,909,312.

Figured according to the Baltimore plan of adding the value of water works, electrical conduits and docks and piers to the face value of the sinking fund, the net debt was 3.75 per cent. of the basis.

Both results show that Baltimore City stock falls well within the savings bank investment limit, as fixed in New York and Massachusetts. In New York savings banks are not permitted to invest in the bonds of municipalities whose net debt exceeds 10 per cent. of the taxable basis; in Massachusetts the limit is 7 per cent.

THE PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION OF 1912.

The election of 1912 compares in the importance of its results with the greatest political contests of American history. By reason of factional strife in the Republican party, Wilson, Democrat, won a plurality in many Republican States and in the Union at large, and obtained a great majority in the Electoral College. Owing to the same cause the Democrats augmented largely their majority in the House of Representatives and gained control of the Senate by a narrow margin. They elected an increased number of Governors.

Maryland gave Wilson a large plurality, sent a solid Democratic delegation to Congress and elected two Democratic judges. Baltimore gave Wilson a plurality. The city sanctioned the proposed conduit loan and voted down sewer rents and the bridge loan. For comparison of the Presidential vote of 1912, with that of previous years, see pages 126 and 80.

SCHRANK SHOTS ROOSEVELT.

At Milwaukee, October 14, John Schrank, of New York, (and formerly of Erding in Bavaria), shot ex-President Roosevelt for the alleged reason that the latter was endangering American freedom by seeking a third term. Mr. Roosevelt made a political speech of one and a quarter hours after being shot and then went to a hospital. He made a speedy recovery. The assassin was afterward adjudged insane.

LAND ACQUIRED FOR A PARK.

In 1912 Baltimore bought for \$35,755 the Westcott property on east side of Gwynns Falls, extending from the Frederick Road to a point north of Edmondson Avenue.

SHELL FISH COMMISSION.

The Board of Shell Fish Commissioners of Maryland consists of Benjamin K. Green, Westover, chairman; Frank S. Revell, Marley, treasurer; William H. Maltbie, Baltimore, secretary.

The duties of this Board are to survey the oyster grounds of the State, to preserve the natural oyster bars to the Public Fishery and to endeavor to lease the bottoms outside the natural oyster bars to residents of the State for oyster culture.

The field work of the survey of the oyster grounds was begun June 29th, 1906, and was completed November 28, 1910. The complete results of the survey, published in February, 1912, are for distribution at the office of the Commission, 311-312 Marine Bank Building, Baltimore.

The Haman Oyster Culture Law, as passed in 1906, was a perfect instrument for making the survey of the natural oyster beds, but its provisions for oyster culture operations were inadequate. The law as amended and re-enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland in 1912 now makes Oyster Culture possible. The planter feels more encouraged since the removal of some of the narrow restrictions. The section which permits him to scrape his plants, although by antiquated methods, and those referring to the reduction of rentals and increased area, have awakened a new interest in Oyster Culture. Since April, 1912, about 3,000 acres have been surveyed and leased, and some 6,500 applied for; the latter area will be marked off in the spring of 1913. More than 2,000 acres of this area call for the bottoms beneath the open bay, where each citizen of Maryland is permitted to lease from 5 to 500 acres, and it is here that the State offers some of the best bottoms for oyster farming in the world.

SEXES IN THE UNITED STATES.

There are in the United States 2,692,288 more males than females. In Maryland there are 644,223 males and 651,121 females, or 6,896 more females than males. In Virginia 1,035,348 males, 1,026,264 females. In West Virginia 644,044 males, 577,075 females. Baltimore had in the Census year 92 males to every 100 females. In England there are 93 males to every 100 females. In the United States females outnumber males, only in Massachusetts, Rhode Island, North Carolina and South Carolina.

POSTOFFICE BUSINESS, BALTIMORE, 1912.

Receipts from the sale of stamps, stamped envelopes, postal cards, wrappers, etc., for the year ending December 31, 1912, were \$2,440,172.91, an increase of \$81,224.47.

There were issued 178,074 domestic money orders, representing \$1,724,247.63; 24,378 international money orders representing \$375,866.48. There were paid 350,209 domestic money orders, representing \$2,892,887.31, and 2,859 international money orders representing \$72,899.06.

The number of registered pieces handled was 1,096,360, an increase for 1912 of 33,167 pieces.

The number of pieces of mail matter received for local delivery was 157,206,969, an increase over 1911 of 2,939,365 pieces. This matter was distributed thus: Carrier department, 142,845,308; box department, 11,103,539; general delivery, 2,145,303; special delivery, 250,126; inquiry division, 862,693.

The number of pieces of mail matter received for dispatch to out-of-town points was 186,492,569, against 187,141,022 in 1911. This mail weighed 12,772,086 pounds and was divided into first-class, 144,779,840; special delivery, 176,009; second, third and fourth-class matter, 41,536,720.

There was a grand total of 343,699,538 pieces of mail handled during 1912, an increase of 2,290,912 pieces over 1911.

BALTIMORE THINGS.

These things occurred in Baltimore:

- 1776—General Washington was invested with dictatorial powers.
 - 1784—First balloon ascension in the United States.
 - 1784—First Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States organized.
 - 1784—First city in United States to print calico, weave silk and refine sugar.
 - 1788—First glass works established.
 - 1790—Rev. John Carroll consecrated the first Catholic Bishop of the United States.
 - 1794—Fort McHenry, first United States fort, erected.
 - 1795—First marine insurance companies established.
 - 1810—First metallic writing pens made in the United States manufactured in Baltimore.
 - 1815—Cornerstone of the first monument erected to the memory of George Washington was laid.
 - 1816—First gaslight company in the United States was organized, and Baltimore was the first city to adopt illuminating gas for street lamps.
 - 1819—First Lodge of Odd Fellows in the United States organized by Thomas Wildey.
 - 1827—First railroad in the United States, the Baltimore and Ohio, was chartered in 1827. The cornerstone was laid July 4, 1828, by Charles Carroll, the last survivor of the signers of the Declaration of Independence.
 - 1828—Ross Winans invented the "outside bearings" for railroad carriages.
 - 1828—First American patent for locomotive granted to William Howard, of Baltimore.
 - 1829—The first silk ribbon made from American silk made in Baltimore.
 - 1830—Peter Cooper made first trip in steam car from Baltimore to Ellicott City, a distance of 13 miles, in 57 minutes.
 - 1838—First regular steam vessel to cross the Atlantic direct from the United States steamed from Baltimore—packet "City of Kingston," Captain Crame.
 - 1837 and 1838—First wholly iron steamboats built in Baltimore.
 - 1839—First College of Dental Surgery in the world established in Baltimore.
 - 1844—First telegraph line established by Professor Morse, between Washington and Baltimore. First experiment made April 9.
 - 1846—First Presidential message transmitted by telegraph to the Baltimore Sun.
 - 1851—First iron building in the country—The Baltimore Sun Building.
 - 1853—The first Hoe revolving cylinder press in the United States, introduced in The Sun office.
 - 1859—On July 21 the first horse car in Baltimore was run from the foot of Broadway to the corner of Baltimore street and Broadway, and three days later three cars were run to Baltimore and South streets.
 - 1861—The first blood of the Civil War was shed in Baltimore.
 - 1862—Armor plate for the first monitor was rolled in Baltimore.
 - 1867—Order of Knights of Pythias established in Baltimore.
 - 1885—First electric railroad was operated in America for actual commercial service. This was the suburban railway between Baltimore and the village of Hampden. The third-rail system was used, from which the current was taken by a sliding arm. It will be noted that both the third rail and the overhead trolley systems were suggested by Baltimore experiments. In fact, it may be claimed that both of these systems were first put in practice here.
 - 1895—The first electric locomotives were put in use on the Baltimore and Ohio railroad.
 - 1903—The largest floating drydock in the world was built by the Maryland Steel Company, Sparrows Point.
- Baltimore is building the finest sanitary sewerage system in the world; it will cost \$20,000,000.
- Baltimore is engaged in a general paving plan for the entire city. The street mileage is 430.6 miles.
- The area within the city limits is 31 2-3 miles.
- The heart of Baltimore was burned out on February 7-8, 1904, the destroyed area covering more than 150 acres. The loss was approximately \$125,000,000.
- It has rebuilt itself through its own efforts, all outside aid having been declined. The city had just sold its interest in the Western Maryland Railway for \$8,751,000, and over \$4,500,000 was immediately expended for public improvements and the rehabilitation of the burned area. Streets were widened and grades reduced.
- The establishment of a system of public docks, owned by the municipality and costing \$6,000,000, was one of the results of the fire. A new loan of \$5,000,000 for the extension of the system has been provided.
- There are within the city limits more than 2,500 manufacturing industries, comprising 123 specific industries, employing approximately 90,000 wage-earners,

who are paid annually approximately \$43,000,000. The annual value of their output is about \$200,000,000.

Immediately beyond the city limits, but virtually part of the city, there are many other industries. The industrial district, 15 miles square, contiguous to and including Baltimore, produces manufactured products to the value of \$265,000,000, annually. This makes Baltimore one of the foremost industrial centres of the United States.

***EXPENDITURES OF THE U. S. GOVERNMENT.**

December 2, 1912, the Secretary of the Treasury asked Congress to appropriate \$823,415,455 for the year beginning July 1, 1913, this sum including rivers and harbors. The increase over 1912 is \$87,680,000. The several departments are thought to need:

Of the appropriations sought Baltimore and Maryland have a direct interest in \$3,165,214. Nearly \$2,000,000 is asked for improvements and extension of the chain of inland waterways from the Chesapeake Bay to Beaufort Inlet and the construction of a harbor of refuge at Point Lookout, N. C. For the Naval Academy operating expenses and contemplated improvements \$877,124 is requested; for public buildings and postoffices for Eastern Shore towns, \$50,000; for improving Eastern Shore rivers, also the Susquehanna and Potomac, \$256,240, and for improvements at Marine Hospital, at Baltimore, revenue cutter station, at Baltimore, and other things, \$72,850.

The Postmaster-General estimates that \$281,791,508 will be necessary to conduct his department for the year.

As much as \$6,814,000 is asked for postoffice building additions and improvements.

The sum requested for rivers and harbors is \$57,000,000. These last items bring the grand total asked for up to \$1,105,206,903.

CONFLICTING FIGURES OF PRESIDENTIAL VOTES.

Our electoral college system of electing presidents makes it optional with supervisors of elections and canvassing boards to announce many different figures as "the vote" for President in any given State. The prevalent custom is to take (for publication) the vote for the elector who receives the largest number of votes as "the vote" for the presidential candidate represented by that elector and the elector who receives "the highest vote" is (owing to the illiterate voter) commonly, but not always, the first man in the list of electors. In Maryland, for example, the Annapolis canvassers took in 1912 the first elector on the list and announced the sum of the votes for the first on the eight lists as the State's vote for Wilson, Taft, Roosevelt, etc. But the first elector on the list does not uniformly get the highest vote and the Almanac's correspondents in the counties, taking the vote for the man actually highest, often report as "official" a total vote different from that reported from Annapolis as official. Roosevelt, for instance, got more votes for electors other than the first on his list (Hill) in eight counties—Allegany, Anne Arundel, Calvert, Dorchester, Kent, St. Mary's, Somerset and Talbot. Wilson, in Anne Arundel, Prince George's and Worcester, got more votes for Sisk, Lee and Baughman than for Truitt, the first on his list. Taft's highest vote in Worcester was not cast for Lancaster, the first on his list, but for Kemp. The "official vote" for President depends accordingly on the views of canvassers as to the name of the elector the vote for whom is to be reported. Where, as in Maryland in 1912, the votes for the several lists of electors were wide apart, it made little difference which elector's vote was reported "officially," but in 1908, when the vote was close, each democratic elector's vote had to be compared carefully with each republican elector's vote and two republican electors were chosen along with six democrats. Sometimes the highest elector is reported, regardless of his place in the list; sometimes the average of votes; sometimes the lowest elector. Want of space and time, of course, prevents commonly giving the votes for the whole lists of electors.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF BALTIMORE.

The total net enrollment, June 30, 1912, was 63,323, of which number 58,932 were in elementary schools, 4,197 in secondary schools, 194 in normal schools; boys in elementary schools 33,332, girls 33,747; secondary, boys 2,158, girls 2,616; normal, boys 12, girls 240. In the white schools were 53,377 pupils of all classes, 30,501 boys, 30,255 girls. Grades 1 to 8 numbered 48,509 white pupils, 27,644 boys and 27,313 girls. In white kindergartens were 859 pupils; in ungraded classes 246; in parental school 42. There were in the Teachers' Training School 121 pupils, City College 791. Polytechnic 881, Eastern High School 812, Western High School 1,116. The total enrollment of colored schools was 9,946, including Colored Training School 73; Colored High School 597; grades 1 to 8 elementary 9,054; kindergartens 175; ungraded 47.

Teachers in normal schools 10; secondary 182; elementary 1,566, besides manual training 16, physical training 2, sewing 30, drawing 8, supervisors 11, superintendent 1, assistant superintendent 6; grand total teachers 1,849. The number of buildings in use was 156; elementary schools 143; secondary 13. The teachers in elementary schools were—men 99, women 1,467. Average attendance, all schools, 55,496. The increase of attendance in all schools in 1912 was 671; in elementary schools 590, secondary 110. In normal school there was a decrease of 29.

Night schools increased in year, teachers 37; average attendance 458. Total average attendance 2,177. Current expenses of all schools, 1911-1912, \$1,787,846; buildings and equipment \$37,368. Amount available \$2,637,577. Salaries, day schools, \$1,524,057; night schools, \$20,561.

BALTIMORE'S NEW TRUNK LINE.

A new trunk line connecting Baltimore and the Atlantic Seaboard with Pittsburgh and the West was inaugurated July 31, 1912, when the first freight train left Cumberland for Connellsville and climbed big Savage mountains on the new Western Maryland extension. The new line between Baltimore and Pittsburgh is 317 miles long, comparing with the 327 of the B. & O., and 329 of the Pennsylvania. The grade is 42 feet to the mile, compared with the B. & O.'s 62 and the Pennsylvania's 79.

WOODROW WILSON.

The second Democratic President since the Civil War was born Dec. 28, 1856, at Staunton, Va. In 1873 he entered Davidson College, North Carolina, and in 1875 Princeton, where he remained till 1879. In 1880 he took law at the University of Virginia; later he took a post-graduate course at Johns Hopkins University. In 1888 he was teaching Political Economy at Wesleyan University. In 1900 he was Professor of Jurisprudence and Politics at Princeton, of which institution he became President in 1902. Meanwhile he had written a number of books of recognized merit. In 1910 New Jersey elected him Governor. In this position he exhibited so much intelligence and practical executive ability in the line of reform that in November, 1912, he was chosen by the National Democracy to administer affairs at Washington.

At Villacoublay, France, September 17, Georges Legagneux, aviator, rose in 45 minutes to a height of 18,766 feet, or over $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles—a new record. He descended in 10 minutes. Oxygen was inhaled after ascending 15,748 feet. The previous record (Gavvos, September 6) was 16,240 feet.

At Chicago, Sept. 9, Jules Vedrines in a Deperdussin monoplane, against two French competitors, won the world's aviation championship, J. G. Bennett silver trophy and 12,000 francs, no American competing. Vedrines did 124.8 miles over a 4.14-mile course in 1h., 10 m., 56.85s. Speed average, 105.5 miles an hour.

At Annapolis, Aug. 22, Lieut. Theodore G. Emyson, of Richmond, Va., senior officer at the Naval Aviation School, made a new record for machines of the hydro-aeroplane type by rising to a height of 3,200 feet on a Curtiss machine.

OVER-SEA AVIATION.

On Dec. 18, Roland G. Garros, a Frenchman, flew from Tunis to Trepani in Sicily, 160 miles, a new record.

AUTO RACING.

In the Grand Prix race, in a Fiat, Bragg won over 8-mile course of 52 laps, De Palma being thrown from his car and breaking a leg.

At Elgin, Ill., Aug. 27, Teddy Tetzlaff, in a Fiat, did the 8½-mile track in 6 minutes, 55²³/₁₀₀ seconds, 72.2 miles an hour, breaking all local racing and track records. On the 29th, Tetzlaff, in a 120-h. p. Fiat, did the 8½-mile course at average speed of 76 miles an hour, breaking Ralph Mulford's record by 26 seconds. Bergdoll, in a Benz, averaged 73 miles.

Aug. 30, at Elgin, Ill., Charles Merz won the 203-mile Illinois trophy race over the 8½-mile road course in 3h., 4m., 32s., a record.

Hughie Hughes, in a Mercer, won the Aurora trophy, 152 miles, in 2h., 20m., 40s. Speed average 65.05 miles. The fastest lap was that of Hastings, 7m., 22s.

At Columbus, Ohio, Aug. 26, Spencer Wishart, in a Mercer, did 200 miles on a dirt track in 3h., 28m., 4½s., a new record. He won over ten starters. Wishart made 100 miles in 100 minutes, 51 seconds, against world record of 1 hour, 41 minutes, 2-5 seconds.

At Wanawata Race Course, Wis., Oct. 2, Ralph de Palma, with a Mercedes Car, won the Classic Vanderbilt Cup race, doing 299 miles, 2,764 feet in 4 hours, 20 minutes, 31.54 seconds. Tetzlaff did 7.88 miles in 6 minutes, 16 seconds.

At Santa Monica, Cal., May 4, Teddy Tetzlaff, of Los Angeles, in a 90-h. p. Fiat, won the 303-mile free-for-all, with average speed of 78½ miles an hour, breaking the record of 74.63. In the Medium Car event Ralph de Palma, in a Mercer, did 69.54 miles an hour for 151 miles, making a record, and in the light car event Joerman, in a Maxwell, placed the 101-mile record for small cars at 61.86 miles an hour.

AMERICAN AUTO CHAMPION.

Ralph De Palma in 1912 won the first place in auto road-racing. In five starts he scored first place in four: The Light Car race at Santa Monica; Elgin National Trophy race; Elgin free-for-all and the Vanderbilt Cup. Only a collision with Bragg, it seems, in the last lap prevented his getting the Grand Prix at Milwaukee. Teddy Tetzlaff came next, winning the Santa Monica free-for-all, Tacoma free-for-all and the Tacoma heavy race.

At the Los Angeles motordrome De Palma broke world records for from 1 to 20 miles in the 300-inch class and won other events there and in the 500-mile race at Indianapolis. At the latter place he began breaking speedway records at the 50-mile mark and kept it up to the 475th mile. Dawson, however, won there, owing to De Palma's piston rod breaking on the last lap. Till then he averaged over 81 miles an hour. In the Elgin, Vanderbilt, Grand Prix and Indianapolis races he used a Mercedes; at Santa Monica a 300-cu. inch Mercer.

In London, April 26, Steve Shipley, of New York, won the international mile event and the London Championship by doing the mile in 2m. 56½s., beating A. R. Ellington, world's record-holder, and other champions.

At the Maryland Swimming Club, September 14, Jack McHenry, of the Baltimore Athletic Club, did 220 yards in 2 minutes 46 2-5 seconds, making a record. Hutchinson, of the Washington Grove Athletic Association, won the mile swim in 38 minutes 5 1-5 seconds. Gibson, of the same association, won the 880-yard swim in 18 minutes 10 3-5 seconds, a record. Catling, of the Y. M. C. A., won the 440 swim in 8 minutes 55 seconds, a record. HUBERT LATHAM.

Hubert Latham, age 29, June 7, was killed while hunting on the Chari River in the French Congo, near Lake Tchad, by a buffalo, which he had wounded. He was a distinguished aviator, whose flight over Baltimore, November 1910, for a prize of \$5,000 offered by the Sun, is in the memory of a Baltimoreans.

THE WAR IN THE BALKANS.

Montenegro, Serbia, Bulgaria and Greece, seeking to despoil Turkey of the province of Macedonia, in October, invaded Turkey, alleging Turkish outrage and misgovernment. On October 17 Turkey declared war, after Montenegro (October 10) and the other states had either attacked her or were evidently about to do so. The Great Powers sought to avert the war, but the Balkan States refused to be advised. Rumania abstained from participation. In December a Conference of the Powers concerned met in London.

ITALO-TURKISH WAR.

In view of the impending war with Montenegro, Serbia, Bulgaria and Greece, Turkey, October 18, at Ouchy, Switzerland, signed the protocol of treaty of peace conceding to Italy the absolute possession of Tripoli, the ending a contest which began September 29, 1911, when Italy declared war. Turkey's lack of a strong fleet made her unable to reinforce her army Tripoli. Italy is to pay Turkey \$400,000 yearly, concede the Kalifa's religious authority in Tripoli and restore the captured islands.

The Districts of Annapolis and Crisfield are now operated under the supervision of the Baltimore office and it is of interest to state that there are documented at Crisfield 683 vessels and at Annapolis 204; these together with the 1,016 vessels documented at Baltimore make a total of 1,903 documented vessels. In addition to these, there are estimated to be about 4,000 motor boats and 2,000 sail boats of under 5 tons, and which do not require documents. They are, however, subject to the navigation laws and there are therefore now operating under the charge of this district approximately 8,000 vessels, from the small oyster tonger to the large ocean liner.

Compared with other ports of the United States, as respects number of vessels and marine matters, Baltimore, including Crisfield and Annapolis now under Baltimore supervision, is now second as a marine port to New York only.

Baltimore's shipyards have been busy and trade has had a very active year with bright prospects for continued activity. The tonnage built was 30,174 tons, an increase over 1911 of 4,708 tons.

POLITICAL TOTEMS.

Tammany was pictured by Tom Nast, a Bavarian, as a tiger, because Boss Tweed was a member of a Fire Company—the Big Six—which used a tiger's head as an emblem.

In 1870 Nast pictured the critics of Stanton, Secretary of War, as a jackass, and two years later used the donkey to represent the Democratic Party.

In 1874 Nast in a cartoon represented the Republican Party as an elephant attacked by an ass (the New York Herald) in a lion's skin, the Democracy being a fox with S. J. Tilden's features. He labeled the elephant G. O. P.

In 1912 ex-President Roosevelt having announced on some political occasion that he "felt as fit as a bull moose," popular fancy labeled the head of the Progressive ticket "Bull Moose" and his followers "Bull Meese."

In the 10 months ended with October, 1912, the foreign trade of the United States, exports and imports combined, reached an unprecedented total and led to official predictions, that at the end of December the figure given above would be attained or exceeded. Imports have doubled since 1901 and exports since 1904. In the 10 months imports were \$1,511,000,000; exports \$1,871,000,000; non-dutiable imports have increased most—from \$409,000,000 in 1902 to about \$975,000,000 at the end of 1912. Trade with Canada and Latin-America has increased at the highest rate.

BALTIMORE SHIPBUILDING IN 1912.

Baltimore shipyards turned out in 1912 vessels valued at \$4,010,800, and begin the new year with contracts amounting to \$4,850,000. In 1911 the shipbuilding total was \$1,887,294, when 49 vessels were built, aggregating 24,102 tons, while in 1912 the 59 vessels launched represented 51,000 tons. Many vessels built and launched during the year did not come under the documented law, but largely swelled the total.

The Maryland Steel Company built the United States steel naval colliers Orion and Saturn, each 10,650 tons gross; steel passenger and freight steamers Minnesota and Dakotan for the American-Hawaiian Steamship Company, each 6,655 tons, and the steel side-wheel passenger and freight steamers Dorchester and Talbot, each 1,090 tons, for the Baltimore, Chesapeake and Atlantic Railway Company.

The Skinner Shipbuilding and Drydock Company launched the steel tug Comet, for the Hartford and New York Transportation Company; steel power oil barge Radium, for the Gulf Refining Company, of Port Arthur, Texas; two wooden car floats for the Western Maryland Railway Company; two covered lighters for the Chesapeake Lightering and Towing Company; two fish lighters for Havre de Grace, and one derrick lighter for stock.

William E. Woodall & Co. built the fishing steamer Mary B. Garner for the Coan River Guano Company, of Virginia; one six-pocket scow for the Maryland Dredging and Contracting Company; two 86-foot covered lighters for the Chesapeake Steamship Company, and one 86-foot covered lighter for stock.

Charles L. Rohde & Sons Company built one covered 65-foot lighter for F. S. Royster Guano Company; three 86-foot covered lighters for Chesapeake Lightering and Towing Company; four open 40-foot lighters for Henry Steers, Philadelphia; 12 open 40-foot lighters, two open 72-foot lighters and two 52-foot pile drivers for Brann & Stuart Company, of Philadelphia; one open 85-foot lighter for the Baker-Whiteley Coal Company; three open 80-foot lighters for the Arundel Sand and Gravel Company; three covered 80-foot lighters for the Atlantic Transport Company; one 25-foot derrick lighter for the Ellicott Machine Company; one 85-foot covered lighter for the Alexandria (Va.) Fertilizer Company; one open 93-foot lighter for M. V. B. Oliver, Norfolk, and one 50-foot power boat for R. J. Taylor.

Oliver Reeder & Sons turned out one 85-foot covered lighter for the Baltimore Steam Packet Company; one 85-foot covered lighter for the Atlantic Transport Company, and one open 92-foot lighter for Hastings Bros., Norfolk.

The Furst Concrete Scow Construction Company built one 110-foot concrete scow.

The year 1913 opened with prospect of two years' work at the Maryland Steel Company's plant. It had in hand six 6,655-ton steamships for the American-Hawaiian Steamship Company, whose names in order are to be Montanan, Pennsylvania, Panamanian, Ohioan, Iowan and Washingtonian. They are also to build the turbine steamers City of Annapolis and City of Richmond for the Ches-

peake Steamship Company for the York river route to Richmond. The approximate value of these vessels when completed will be \$4,850,000.

A large steel tug for the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railway and two large wooden car floats for the Pennsylvania Railroad Company start the new year at the yards of the Skinner Shipbuilding and Drydock Company.

William E. Woodall & Co. have in hand an 86-foot covered lighter for the Chesapeake Steamship Company.

Oliver Reeder & Sons have started on an open 92-foot lighter for the Empire Coal Company.

BERNARD CARTER.

Mr. Carter's death, at Narragansett Pier, June 10, deprived the Baltimore Bar of a leader whose eminence had been well established for a quarter of a century. He was counsel for the Northern Central and Pennsylvania Railways and of the Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Company and an excellent trial lawyer. Corporation law was his specialty. He was a member of the Constitutional Convention of 1867. He was prominent in 1882 in the reform movement of that day, being a strong campaign speaker. From 1883 to 1889 he was City Solicitor. His interest in church matters was marked. Large of body and of imposing presence, he was characterized also by massive intellectual strength, together with learning and courtesy of manner. Born July 20, 1834, he was descended from "King" Carter and Harry Lee, of Virginia, and from Charles, the sixth Lord Baltimore.

GOLD AND SILVER PRODUCTION IN 1912.

The world's production of gold was \$465,000,000, or \$5,500,000 more than in 1911. The Transvaal and Rhodesia increased their production by \$20,000,000, while the United States, Mexico and Australia together lost some \$16,000,000. Other countries produced about as in 1911. The production of the United States was \$91,685,168, against \$96,890,000 in 1911. California produced \$19,988,486; Colorado, \$18,791,710; Alaska, \$17,398,946; Nevada, \$13,331,680; South Dakota, \$7,795,680. Canada increased her production by \$3,000,000. The consumption of gold in this country and Canada was about \$38,000,000; in the world, excluding Asia, about \$107,000,000. India in 1912 absorbed \$140,000,000 of gold, besides very large quantities of silver. About \$90,000,000 was added to the gold currency of the United States; the treasury gained \$70,000,000. The United States produced in 1912 of silver 62,369,974 fine ounces, Nevada leading with 13,042,118 ounces, Utah second with 12,795,072 ounces, Montana third with 12,338,589 ounces. Colorado produced 8,350,316; Idaho 7,703,721,

PORT OF BALTIMORE BUSINESS, 1912.

The total collections for the year were \$4,562,876.11, against \$4,265,025.49 in 1911. The cost of collection was \$307,039.68, against \$305,683.38 for 1911. Number of employees, 204, against 208 in 1911. The cost of collecting \$100 was .0673, as compared with .0717 in 1911.

There were built in the district of Baltimore, which embraces Crisfield and Annapolis, 27 vessels—5 sailing, 16 steam, 2 barges and 4 yachts, with a total tonnage of 30,179 and valued at \$3,292,000.

The number of vessels documented at this port is 1,018, with tonnage of 241,347. The number of marine disasters reported was 90, and the value of the property lost was \$691,003, of which \$433,700 was on the vessel property and \$257,303 on cargo. The reports covered the loss of 19 lives. The total value of free articles imported here during the last year was \$12,426,571.

CROSS-COUNTRY RUN.

On December 6, Johnny Gallagher, of Georgetown University, did the 8½ miles of the old millrace course near Walbrook in 54 minutes, 52½ seconds, winning the South Atlantic event.

ROLLER RACE.

Dec. 21, Steve Shipley, the amateur roller-skating champion of the world, easily won the six-hour race, Baltimore, at the North Avenue Casino, breaking the world's best record, established in 1890 by E. N. Ridgely, a Marylander, who skated under the name of Delmar, in London. In the six nights Shipley did 1,288 laps, or 92 miles. Previous record 87 miles and 5 laps. One night Shipley made 221 laps.

LIQUORS AND WINES.

There were produced in the United States in 1911 of whiskey, 100,647,155 gallons; rum, 2,631,059 gallons; gin, 3,345,371 gallons; alcohol, 24,408,162 gallons; of fermented liquors, 63,283,123 gallons; fruit brandy, 7,953,132 gallons. The consumption of malt liquors was 1,966,911,744 gallons; wines, 63,859,282; alcohol, 138,585,989.

CROPS IN 1912.

Crops were abundant, enriching farmers and giving improved revenues to railways. They were better than in 1911, when the United States produced 2,531,488,000 bushels of corn; 621,338,000 of wheat; 922,298,000 of oats; 160,240,000 of barley; 33,119,000 of rye; 17,549,000 of buckwheat. The cotton crop of 1911-12 was reported at 16,043,000 bales; of wool, 318,547,900 pounds were produced.

The Department of Agriculture reported for Nov. 1, 1912, corn crop of 3,169,137,000 bushels, or 281,921,000 more than ever before. The year's farm crop value was \$4,171,134,000, for corn, hay, wheat, oats, potatoes, barley, flaxseed, rye and buckwheat. With the value of the growing cotton crop and the crops of tobacco, rice and apples the aggregate value of these principal farm products will mount well beyond \$5,000,000,000. The proportions: Corn, \$1,850,776,000; hay, \$854,615,000; wheat, \$603,639,000; oats, \$476,169,000; potatoes, \$188,501,000; barley, \$120,845,000; flaxseed, \$39,693,000; rye, \$24,370,000, and buckwheat, \$12,526,000.

CUSTOMS AND INTERNAL REVENUE, 1912.

The total receipts from internal taxes were \$321,612,200; from customs, \$311,321,672; from other sources, \$58,844,593. The internal tax receipts were from spirits, \$156,391,487; tobacco, \$70,590,151; fermented liquors, \$63,268,770; miscellaneous, \$30,067,365. Maryland paid internal tax, \$7,866,725; Virginia, \$8,355,561; Delaware, \$528,582.

RAILWAYS, UNITED STATES, 1912.

The mileage was 244,089, against 242,885 in 1911; 201,672 in 1902. Side track and sidings were 114,940 miles; locomotives, 65,310; passenger cars, 40,430; baggage cars, 13,477; freight, 2,354,682. Capital stock, \$8,582,463,260; bonded debt, \$10,989,608,551; unfunded debt, \$418,122,751; current accounts, \$1,139,377,126; sinking and other funds, \$230,573,472; grand total of liabilities, \$21,360,145,156. The cost of railroad and equipment was \$15,872,462,792; the excess of assets over liabilities, \$1,155,829,936. The gross earnings in 1912 were \$2,848,468,965; net, \$903,219,137. Interest on bonds, \$377,973,479; dividends paid, \$316,402,684. There were in 1911, 8.21 miles of line to each 100 square miles, and 26.10 miles of line to each 10,000 of population.

LANGUAGES OF THE WORLD.

There are said to be over 3,100 spoken languages or dialects, of which some 250 are in America, 500 in Europe, 900 in Asia and 1,500 in America. English is spoken by 150,000,000 persons; German by 120,000,000; Russian by 90,000,000; French by 60,000,000; Spanish by 55,000,000; Italian by 40,000,000; Portuguese by 30,000,000. Of 100,000 English words most in use some 60,000 are of Teutonic origin, 30,000 from Latin or Greek and 10,000 from other foreign sources.

COMMUTATION TICKETS.

On and after Feb. 1, 1913, on street railways radiating from Baltimore the fare to a point outside the city in the first zone is 3½ cts.; in the 2d and 3d zones 4 cts. each, provided commutation ticket books for 26 round trips are bought. To Pikesville book of 26 round trips costs \$4.42; Ellicott City \$6.50.

PANAMA CANAL.

At the present rate of progress the digging of the Canal will have been completed by September, 1913. The dams, etc., are from 80 to 90 per cent. completed. The total cost is estimated at about \$375,000,000. The official date of opening is Jan. 1, 1915, but it is thought that the first vessel will pass through October 15, 1913. In the spring of 1912 as many as 45,000 employes at work. Baltimore's distance to San Francisco will be shortened by the Canal by some 8,000 miles.

MARYLAND LUMBER OUTPUT.

The output in 1911 was 144,087,000 feet, against 154,534,000 in 1910. The record was made in 1909 with 267,939,000 feet.

NATIONAL BANK BUSINESS, 1912.

Reports from national banks to the Comptroller of the Currency in response to the call of November 26 show growth of banking during the year. The record:

Loans, \$6,058,982,029, a gain over September 4, 1912, of \$18,140,758. and over December 5, 1911, of \$399,872,202.

Cash, \$859,098,737, a decrease since September 4 of \$36,852,356, and since December 5, 1911, of \$3,695,450.

Deposits, \$5,944,561,069, a gain over September 4 of \$52,891,062, and over December 5, 1911, of \$408,578,788.

SOME BALTIMORE INDUSTRIES, 1912.

The volume of the City's clothing manufacture was \$30,000,000, a gain of 10 per cent. over 1911. Exports in this line go largely to Canada and Mexico. The straw hat trade was 20 per cent. better than in 1911 and new manufacturing facilities are being provided. In canned goods the year's pack of fruits and vegetables was above the average. Profits were exceptionally good.

WHEN TURKEY WAS STRONGEST.

In October, 1529, Suleiman, "the Magnificent," besieged Vienna for three weeks without success. In 1544 the greater part of Hungary was a Turkish province. September 5, 1566, the Ottoman power had reached its zenith. The Sultan's power extended from the frontier of Germany to Persia. The Black Sea was a Turkish lake. Egypt, Tripoli, Tunis and Morocco were the Sultan's. On October 7, 1571, John of Austria, at Lepanto, broke the Turkish power at sea. The period of conquest ended in 1606 with the treaty with Austria of that year. The King of Poland, John Sabieski, in 1683, drove a vast Turkish army from Vienna and ended Turkish prestige. The power of offense in Europe ceased with the treaty of peace made in 1700.

"GENERAL" BOOTH.

One of the most remarkable men of the period was Rev. William Booth, of the English Methodist Church, who, in 1877, organized the Salvation Army, with the idea of popularizing religion among the irreligious poor by an appeal which they could understand. His wife and eight children went with him in his work. At present his 8,800 "armies" flourish in 54 countries throughout the world, everywhere commanding confidence in the integrity and good heart of the movement. Next to the Pope, the General, at his death, August 21, near London, in his eighty-third year, was the most eminent and potent religious leader in the world. In his will he appointed to succeed him, as commander-in-chief, William Bramwell Booth, his son, acting chief since 1880.

MAJOR W. STUART SYMINGTON.

Major Symington rode as aide with Pickett in his famous charge at Gettysburg, ending his military career only at Appomattox, and all through his subsequent life was a gallant, chivalrous representative of the old type of Maryland gentlemen. To his friends he was a constant pleasure and his death, June 9, at the age of 73, was felt to be a loss to the great city which appreciated his fine civic qualities.

PANAMA CANAL TOLLS.

By proclamation, Nov. 13, President Taft fixed the tolls to be paid by foreign ships traversing the Panama Canal. For merchant vessels \$1.20 per ton of carrying capacity, less 40 per cent. if in ballast. Passenger vessels, same rate per earning capacity. Naval vessels, proper, 50 cents per displacement tonnage. Army and Navy transports, &c., \$1.20 per net ton. American coast-wise shipping will pay nothing—a discrimination against which England protests as in violation of a treaty.

The rates fixed will equal those of the Suez Canal with which the Panama Canal is expected to compete in the trade of Europe with the West Coast of South America and New Zealand, but not the Far East generally. Its revenues are expected to sustain it after 20 years. Fixed charges and a 1 per cent. sinking fund will be provided out of net earnings. The foreign traffic expected in the first two years is 9,000,000 tons; 11,000,000 tons in 1920 and 14,000,000 in 1925. Some experts are less sanguine.

THE UNION-SOUTHERN PACIFIC MERGER.

The Supreme Court decided December 2, that the Union Pacific Railroad's purchase, under the late President Harriman's auspices, of 46 per cent. of the stock of the Southern Pacific Railroad is in violation of the Sherman Anti-Trust Act, because it virtually gives the former control of the latter railroad and suppresses competition between them. A separation of the corporations is to be effected in 3 months. The Union Pacific will be permitted to acquire the Central Pacific, which is part of its through line to the Pacific Coast.

"WORLD IN BALTIMORE."

A religious undertaking, consisting of two main features, "Pageant of Darkness and Light" and an "Exposition," designed to interest the public in Christian Missions. It was inaugurated at the Lyric, October 25, to continue till November 30, but was extended in part to December 6. It embraced exhibits, pageants, plays; music &c., and was largely attended. The first "World" was in a small English village and cost \$400. Others followed in Manchester, London (cost \$150,000), and various American cities.

THE EUCHARISTIC CONGRESS.

The 23d Eucharistic Congress at Vienna, September 10-15, was an ecclesiastical celebration attended by some 120,000 persons from many foreign countries. The Congress was held under the protection and favor of the aged Emperor Francis Joseph.

COST OF ELECTIONS.

Elections cost enormous sums. The Presidential preconvention and pre-election expenses of the Taft, Wilson and Roosevelt candidacies to October 26, were \$3,152,042. This does not include Prohibitionist, Socialist and other party expenses, or contributions made, after October 26.

MARYLAND'S NEW SENATOR.

On November 29, Governor Goldsborough appointed Wm. Purnell Jackson, of Wilcomico County, United States Senator from Maryland, to succeed the Hon. Isidor Rayner, who died in Washington City, November 25. The new Senator holds office till the election of a Senator by the Legislature, which will meet in regular session on the first Wednesday of January, 1914. The Democratic strength in the United States Senate was lessened by this appointment, but restored by Senator Heyburn's death, making the Senate stand Republicans 51, Democrats 44, vacancy 1 (Colorado). In an extra session of the next Congress, the margin will be narrowed to 1 or 2 votes, with the Democrats possessing a majority.

SENATOR RAYNER.

Born April 11, 1850, educated at the University of Virginia and the Maryland University, Isidor Rayner, in virtue of his intellectual vigor, acquaintance with matters of State, eloquence and probity, attained a distinguished position before the public, and at his death, from neuritis, November 25, in Washington, was among the most influential members of the Senate of the United States. He served in the Maryland House (1878), Senate (1886), Congress (1886), as Attorney-General of Maryland (1889-1903). United States Senate (1905-12). As counsel for Rear-Admiral Schley before the Naval Court of Inquiry, in the Schley-Sampson controversy, he showed distinguished ability.

SAVINGS BANKS, 1912.

At the end of June, 1912, Maryland had 51 savings banks, according to the Comptroller of the Currency, with \$103,679,890 of deposits, 269,311 depositors an average deposit of \$385. The State ranks twelfth. In the entire Union were 1,922 savings banks, with 10,010,304 depositors, \$445 per depositor and \$4,451,818,522 of deposits.

Virginia had 20 savings banks, 31,213 depositors, \$304 per depositor and \$9,484,507 of deposits; West Virginia 8 banks, 31,065 depositors, \$150 per depositor and \$4,666,786 of deposits.

THE BALTIMORE BAR ASSOCIATION.

On December 3, 1912, after a banquet in honor of Judge James Alfred Pease of the Court of Appeals, retiring, the Baltimore Bar Association elected these officers: President—Moses R. Walter. Vice-Presidents—Charles Morris Howard and Eugene O'Dunne. Secretary—A. deR. Sappington.

NO HUSBANDS FOR 1,179,276.

The Census of England and Wales shows that at midnight April 2, 1911, there were 18,624,884 females and 17,445,608 males, a majority of 1,179,276 females. There are thus 1,068 females to each 1,000 males and the unemployed 68 possibly make the suffragette trouble. London has 1,152 females to each 1,000 males, which accounts in part perhaps for the great suffragette activity in that city. Norway has a surplus of 69 females to each 1,000 males; France 33, while the United States shows a deficiency of 57.

The end of the year 1912 was marked by the resignation of R. W. Silvester, president of the college. Thos. H. Spence, Acting President.

MARYLAND FARM PRODUCTS.

In a report, 1912, the Census Bureau, gives \$77,000,000 as the value of Maryland farm products in 1909, as follows: Milk and cream, dairy farms, \$5,481,000; butter, \$2,010,000; wool, 705,000 pounds, valued at \$200,000; eggs, 15,534,000 dozen, valued at \$3,236,000; fowls numbered 5,949,000 value, \$3,011,000; domestic animals sold and slaughtered, \$8,470,000; crops, all kinds, \$43,920,000; vegetables, \$5,729,000; strawberries, \$1,070,072; orchard fruits, 2,577,000 bushels, \$1,517,000; grain crops, \$43,920,000 on 1,931,972 acres, or 57.6 per cent. of land in farms; potatoes and other vegetables on 155,339 acres, \$7,990,000; strawberries, \$1,070,072; orchard fruits were 2,577,000 bushels, worth \$1,517,000; grapes were 2,152,000 pounds, \$53,498; nuts 318,000 pounds, \$5,687; domestic animals sold, \$5,400,000; slaughtered on farms, \$3,070,000; fowls numbered 2,909,000; eggs reported, 14,464,000 dozens, \$3,236,000; fowls produced 5,949,000, worth \$3,011,000; sheep of shearing age April, 1910, were 126,000; wool produced 705,000 pounds, worth \$200,000; dairy cows, 115,000; milk reported 41,094,000 gallons, or, presumably, 358 gallons per cow.

APPALACHIAN FOREST COMMISSION.

Having \$11,000,000 to spend for forests in the Appalachian range and the White mountains, the Federal Forest Commission reported 2,558,822 acres reserved, much of it in the States of Maryland, Virginia and West Virginia. North Carolina and Georgia, in the South, and Vermont and New Hampshire, in the North, have also contributed largely to the purchase areas.

The purchase area now surveyed in the States of Maryland, Virginia and West Virginia embraces six projects—the "Massanutton" tract of 152,946 acres, the "Potomac" tract of 59,556 acres lying in Maryland and 79,433 lying in West Virginia, an area of 632,316 acres in West Virginia on the watershed of the Monongahela, and of 301,940 acres on the Potomac and Shenandoah rivers. A second Monongahela river watershed tract of 80,259 acres has been surveyed, all of it in West Virginia. Of the areas actually purchased, 19,322 acres of the Massanutton tract are in Page and Rockingham counties, Virginia, and are situated between the north and south forks of the Shenandoah river. A total of 24,900 acres of the Natural Bridge tract, located in Rockbridge, Bedford and Botetout counties, Virginia, was acquired in 1912. This lies on the watershed of the James river, with a small portion on the watershed of the Roanoke river.

BALTIMORE'S NET ASSETS.

Comptroller Thrift, July 6, estimated the city's gross assets at \$81,095,558; liabilities \$66,139,416; net assets \$14,956,142. Quick assets \$27,404,337; fixed (water, land, conduits, wharves, sewerage system) \$31,418,280; miscellaneous (schools, parks, public buildings, engine houses, police stations, markets, baths, ground rents), \$22,272,961. The liabilities are: Funded debt, \$64,595,382, and other items making total \$66,139,415.

ROMAN CATHOLIC HIERARCHY.

On December 2, Pope Pius X, besides giving the red hat to three Spanish and two Austrian Cardinals, created one Hungarian Cardinal and announced the appointment of three American bishops—Rt. Rev. Patrick A. McGovern, bishop of Cheyenne, Rt. Rev. Austin Dowling, bishop of Des Moines and Rt. Rev. Edward Joseph Hanna, Auxiliary bishop of San Francisco. Dr. Hanna was consecrated at Rochester, N. Y., Dec. 4, by Archbishop Bonzano, the Apostolic Delegate.

MARYLAND'S CROPS IN 1912.

The nation-wide average yield of all crops combined, compared with 1911 was 115.8 per cent. Maryland came within a few points of the country-wide average, her yield being 114 per cent.

Virginia made 107, points in the nation-wide average of 115.8, while West Virginia rose to 151 points.

Many States did not go above the 100 per cent. point.

WILLIAM HAND BROWNE.

Dr. Browne, whose death is chronicled in this Almanac's Necrology was a man of remarkable abilities, holding high the torch of learning in Maryland long before the advent of the Hopkins with its galaxy of intellectual lights. The University wisely availed itself of his erudition and at his death he was professor emeritus of English literature in that institution. He was an authority in Maryland history, particularly of the colonial period, and was the author of several books, such as "Maryland, the History of a Palatinate;" "George Calvert and Cecilus Calvert, Barons of Baltimore," and "Life of Alexander Stevens," Vice-President of the Confederate States. He took a prominent part also in the preparation of "The Clarendon Dictionary of the English Language" and "Selections from Scottish Poets." Well versed in the classical and modern tongues, he translated von Falke's Greece and Rome and various works of French and German authors. He edited also the "Archives of Maryland," the Southern Review (1867-68) and Southern Magazine (1871-75) and other works. He was librarian of the Hopkins and Associate Professor (1879-81) and Professor of English Literature, 1891-1910.

TOBACCO IN 1912.

The Maryland crop of 1911, marketed in 1912, was 29,934 hogsheads, including 1,360 hogsheads of new-ground leaves and 1,540 of "bay," or upper-country tobacco. The crop of 1912 was estimated at 27,000 hogsheads. The stock in warehouses January 1, 1912, was 7,659 hogsheads, which with 32,475 Maryland inspections, 2,541 re-inspections, 6,376 Ohio inspections, amounted to 43,969. The sales of Maryland to France were 12,373 hogsheads; of Ohio, 3,350; for home consumption, 4,800; to Holland, 9,553 and smaller amounts to other countries, reducing the stock on hand December 31, 1912, to 9,982 hogsheads.

REDUCE COST OF LIVING—GET NULE'S hams and bacons direct from factory; sides, unsmoked, 8½d.; smoked, 9d.; cuts of steak, 9d.; postpaid.

LOVELY APPLES AND DELICIOUS APPLE products from famous Whimple (Devon) orchards by post. Write for prices.

Flowers, fish, fowl, bacon, apples, milk, eggs, butter, oysters and fresh vegetables pass directly from first hands to the ultimate consumer through the mails. The daily delivery of fresh eggs in the city of London is so large that a special building has been set apart in which to handle them.

It will take time to so develop the system of parcels deliveries in the United States as to get the full measure of advantage therefrom; but there will be no need of coaxing, and there is no prospect of failure. It is no longer an experiment. It is a demonstrated good too long withheld.

If it is doing such wonderful things in England it will not be long before the more progressive spirit of America manifests itself to an even greater extent, and the man in the country with the merchants in rural towns and villages will seek trade from the city consumer through the Parcels Post route.
